Presbyterian Meeting

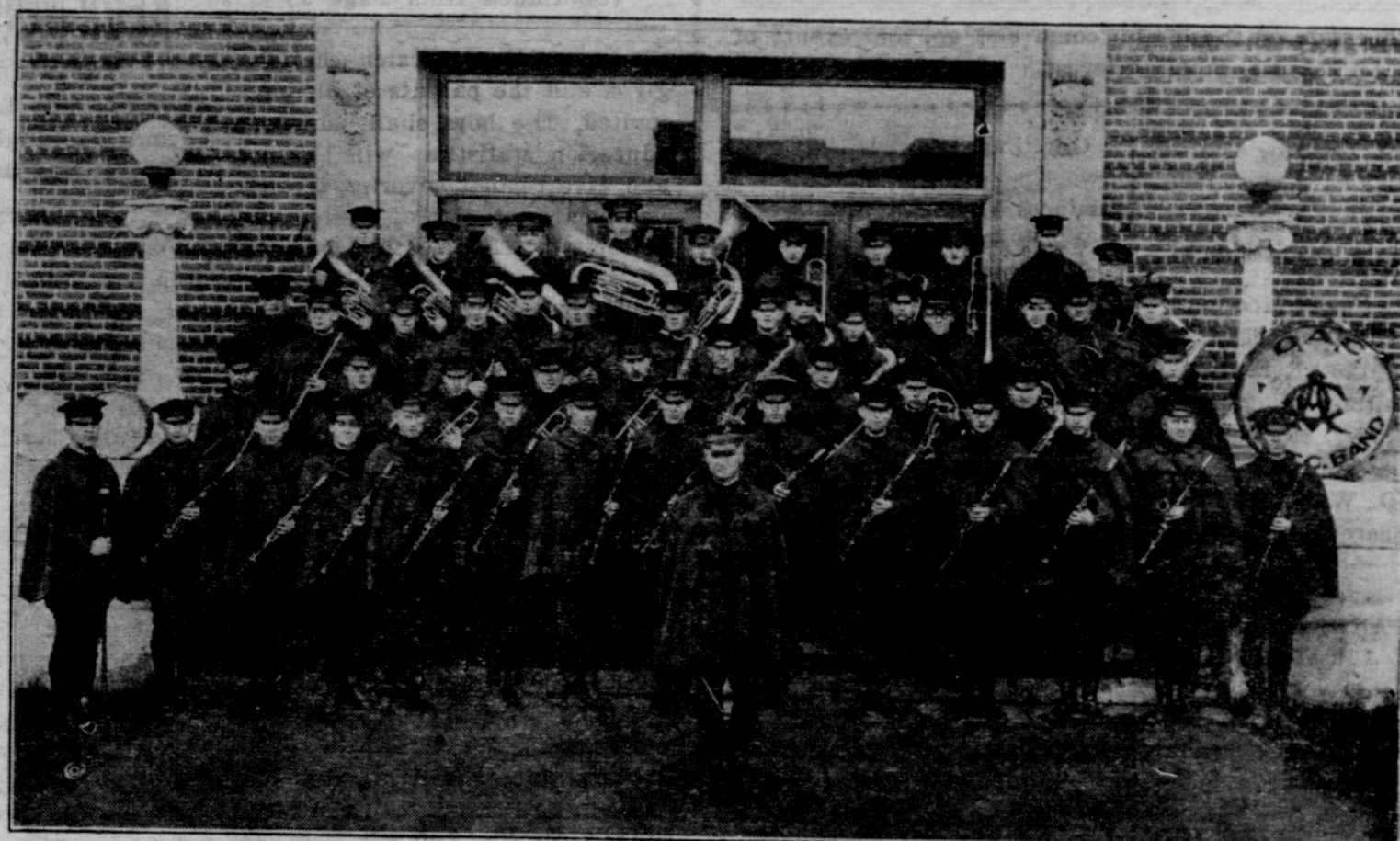
