AN EVENTFUL YEAR FOR ASHLAND

Predictions are general that this will be one of the most eventful years in Ashland's history. When it is considered that this prophecy is coming from those who have resided here a long term of years and are in position to know, the predictions are not far from true and there is every reason to believe that the city is entering an era of growth and prosperity unprecedented in history.

The development of the Emigrant creek unit of the Talent irrigation project is of decided importance in the future program of growth and progress, and no single announcement carries so much of real encouragement as that which insures that the lands of Bell View district are to be transformed from their semi-arid state into green fields of hay and grain, and into tracts of garden truck and fruit. The district is located at the very door of Ashland and within a very few years will afford more wealth than any other single district tributary to the city. At present it supports only a comparatively few scattered families. With abundant water, which the Emigrant creek unit will afford, properly subdivided, and intensively cultivated Bell View district is capable of supporting three or four hundred families. At least calculations the irrigation of Bell View district, alone will add a quarter of a million dollars of revenue annually to the sum total of Ashland's business volume. The development of the Emigrant creek irrigation unit will also be responsible for reclaiming several hundred acres of additional land in close proximity to Ashland.

The further development of the tourist auto camp, for which a \$10,000 bond issue was voted at a recent date, is another item of importance to the future of the city and district. It insures that that important asset will be made to yield increased returns to the total business volume, and will guarantee Ashland's leadership as a tourist center.

There is every indication of an increased volume of building and construction work during the present year. Already there are several new residences under construction, many others are being planned, and it is believed that with respect to the building of new and modern homes this will prove a banner year. Although no definite information has been made public, there is good reason to believe that a number of public and semi-public structures will be constructed and under construction before the end of 1934. In this connection, the Tidings is in possession of information that is highly encouraging, but which it is not permissible to divulge.

Prospects for a box factory are excellent, which means an increased payroll. The Blair Granite Company, with increased capital stock, will branch out during the year, and with a quality of marble that even surpasses the famous Vermont product, bids fair to grow into one of the best wealth producers of the community. Prospects for a revival of the mining industry are encouraging and with the erection of the smelter at Gold Hill there is no question but that numerous properties will be developed and worked, all of which are within a radius of ten miles of Ashland. The Ashland cannery will operate to increased capacity and the output of the Ashland Iron Works will double over that of 1923. Tourist travel will increase at least twenty-five per cent, and may show a growth of fifty per cent. Other local industries give promise of development, so that prospects for the year are most alluring and pleasing.

That there will be employment for more than the usual number is an assured fact. The improvements that are to be made in the tourist auto camp, the many new homes that will be constructed, and the thousands of dollars to be expended in building the Emigrant creek irrigation unit, together with other industries that are employing a large number of men, including the Southern Pacific, 1924 promises to be a leader from a payroll standpoint.

The Tidings shares the view with many of its readers and patrons that this is the beginning of a new and prosperous epoch in Ashland, and is sincere in the belief that the city and community are entering an era of unprecedented growth and prosperity.

"BETTER ROADS" A REALITY

The internal development of the country has slowed down, it is often said, no new railroads are being built, and surplus capital is going into other enterprises. This, it is explained, is why industry has turned attention to foreign trade.

These industrial and business seers have overlooked an industry that is today, and probably will be for many years, the greatest of all. The building of highways. Though there is now little construction of new rail lines,

highway building is proceeding on an unprecedented scale and absorbing an enormous amount of capital. The internal development of the country goes on unchecked, but the taxpayers are the investors now, and their dividends are not calculated in percentage but in service.

About 1,000,000 men were employed in the construction of federal-aid roads last year—a greater number than were employed in the steel industry or the automobile business. Road building is now one of the greatest of the national industries. Twenty-eight thousand miles of federal-aid roads were completed or work performed on them during the year.

This new industry will continue to flourish for many years for there is not a section of the country, however well supplied with rail lines, that has all the improved highways that it needs.

THE NEWSPAPER GUIDE

The newspaper that carries a good line of advertisements is to the shopper what the time table is to the traveler and the published guide is to the tourist. Busy people will study these advertisements in the home or in the office as they do a time table and before they start out shopping they have determined where they are going.

The newcomer or the visitor in the city finds the advertising columns of a newspaper a reliable guide to follow, just as he finds the printed guide for tourists to points of interest a matter of interest and time-saving. In fact, the stores, and the theatres are points of interest to all tourists, and the non-advertiser puts himself outside the pale of interest so far as strangers are concerned.

