THE SPENDING SEASON

In preparing the family budget for the year wise budgeters provide a large contingency fund for spring. It is no witticism to talk of springtime expenses springing up as unexpectedly and quickly as spring onions. Like the Christmas budget, the most extravagant estimates are found woefully inadequate.

Enumerating a few of the possible and 'more than likely' family expenses for spring, there are garden making, house-painting and repairs, new home furnishings, automobile overhauling. Easter clothing for the whole brood, taxes, perhaps an increased rent on April 1 and a savings account in the bank for vacation exigencies and inevitables.

In the springtime home-gardners complain that it is not worth the work and the expense but the passage of time lends forgetfulness and in the fall it is all figured how much the garden is saving the family exchequer. It is apparent that family cost accounts have not been evolved in connection with the family budget, and perhaps it is better for the back-yard garden and father's exercise that it has not been.

Modern customs seem incompatible with the seasons in the present order of the latter, especially in regards to spring and summer. Spring is regarded as the most costly season of the four for the American family, and yet it is during that short season that the family must save up enough of a surplus to meet the summer vacation expenses.

But lest spring should be made out an unwelcome visitor it must be admitted that the other three seasons offer their peculiar attractions for the family income and the family budget becomes a year around semaphore for both the inbound and outbound tracks of the family financial system.

Families which have not adopted the budget system have deprived themselves of the pleasure of planning the future, the advantages of financial foresight and court the disappointments corollary to unsystematic spending. The family budget is providing more vacations, new homes and new wardrobes than salary increases and new wage scales.

STAMP IT OUT

The records of lynchings for 1923 shows a notable reduction under the number debited in the preceding year. The 28 mob-murders that are charged to it are ten less than the lowest number of any year since accurate records have been kept. This decrease in mob lawlessness is unquestionably due to the awakening of the public to the menace that lies in such violence and to the assertion of the better elements of the population, which fortunately compose a large majority, in registering opinion against it.

It is also to be noted that in the past year the number of states not debited with lynchings increased. Thirty-nine states passed the year without that blot, the largest number that has yet been counted have passed a twelve months' period without such offense, since lynchings have been accurately recorded.

But the records of nine states show lynchings and that is nine too many. While the 28 lynchings of 1923 show a marked decrease in such offenses, the number is larger than it should be by 28. Not until that form of violence is wholly stamped out will the forces that are working against it be warranted in lessening effort.

ROAD PAVING

As advertised by the state highway commission and the Jackson county court, bids for paving of eight and a half miles of the road between Medford and Ruch will be opened at the office of the highway commission in Portland next Thursday, 27th—after which work is expected to begin at once on this much-needed improvement. The money for this work has already been appropriated and is on hand—so the taxpayers will not be put to one cent of extra expense—notwithstanding the misrepresentation of a little bunch of mouse-headed knockers who are trying to delay this work—for some unexplained reason. Nearly all of the heavy taxpayers of the county, by petition, have asked the county court to have this paving done—with the money voted for this purpose five years ago—and surely their views and wishes are entitled to more respect than those of a few mossback agitators. It is learned that the "knockers club" of Medford will try to stop the work by an injunction suit, but when they learn that such action will necessitate a bond of perhaps a quarter of a million dollars it may cool their ardor somewhat.

Since the creation of the world no improvements were ever made anywhere that were not opposed by a few knockers—usually a worthless class of grafters who pay

no taxes and are a detriment to the community they live in. Had the moss-back knockers been allowed to have their way this country would yet be like it was a hundred years ago—with no railroads or highways—only Indian trails through the forests.—Jacksonville Post.

WOODROW WILSON'S ACHIEVEMENT

Woodrow Wilson has "gone West." His death gave the signal for an outpouring of sincere admiration and a flood of eulogies from friends and foes alike, but what his final position in history will be no one can tell. He guided the ship of state—no one but he did the guiding—during eight of the most turbulent years in modern history. When blood lust and hate filled the world, he preached the gospel of international peace and amity with clarity, courage and conviction. It remains to be seen whether the League of Nations trail he blazed will lead to the goal. No one knows. His achievement lay not in the practical means he devised to reach the goal, but rather in the ideal of international co-operation he established. His sermons, preached fearlessly when pacifism was almost a crime, changed the attitude of mankind toward war. To have done that is an achievement great enough for any man.—April "Sunset."
