ROUND THE WORLD RACE IS ON

Four of America's most daring and proficient air pilots, together with alternate fliers and mechanics, are at Seattle making final preparations to start a flight around the globe and bring to the attention of the world that America reigns supreme in the air, and to win for themselves the distinction of having been the first bird-men to circumnavigate the world. Rumors that other nations, fearful that America might win the coveted honor and distinction, were preparing a round the world flight, have been incessant. That other nations, particularly England, was planning the enterprise was well known, but it was generally expected that the English planes and pilots would not be ready for at least several weeks. Advance news stories covering the activities in Great Britain indicated that she would not attempt the flight much before July, but characteristic of the British spirit, Commander MacLean, of the Royal Air Force, hopped off yesterday in a carefully planned effort to win the honor which America seeks, and the race is on, with the two leading anglo-saxon nations of the world pitted against each other.

Intense interest was centered in the efforts of the brave American airmen. England's entry will serve to double the interest and the progress of the flights will be eagerly watched. So far as the date of the actual hop-off is concerned, England has the advantage of a week. The prime of the United States Army's air service will not leave Seattle until Monday, but undoubtedly the advantage is with the Americans. Preparations count for much in the unparalleled contest, and in this respect America has spent many months. Doubtless Britain's action was hurried at the last moment to gain the advantage of a few days. This may result in disaster. Another advantage possessed by America is in numbers, in which there is strength. The British pilot, accompanied by two assistants, is attempting the flight alone. If the single crew fails the flight is doomed to failure. With America's responsibility shared equally by a quartet of fearless fliers the chances of ultimate success are four times greater than of great Britain. No sane person will expect all of America's bird-men to circumnavigate the globe. As much as we dread to contemplate the dangers to which these men are subjecting themselves all will admit that grim death will claim one or more of them—perhaps all, yet America's chances of claiming the much sought honor are four times greater than those of the competing nation.

In this all-absorbing and historic race, may success crown both Great Britain and America, but let us hope that those upon whom America is depending, will be the first to complete the long and dangerous journey.

THE NINETY AND SEVEN

The saddest commentary on the men of the United States is written in statistics showing that only three of every 100 die leaving estates of \$10,000 or more in value.

At present money values, living costs and living standards, an accumulation of \$10,000 does not meet the common American conception of a fortune even though only three per cent of the entire male population in a life time acquires an estate equal to or in excess of that sum.

When one contemplates that the average life span in this country is now rated at 63 years and that the man dying at that age has had more than 40 years in which to build up an estate, it does not speak well of American thrift and frugality that 97 per cent of all men at death do not leave substantial estates.

Life insurance companies have also produced statistics showing that among men attaining the age of 65 years only 14 of every 100 have sufficient property to support them without daily labor and 38 of the remaining 86 are penniless.

These facts raise in the thoughtful and farseeing minds such questions as: Are Americans spending too much? Is the average income inadequate for the necessities of life? Are living costs out of proportion to earnings? Are we living too extravagantly?

When one asks himself what it avails a man to devote his life in storing away wealth for the requirements of nonproductive old age, he must also ask himself if society is bound to provide for the improvident. There is no greater fallacy than the not uncommon assertion that it is nobody's business how a man spends his money. Quite often it is serious business to society.

CO-OPERATION

Modern civilization knows of only one game which all may play and in which all players are winners. That

game is co-operation. In an era where the many are working for self the exceptional who work for others may deprive self. Nobody is deprived who works with others.

The stage driver who declined to exhibit his skill with the whip on a roadside hornet's nest knew the power of co-operation. John H. Patterson, cash register king, built up the greatest sales organization the world has ever known through the simple principle of co-operation. Without cooperation the huge American war loans could never have been subscribed. With co-operation they were all over-subscribed. Co-operation among the allies under Marshal Foch stemmed the advance of the German hordes.

Hornets work together. So do bees. A bee hive is a wonderful testimonial to what working together—each for all and all for each—can accomplish. Ants are co-operators and every ant-hill testifies to the result-getting powers of co-operation. A wise man was once asked which is the most important—Labor, Capital or Management. He answered with a twinkle: "Which is the most important leg of a three-legged stool?"

Co-operation is the key word in business. It is the one direct road to prosperity, both for individuals and large groups. If a man is to be a leader, he first learns how to be a good co-operator—a worker with others; not a worker against, not for, but WITH.