NEWS LETTER

PORTLAND, Ore., March 22.—

Will the Ku Klux Klan play as dominant a role in Oregon politics in the coming spring primaries and November elections as during the bitter Oregon campaign of the winter of 1922? That is the question asked in informal political circles.

The answer to the query is invariably "No". Even among rabid kluxers it is said to be admitted, more or less reluctantly, that the Klan has lost its firm hold on Oregon politics. The organization, say many within and outside of the ranks, has lost hundreds of members in the last year in Oregon, and an equally large number seldom attend meetings.

In the height of the campaign in November, 1922, the Klan had a firm grip. The Anti-Private School bill was passed by a majority of more than 14,000 votes, after a campaign which seethed with hatred and bitterness. And Governor Walter Pierce, Democrat, who favored the bill, was elected over Governor Ben W. Olcott, incumbent, who publicly condemned the Klan.

Many who know the vagaries of political waves expect the Senatorial campaign to show a "backwash" of the 1922 campaign. United States Senator Charles McNary is a candidate for re-election on the Republican ticket. His opponents are George L. Baker, Mayor of Portland, and K. K. Kubli, Speaker of the State House of Representatives. The late C. N. McArthur, former Congressman from Oregon, was also a candidate. Four are in the field for the Democratic nomination.

So far the Ku Klux Klan has not publicly endorsed either Senator McNary, Baker or Kubli. And there is doubt whether an endorsement will be made. The Klan is decidedly split, it is said, and the Orange societies are at odds with the Klan. Kubli was expected to receive the endorsement at a meeting of the Klan several weeks ago, but no candidates were recommended at the gathering.

Baker has made a bid for Klan support. He expects to open his campaign at Salem, Senator McNary's home town. He is an active campaigner. Kubli is active in the field also.

While his opponents stump the state, Senator McNary is on the job at Washington and, from all accounts, will remain there unless his adversaries gain too much ground before the primaries. McNary's connection with the McNary-Haugen bill is said to have solidified the extensive farm communities in his favor. The farmers are keen on the bill and look upon it as a panacea for their ills. And politicians say it may be one of the means of sending McNary back to Washington for another term.

The Oregon Anti-Private School bill is in the courts. Arguments of the plaintiffs—Hill Military Academy and the Society of Jesus and Mary—and of the state have been heard by Federal Judges Bean and Wolverton, of Portland, and Judge Gilbert, of San Francisco. The three judges at this

PORTLAND IS A GOLF-SWEPT CITY

Courses Will Number Ten by End of Year; Multnomah Club Is Latest in Field.

PORTLAND, Ore., March 24—Golf has swept Portland from the business section to the suburbs. Ten golf courses, all within a radius of from two to ten miles from the heart of the city, is the record which the City of Roses will boast of within the next year. Five first-class, all turf courses are now being used regularly by mashie swingers of more or less ability. They include Waverly, Portland, Tualatin and the two municipal links—Eastmoreland and Rose City.

Multnomah club, known for athletic achievement and its magnificent clubhouse and athletic field, is the latest in the golf field. The club has purchased a slightly tract four miles from the clubhouse and will develop 36 holes. Work on the first 18 holes will start immediately. The first two weeks have brought in 300 members without a campaign. A membership drive is expected to bring the total up to 500, when a waiting list will be established.

The club has established a plan of proprietary membership available for club members at \$300 payable as follows: \$25 with application and \$250 cash within 30 days or \$25 with application and \$2.75 and interest per month.

The West Hills course will be ready for play here in May. It will be Portland's third municipal golf links. Golfers claim it will be one of the sportiest courses in the Northwest. The Aderwood, Columbia and Oswego courses are being developed and will be ready for golfing within the next six or eight months.

time are considering the arguments and briefs submitted prior to making their decision as to whether a permanent injunction shall be given the plaintiffs restraining the state authorities from putting the law into effect.

Under the terms of the bill passed by vote of the people, November, 1922, all children between the ages of 8 and 16 years must attend the public schools of the state after September, 1926. Penalty of fine and imprisonment for parents and guardians who allow children to violate the law is provided.

The state, in arguments presented, held that the law did not deny the children the right to attend private schools, which they can do after the regular public school hours. They held that it therefore would not prevent private schools from continuing in existence.

Counsel for the plaintiffs held that it would be impossible for young children to attend the public schools and then attend private schools after hours. It was held that the law would virtually destroy private schools. Counsel pointed to the decision of the United States Supreme Court in the Nebraska language cases, which held that a school could not be prevented from teaching the German language.
