MORE ABOUT THE LOCAL WATER QUESTION

In the discussion of the Ashland water problem use has at times been made of a number of terms of units of water measurement to wit: "gallon", "inch", "second foot" and "acre foot".

If you allow me space I will undertake to define the meaning of these terms.

Disposing first of the "inch" or "miners inch". This was the unit used in early mining days and was variable in different mining camps and states. In Oregon forty "miners inch" equal one second foot. This term is now mostly obsolete.

The gallon, the common unit of liquid measurement, will be used

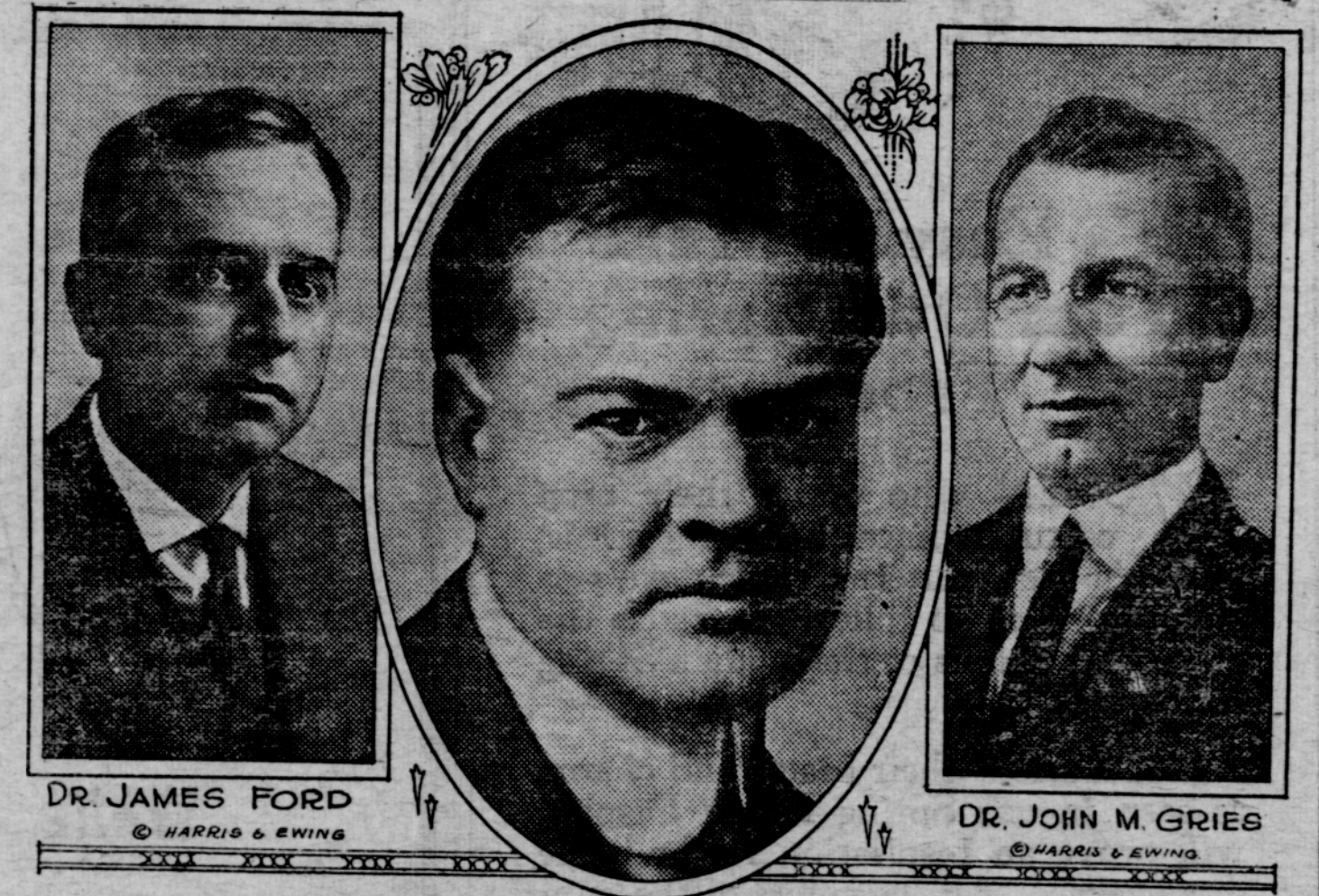

Better Homes Movement Gains Impetus As Nation-Wide Educational Drive Begins Under Hoover's Leadership

