THE DOG POISONER

If it were possible for the dog poisoner to hear all the epithets that are hurled at him he doubtless would experience a feeling that would remind him of the infernal regions and all its torment, and he gets no more than he deserves. The individual, who under the cover of darkness, deliberately tosses poisoned meat into streets and alleys to deal death to every passing dog and cat is committing a crime of no small proportions, bringing untold agony and suffering to dumb brutes, many of them faithful, and injuring the feelings of friends and neighbors to a marked degree.

Ashland has been contending with the dog poisoner for several weeks, and during which several faithful dogs and cats have been killed. Many house cats, highly prized and harmless to lives and property have been claimed in the death toll. In one instance related poison was placed in sausage and thrown into a yard and was found by a number of little children playing nearby. That reveals a dangerous condition and if persisted in may in time claim the lives of children. Not only are canines and cats endangered by the malicious individuals but little tots are placed in a dangerous position.

There is a state law designed to prohibit poisoning dogs and the temper of some of Ashland's citizens has been aroused to a point that a searching investigation is under way and if the guilty parties are apprehended they can expect prosecution to the limit.

Washington Once Staid, Dignified,
Now Surcharged With Scandal

WASHINGTON, April 1.—"Dead men tell no tales."

It is a simple adage, as old as the hills, yet ever fresh in its application. And behind it probably lies the reason for the most sensational era of scandalous inference and deadly insinuation that Washington has ever experienced. The national capital has undergone a marked transition since the 68th Congress launched itself full tilt into the churning sea of a score of investigations.

From a staid, respectable city where gossip was usually confined to the tea-tables and the boudoirs of the elite, it has become in three months a whispering gum-shoe metropolis where the breath of scandal strikes the visitor in the face as he steps out of Union Station and caresses his coat-tails as he disappears thru the door of his hotel.

If the newspaper correspondents in Washington had transmitted to their papers and to the public in the last three months one-tenth of the scandalous gossip affecting the great and near-great in Washington that has reached their ears they would all be fired and their papers probably submerged in an ocean of libel.

The officials of the government whose names have not at one time or another been dragged into the score or more of investigations this winter probably could be numbered on the fingers of one hand. Names that ordinarily were synonyms for respectability and integrity have been flung promiscuously around and some of them dragged in the dirt of a hundred half-told tales.

"Dead men tell no tales."
It was in the administration of Warren G. Harding that most of the scandals, some of them real and some of them imaginary occurred.

Warren G. Harding is dead. From his lips there can be neither refutation nor confirmation of the many intrigues disclosed in the testimony of scores of witnesses before congressional committees.

The country, for instance, can never know positively whether he ordered Gaston B. Means, a discharged and indicted agent of the Department of Justice, to conduct a secret investigation into the official acts of Secretary of the Treasury Andrew W. Mellon, as Means testified so calmly on the witness stand—a sensational bit of testimony that caused Washington to catch its breath.

A president of the United States having a secret service operative investigate one of his cabinet members!

"Dead men tell no tales."
It is doubtful, too, if the country will ever know positively whether Jesse W. Smith, the "Damon-and-Pythias friend" of Attorney-General Harry M. Daugherty, was the arch conspirator and villain he has been painted by other witnesses before congressional committees.

Smith has been accused of being a "shake-down man" in half a hundred cases involving everything from whiskey withdrawals to air craft sales to a foreign government. Smith killed himself a year ago in Attorney-General Daugherty's apartment at the Wardman Park Hotel. He was a red-faced, jovial chap and was known for his almost dog-like devotion to Attorney-General Daugherty. They had been friends for years. The reason for his suicide has never been explained other than the customary reason of "ill health."

Gaston B. Means testified that Smith collected \$100,000 from a Japanese agent, representing the Mitsui company, a Japanese banking firm that financed the Standard Aircraft Corporation. The government at the time was suing the Standard Aircraft Corporation for several millions of dollars in a war-fraud case. The inference was that the money was paid to stop the suit.

It is doubtful if Means' story can ever be proved. Similarly, it is doubtful if it can ever be positively disproved. Means said he collected the money from the Japanese and gave it to Smith. The Japanese were unnamed. The man who holds the key to this sensational story, Smith, is dead. And dead men tell no tales.

There have been literally a thousand and one sensational rumors and like insinuations afloat in Washington since this era of investigation began in December. Some of them have been proved, others disproved but it is probable the vast majority of them never will be flatly proved or disproved, but left to float and float around the streets and clubs of the capital until they will be accepted or rejected merely by the passage of time and its mellowing influences.

BROCCOLI SUIT IS
DECIDED AT ROSEBURG

ROSEBURG, April 1.—The suit of the Umpqua Broccoli exchange to enjoin the Umpqua Valley Broccoli Growers from the use of the corporation name, alleging that it infringed upon the corporate name of the plaintiffs, was decided today by Judge Hamilton in favor of the defendants. Judge Hamilton held that the words "Umpqua" and "Broccoli" are geographical and generic and may be used in combination by any corporation unless fraud may be shown. The case has attracted much interest in this locality, as the two concerns handle practically all of the broccoli from the Umpqua valley.

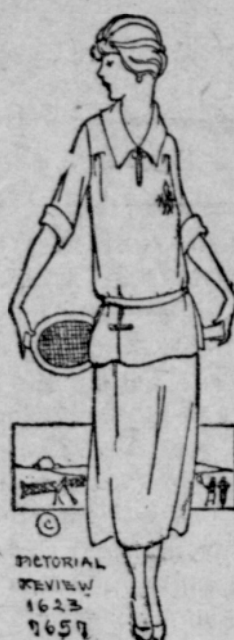
