AMERICA BUILDING 35,000 MILES GOOD ROADS YEARLY

ONE of the important factors in the development of our country—one of the best indices of national progress—is the amount of improved highway construction now taking place.

Just as the development of the nation's steam transportation lines a few generations ago marked the beginning of a new era in the progress of our people, so the present period of highway improvement is bringing about rapidly improving conditions.

According to figures that have been compiled by the Bureau of Public Roads and the National Automobile Chamber of Commerce we are adding 35,000 miles of improved highways to our system each year and now have substantially 400,000 miles of roadways of this type.

In 1904 we had 153,000 miles of rural highways improved with some type of surfacing, so that in the last two decades about 250,000 miles have been added, or enough to circle the globe ten times.

These figures, of course, do not represent the total mileage of improved and unimproved rural roadways in the United States which on January 1, 1923, was 2,941,294, a gain of 789,000 miles since 1904.

This amazing development of highways has in many ways practically revolutionized modern life. Thousands of persons who formerly spent their lives in the great cities are now setting out into the country where their appreciation of this great land is made more comprehensive and where they are able to cultivate gardens and secure the many benefits of semi-rural existence. The former isolation of the farming community has largely disappeared, and the people of this nation have a better understanding of each other than ever before because of this closer contact.

New wealth is being created, new interests in life are being aroused and employment on an economical sound basis is being given to thousands of men.

The development of good roads is a splendid type of national thrift.

THREE CONVICTED OF ROBBING NEVADA MAILS

CARSON CITY, Nev., March 29.—R. O. Green, J. M. Atkinson and W. E. Jones were found guilty of robbing the mails of approximately \$25,000, by a federal trial jury, which deliberated six hours. J. W. Rowe was acquitted of a like charge. The three convicted men will be sentenced to-morrow by Federal Judge Farrington.

Public Health Organizations Promote Nation-wide Movement For Fewer Deaths, Longer Life

WHY die at 55, the average span accorded to man by life insurance companies, when it is possible to live to be 65 with not one bit more knowledge of medicine than we now have?

This is the question health authorities are putting squarely up to the American citizen. In 1910, the average man could safely count on living to be 51 years old. Since then, science has succeeded in adding four years to the average life and doctors, apparently, are working on the theory that the present average can be considerably lengthened before another ten years have rolled around.

One of the steps in this direction is the prevention of deaths which result from postoperative or avoidable causes. Statistics of the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company show that entirely too many people die before their time.

Automobile accidents increase each year. Reports further show a large number of railroad accidents, deaths from accidental drowning, and about 13,000 deaths from falls. Burns cause approximately 6,000 deaths a year, while poison from food, drugs and gas carry off at least 4,000 persons.

The medical fraternity is not only endeavoring to improve conditions which are subject to control by modern public health procedures, but in their efforts to prolong life, they are fostering a nation-wide movement for periodic health examination. Organizations throughout the country are co-operating in this campaign.

Among other activities in an extensive program of health education, the Metropolitan is endeavor-



ing to reduce the excessive maternal mortality rate in this country. Deaths from childbirth averaging 20,000 a year. Public health nurses, maintained in 4,033 cities and towns, either by special arrangement with local nursing associations, or as direct representatives of the company, furnish the necessary prenatal service in cases of this kind, and also take care of the mother and child after confinement.

In its life conservation campaign, the company emphasizes the necessity of yearly medical examination, widespread education regarding communicable diseases, and a safety first program to prevent accidents of all kinds.

What the World Is Doing

Crops Measured by Meter on Auto Dashboard

For recording the measurements of crops planted in various crops, a meter attached to the dashboard of an auto-



mobile has been included in the equipment of the Department of Agriculture. The instrument is operated from the same gearing mechanism used for an ordinary speedometer. Each crop can be recorded in its particular section and the dimensions of the "stands" are shown in feet. At the right of the device is a scale that registers the total distances covered in miles and the number of trips made. As each patch of a certain kind is measured, it is added to the total. Each scale is labeled and has a button which must be pressed to throw it into action. Ten principal crops are provided for as well as idle ground and pasture land.

Renewing Golf Balls

A cheap and practical method of renewing old golf balls is to fill the cracks with white rubber cement, which can be obtained at any drug store. After filling the cracks, the entire surface of the ball is painted. By repairing the balls in this way there are no bumps or cracks, which have a tendency to influence the course of the ball, and the whitened surface will show up well. It is a good idea to

wash the balls in cool soapy water before going to the grounds, as this helps to retain the old luster and removes stains.

Secrets of the Seven Seas Told by "Bottle Papers"

To learn the speed and direction of ocean currents, government experts use "bottle papers." Accurate knowledge of these drifts is important to navigation, and the safety of hundreds may depend upon it. Small slips, with directions for their return printed in the principal languages, are given to ship captains, to be sealed in flasks and thrown overboard. Months or years later, some return. One floated nearly across the Atlantic and back, and another crossed the widest part of the Pacific in a little over two years. A third, dropped near the Cape of Good Hope, was picked up on the western coast of Australia.

Sand for Railroads' Safety Costs Millions Yearly

While big figures are used in telling the cost of safety to the railways, the amazing item to the average person is the amount spent for sand. Four tons are required for every mile of road in the United States, according to the figures of one trunk line with 7,500 miles of track. As this road is in the middle west and south, where mountains are not encountered, the figures given are regarded as conservative. The cost of putting the sand into the engine box is placed at \$250 a ton as an average minimum. For all the roads, the yearly cost is estimated at \$2,627,070. For the most part the sand is brought from river bottoms and dried by waste steam at the round house.

There are now 145,000 radio sets on the farms throughout the country, which receive crop reports from 150 government wireless stations, according to recent estimates.

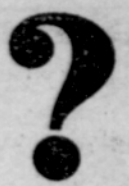