Better Homes in America, the national movement for raising the standards of American home-building and home-making, enters upon its third year reorganized and strengthened. An active educational campaign, entirely free from any commercial interest and financed by public gifts, is under way. The problem of the small home will receive major consideration. How the man with a small salary can establish a home embodying the maximum of comfort, convenience, healthfulness and cultural facilities will be the theme of demonstrations on a nationwide scale.

Herbert Hoover, Secretary of Commerce, is president of the organization. Dr. James Ford, a housing specialist of note, has been granted a year's leave from Har-

vard University to undertake the executive direction of the 1924 campaign. Dr. John M. Gries, Chief of the Division of Building and Housing of the Department of Commerce, is a member of the board of directors, and an active leader in the work. Headquarters of the Better Homes movement have been moved to Washington from New York. The demonstrations of Better Homes throughout the country this year will be during the week of May 11 to 18. In the first year of the movement five hundred communities demonstrated Better Homes, and last year about double that number. The outlook for Better Homes Week this year is that many hundreds of additional communities will take part. Particular efforts are being di-

rected this year to interesting rural communities in the movement. The special aim of the movement will be to demonstrate homes which families of moderate incomes can afford. While no strings are tied to local committees demonstrating Better Homes, national headquarters is urging that attention be focused upon houses within the reach of persons in moderate circumstances. Already assurances are pouring in from cities and towns scattered throughout the nation that they will take part in the movement this year. One far western city has written in that it will demonstrate seven new houses, completely furnished, and intends undertaking the renovation of a dilapidated old house to show what can be done in that direction.

as the unit of comparison of the terms, second foot and acre foot. In each of these terms "foot" means a cubic foot. Cubic foot will be computed as of seven and one half gallons capacity.

A second foot is a volume of flowing water that will fill a cubic foot of space in one second of time. This is the unit used in the measurement of flowing streams.

An acre foot of water one foot deep covering over a space of one acre. This is the unit used in the measurement of water in reservoirs.

Comparing these units: A second foot is a flowing stream producing seven and one-half gallons of water per second. An acre foot is a stored unit of 326700 gallons of water.

A second foot of water flowing into a reservoir will produce an acre foot of water in about twelve hours. Reversing: An acre foot of water stored in a reservoir will flow out a second foot for the same period of time, 600 acre feet, the amount contracted for from the Talent Irrigation District by this City, will flow a steady stream of 5 second feet for a little over 60 days.

The summer flow or first waters of Ashland Creek have been carefully measured for a number of years and have been determined to be 5 second feet. Hence the water purchased will double the present water supply of Ashland

creek for the period of shortage which is usually found to be 60 days.

Computing irrigation at \$110 per acre for one and one half foot of water would place a valuation of approximately \$13000.00 on a second foot of water.

Cost of water fit for municipal purposes is computed as reasonably priced if the cost is held within 5 times the cost of water for irrigation which in this instance would allow a price on Ashland Creek of \$65,000.00 per second foot, or for the flow of 5 second feet \$325,000.00.

As near as a layman can determine from reading the court decision adjudicating the water of Ashland Creek, the City of Ashland has 3 second feet or 3-5 of the first waters of Ashland Creek and certain irrigators North of the City, the other 2-5 or two second feet.

By the purchase of this water from the Talent District, these

irrigators can be supplied. Thus clearing the title of this City to the entire flow of Ashland Creek. In the future, then, if the growth of the City demands it, development of the waters of Ashland Creek can be considered and all water developed would belong, without question, to the City. And I believe a limited amount of

water can be stored in Ashland Canyon at about the price herein estimated of a cost of \$65,000.00 per second foot.

But now close up the title to these disputed two second feet that can be secured in trade for water costing \$13,000.00 per second foot.
