## A SOUTHERN OREGON METROPOLIS, BUT WHERE?

At this moment the progressive people of Oregon are greatly enthused with the prospects for an unprecedented era of development and growth. Simultaneously, the people of the southern Oregon district are trying to open the curtains of the future and vision the changes that are destined in their district of the great state. There are many who realize that the district is on the eve of a change that will be far reaching in its effects. Few there in southern Oregon but who confidently believe that their part of the wonderful Oregon country will develop and grow at a pace in keeping with other sections of the state, but the man does not live who can actually visualize or forecast the tremendous growth, development, and the changes that are headed this way. The town that is first to start, and continues unalterably on its course, will be the first to finish. To become the premier city of southern Oregon is to achieve something that will redound to the eternal credit of those who accomplish it. Therefore, when Ashland people are considering the Ashland of the future, let your hopes, your aspirations, your plans extend out and beyond tomorrow and build to make your city the metropolis of the great southern Oregon district of the future.

## KEEP IT CLEAN

A walk along the many business blocks of principal business streets at an early hour yesterday evening revealed gutters littered with discarded letters, newspaper wrappers, empty paper bags and other articles of refuse that had been thrown and swept into the streets by careless citizens, business men and clerks. Two well known local business men called attention to the unsightly condition and immediately a committee of three was formed to take up the campaign of making Ashland a city clean and beautiful.

The condition that prevailed yesterday was no exception to the rule. The same revolting sight is to be witnessed almost any day and it is only reasonable to assume that if it is distasteful to the local resident it is doubly so to the stranger and the tourist. With the possible exception of Portland there is not a point in Oregon through which as many strangers will pass this year as Ashland.

What is more important is that Ashland, because of its beautiful park and auto camp, which are kept spotlessly clean, gives the general impression that the city as a whole is a good example of cleanliness. In view of this, Ashland citizens cannot afford to let the present unsightly condition prevail along the business streets and those of the residential districts. It is meet that every effort be exerted in maintaining a high state of cleanliness along every street, alley and lot. Pride should prohibit the littering of our streets and vacant lots with litter and trash.

There is no force so appealing to the stranger as a clean and well-painted town. It indicates thrift, a prosperous condition, and a civic pride in which homeseekers like to join. It requires but little effort to maintain a spotless town. Let's give Ashland the distinction of being the cleanest, most attractive town in Oregon. Aid the committee of three in this meritorious movement.

## SUNDAY OBSERVANCE

Ramsay MacDonald, England's premier, chose for his text at a recent service the commandment to "remember the Sabbath and keep it holy." In his plea for the observance of the Sabbath, which is a most sacred observance with the Scots it is to be remembered, he asked not that it be observed for its own sake nor for the Lord's sake, but because it promotes a state of society in which three are "fine solid eternal foundations of character and self-command."

## ARMORED FORD CAR IS LATE NOVELTY

Gen. Butler, Philadelphia's Dynamic Commissioner, Introduces Them.

Armored Fords cars as bandit chasers are the latest police innovation.

Gen. Smedley D. Butler, Philadelphia's dynamic commissioner of public safety, is the man who introduced them.

Before he took office a few weeks back, the Philadelphia city council voted General Butler \$5,000 with which to purchase an automobile for his personal use. But when salesmen for high-priced cars appeared and tried to interest him, he made it plain that he intended to spend the money in purchasing small light cars for use as bandit chasers by the police department.

The Ford runabout was his choice and it wasn't long before an enterprising Ford salesman had a car ready for the general's inspection.

Now the Philadelphia police have six of these armored Ford cars and under General Butler's plan this number will shortly be augmented until there will be ninety such bandit chasers in service.

The entire shell of the body is lined with 1-8 inch special steel and the space between the armor plating and the outside of the car is packed with loose cotton and coarse hair to retard the velocity of bullets. Armor plate also covers the cowl and runs up as high as the lower portion of the windshield. The upper portion is in two sections of bullet proof glass and wind-wings have been provided on either side, these also of bullet proof glass.

The Ford engines are specially equipped to afford increased speed and tests made show some interesting results. In one test to show acceleration and power developed for hill climbing, a mile was covered in one minute and thirty-one seconds from a standing start. On a country road the car attained a speed of more than sixty-miles an hour and in a city street test covered 2,823 feet at a speed of approximately seventy miles an hour.

Ford cars have been in use by police departments all over the country for years and recently there has been a rapidly increasing tendency in the larger cities to use them in place of motorcycles since they are less conspicuous, and afford greater protection and comfort. Portland, Ore., is one of the latest cities to adopt the Ford cars to replace motorcycles and now has twenty-three of them in operation. Cleveland Heights, O., and Cincinnati are other cities which have recently joined the Ford ranks, the armored Ford as used in Philadelphia, however, is General Butler's idea.

PENDLETON, March 19. — A stiff fight will have to be waged in congress to secure enactment of the McNary-Haugen bill, but chances of its passage in the senate are bright, according to telegrams received in Pendleton today from Roy W. Ritner and S. R. Thompson, who are in Washington, D. C.

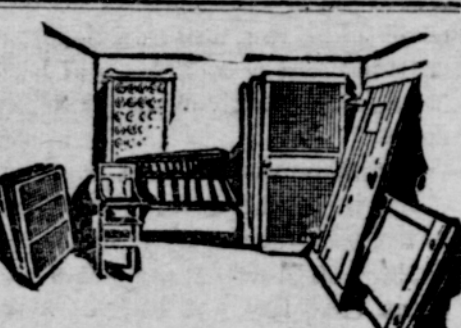