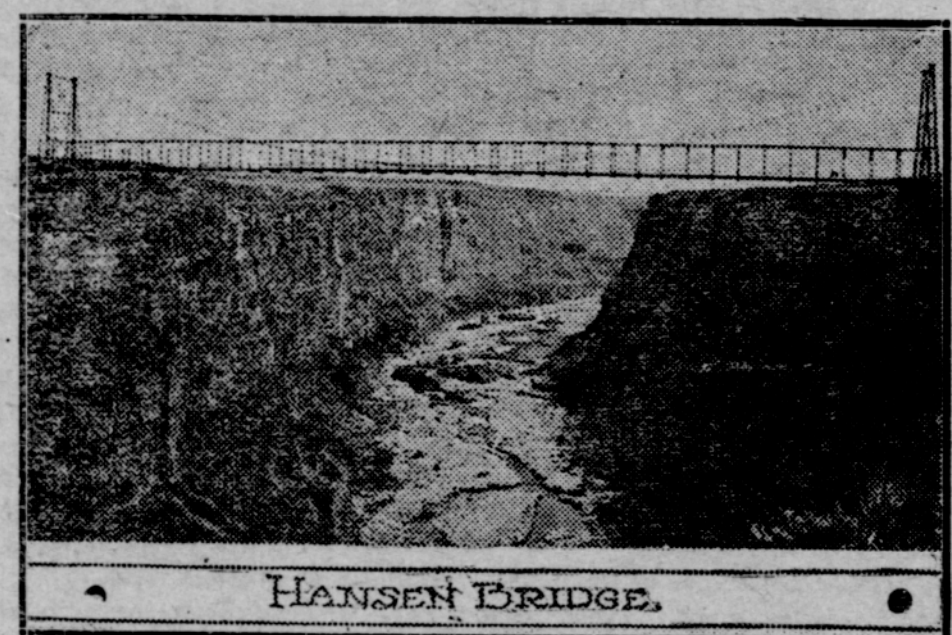

Highest Suspension Bridge



The accompanying picture shows the magnificent Hansen suspension bridge, near Hansen, Southern Idaho, declared to be the highest suspension bridge in the world.

Built across the Snake River canyon at a cost of \$100,000, it is 345 feet above the water, flowing like a tiny thread far below; its length is 688 feet. It was recently dedicated to the fallen soldiers of the World War.

The flooring is of wood, as steel would be too heavy. Every year or so the planks will have to be replaced by new ones. The travel on the bridge is quite heavy.

Giant cables span the canyon at this point, these being pronounced entirely adequate to supporting the structure.

The bridge supplies a crossing place for thousands of residents and tourists who formerly had to negotiate the treacherous canyon grades.

Tuberculosis Menace In Germany
Certain Unless Kin of Sufferers
Dispatch Relief Without Delay



Germany has been characterized by no less distinguished an authority than Dr. Haven Emerson, former Commissioner of Health of New York City and an authority on community health, as "a perfect organization for the spread of tuberculosis." Dr. Emerson made this statement recently on his return from a tour of Germany, made at the request of the American Committee for the Relief of German Children, of which Major-General Henry T. Allen is chairman, for the purpose of learning the truth about distress in that country.

The accompanying photograph shows graphically why these once healthy people are becoming prey to dread diseases. The pinch of poverty has compelled them to acquire more cramped and squalid living quarters and, compelled as they are to subsist on meagre rations, it is not long before their bodies give way to the strain upon them.

The couple shown are of the middle class, the husband a clerk, and in former years were comfortably housed and fed on his earnings. Now they find difficulty in procuring food of any sort and are dependent absolutely upon outside assistance

if they are to be saved from illness and possible death.

It is the purpose of the American Committee to provide relief through its funds only for children, hence the financial burden of caring for adults must be assumed by others who have an interest in the grown-ups. For this reason the committee has established a food package department, through which persons in America who have relatives or friends in any part of Germany may, by paying ten dollars, assure the delivery to them of 119 pounds of substantial American food, including 49 pounds of flour, 25 pounds of rice, 10 pounds of sugar, 8 pounds of cooking fats, 3 pounds of cocoa and 24 one-pound tins of evaporated milk. The packages are insured and transported without cost in Germany by the government there.

What such a contribution would mean to the man and wife shown in the above photograph is obvious. A package would last them for weeks with judicious use and might save them from serious illness.
