## STATE COMMISSION GIVES FISHING DATA

Trout Season Opens April 1, Other Information Outlined for Anglers.

No, the trout season in Oregon does not open April 1. It does open April 15 as usual.

The important digit of the figure "15" got lost in a story about the opening of the trout season, published in The Oregonian Sunday, with the result that it read that the season would open April 1 instead of April 15.

Ever since the offices of the state game commission have been besieged with calls asking if the open season has been changed for 1924. This articles will make clear that it does not open until April 15 as usual.

Also, here's some interesting information to which attention of anglers is called by the state game commission regarding open and closed waters, restricted stretches of stream, poundage limits, length limits and methods of fishing considered legitimate in the codes of the of the commission as well as in the code of angling ethics. Here are complete data covering the regulations in force:

### Streams and Lakes Closed to Angling

The following streams and lakes in counties of interest to local sportsmen have been closed to angling by order of the state game commission:

Jackson county—Carberry, Four Bit and Squaw creeks closed indefinitely. Rogue river for a distance of 400 feet below Gold Ray dam closed indefinitely.

Josephine county—Rogue river closed for a distance of 400 feet below Savage Rapids dam indefinitely.

Klamath county—Seven Mile creek from its confluence with Weed canal to a point on said creek where Short creek flows into same. Spencer creek closed from Buck lake to the mouth of said creek. Woods river closed from November 30 to following June 15 of each year, also tributaries of said Woods river. Klamath river closed for a distance of 4000 feet below and 2000 feet above the mouth of Spencer creek, from November 30 to the following June 15 of each year. On March 14, 1924, the Oregon state

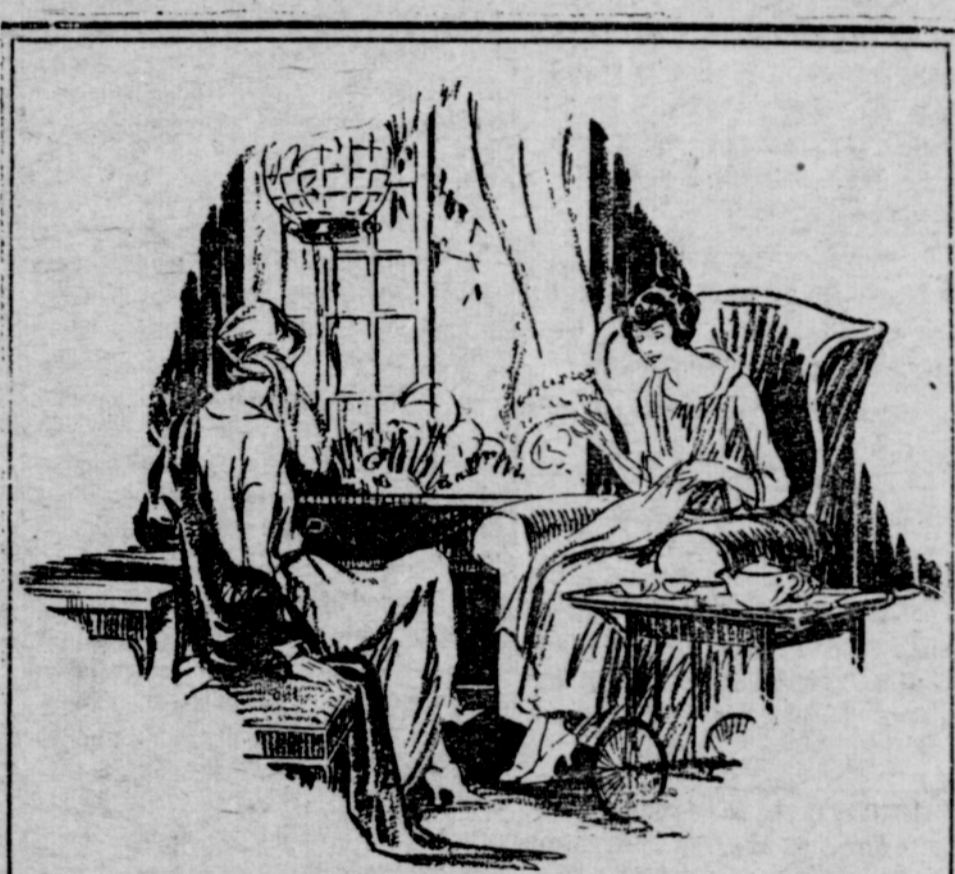
Lake county—Campbell lake closed indefinitely. Silver lake irrigation project reservoir including Silver creek and Gler creek, closed indefinitely.

Rogue river—It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation at any time or place to fish for, or attempt to take any of the waters of the Rogue river, or any of its tributaries, at any time, any trout by means other than with hook and line, commonly called angling.

It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to transport, freight or express, for the purpose of sale, barter or exchange, or to have in his or its possession for the purpose of transporting, freight or expressing, for the purpose of sale, barter or exchange, any trout taken at any time or place from the Rogue river or any of its tributaries.

The word "trout," whenever used in this act, means and includes fish known as the rainbow, steelhead, black spotted (enthroat), Dolly Varden, eastern brook and all species and varieties of "trout."
