PERFECT THE BONUS BILL

If the senate is already dedicated to a proposition that it must pass a bonus bill which the president will veto and which will not be able to survive the veto on its re-appearance in congress, it is of not particular importance whether the measure is soundly drawn or otherwise.

If, however, the senate is inclined to adopt the house measure without material change and it begins to appear either that the executive will not veto the proposal or that the bill may be passed over executive disapproval, it is most important that the measure be thoughtfully constructed.

In this connection the sensible suggestion is made that the house measure may be substantially improved in one respect. Among its provisions is none which would cover payment of the face value of the policy to the insured if he becomes totally disabled before the expiration of the endowment period. This is a common feature of contracts issued by private companies, and is certainly in accord with the main attention of thoughtful proponents of a soldiers' bonus.

The intention should be to supply the service man with funds when the necessity is greatest. An able-bodied young man now needs a bonus less than he will when he arrives at middle age. But, too, he will never need funds more than he would if he were totally and permanently incapacitated for self-support. A provision covering this contingency would improve the House measure considerably and would be in complete accord with the sentiment of those who regard the measure favorably.

IMPROVE THE DRIVEWAYS

The movement initiated by the Women's Civic Improvement Club looking to the improvement and beautifying of Winburn way and the grounds surrounding the Civic Club House is worthy of the united support of all the organizations to which the appeal will be forwarded. Simultaneously with this action on the part of the well known civic organization, Mrs. Barber, member of the city council proposes that the driveway through Lithia park from the fountain to the intersection of Granite street be improved with proper lights. The two proposed improvements are closely allied and if completed will combine in adding to the general beauty of the combined park and Civic Club grounds.

Both improvements are all but demanded. Winburn way is decidedly unattractive compared to the beautiful grounds to which it leads. Not only should it be improved in many ways but there are along its route a few privately-owned eye-sores which owners should either improve or destroy. Civic pride should prompt this action.

The drive leading through the park from the fountain to the intersection of Granite Street calls for criticism only in that it is poorly lighted. The drive is subjected to heavy traffic during the nights of summer months and safety, as well as beauty, demands that it be properly lighted, and while the improvement is being made it is well to combine beauty with the lighting arrangement.

The Civic Club and Councilwoman Barber have taken the initiative in this important matter and the Tidings is confident in the belief that they will receive the substantial support of the city council, The Kiwanis, Chamber of Commerce, and Lithians. The proposed improvements are important in the general program of making Ashland a city beautiful.

GROWTH OF CHRISTIANITY

The religious controversy between the modernists and fundamentalists precipitated vague reports that the church-going population was in rapid decline. That the contrary is true is not known better than by the million of church members in the United States.

An Eastern clergyman discloses that at the time of the American Revolution there was only one professed Christian in Princeton University and two in Harvard University. Today nine-tenths of the university and college students of both sexes are members of some Christian church.

Diminishing church rolls are almost unknown in the United States, while millions of dollars are expended annually for new church edifices in the cities, towns and rural section of the country. Every denomination is annually reporting increased national memberships.

Evidence of the stability of the church in America may be found in the general financial status. There has been a decisive increase in the salary standards of the ministry. Church buildings are better maintained and more luxuriously furnished. A few years ago only the

most exclusive churches could afford paid choristers, pipe organs and skilled organists. Today these are not uncommon in the smaller towns and are customary in the smaller cities.

Whatever the present ecclesiastical debate may have done for good or evil, it manifestly has not detracted from church attendance.

O. AND C. LAND GRANTS

A matter of great significance to Jackson county has escaped the attention of all but the very few men who make it a business to stand guard for us. Teapot Dome, high school basketball, and spring models in hats and automobiles consume our attention so that such big things as senate bills Nos. 2751 and 2752, introduced by our Senator McNary, has received little notice.

These bills provide for the appraisal of all O. and C. land grant tracts within the boundaries of national forests. The appraisal will be at soil value only and the cost will be borne by the federal government. The acreage involved includes also large tracts from the Coos bay land grants. These land grants are forfeited because of certain failures in observance of the original terms of the grant.

Four hundred seventy thousand and ninety-five acres are involved in Jackson county; 318,661 acres being classified as non-timber land and 160,434 as timber land. Jackson county now contains 592,777 acres of national forest land, so that the forfeited grant lands will add practically 80 per cent to the forest lands within our boundaries.

What does this mean to Jackson county? Merely this: That under the statutes governing the administration of national forests, Jackson county will derive 35 per cent of all gross income derived from this immense timber area, 25 per cent accruing directly to the county for road and school purposes and 10 per cent for the development of forest roads within the boundaries of the county.

A rough estimate makes pleasant reading, indeed. Placing the county's equity at \$1 per board foot (a conservative figure) and estimating the annual logging from this area at 125,000,000 board feet per annum forever, the income applicable to roads and schools in Jackson county will total approximately \$140,000 a year. This figure is based upon present lumber prices, though they will certainly increase. And remember, it represents a perpetual income for Uncle Sam is going to harvest his remaining timber as a crop, not squander it like a profligate heir.—Medford Mail Tribune (Craters' Edition).

OLYMPIA, Wash., April 4.—Total bond and warrant debt of the 210 cities and towns of the state of Washington, as of December 21, 1932, was \$95,148,543.63, according to the report compiled by Al Helander, inspector of the division of municipal corporations, made public today.

Interest paid for the same year on this aggregate of municipal indebtedness was \$4,566,444.10.

The total is divided into classifications of indebtedness as follows: General bonds, \$32,539,080; interest paid, \$1,535,850.94; revenue bonds, being municipal utilities bonds backed by the revenues of the utility, \$35,917,328.07; interest for the year being \$1,844,006.17; local improvement district bonds and warrants, \$2,880,997.84; interest for 1932, \$96,508.21.
