MILTON DENTIST PLEADS GUILTY TO ARSON

PENDLETON, April 4.—Dr. J. C. Kenyon, Milton dentist, entered a plea of guilty to a charge of arson yesterday in circuit court and then made an application for a parole. Judge Phelps declined to grant the parole but allowed the defendant more time to prepare a further plea.

Dr. Kenyon was charged with having set fire to the office of Dr. A. D. Woodmansee in Milton on the evening of January 31. A confession of his act was obtained by the state fire marshal and the district attorney. The grand jury that indicted Dr. Kenyon and R. I. Keator, district attorney, recommended a parole for the defendant.

WASHINGTON, April 3.—Tradition and Precedent—those twin beings that used to rise forbiddingly in the pathway of new members of the senate and block their progress toward achievement and recognition in the early days of their service—are now staggering around, groggy and gasping for breath, in the 63th Congress.

A complete knockout seems not far distant. And that is a picture that brings tears to the eyes of the olders and convulsive clutches at beards grown gray in the Most Exclusive Club in the World. Loud are the lamentations and shrill are the protests.

Time was, and not far distant either, when a new senator was purely an ornament around the Capitol for the first few years of his service. New senators, like college freshmen, were to be seen and not heard, and infractions of this rule were met with a hazing from the old "uns that was so

Brunhilde's Battle Cry from "Die Walkure"—Wagner

The Walkure (Valkries) were warlike daughters of the Norse God, Wotan according to the story of the opera. Brunhilde was one of the daughters. In this cry which she sings thru her winged horse. Then there is Smith Wildman Brookhart (R.), of Iowa. He came to Washington prepared to tell Congress and the country plenty, and he has been doing it ever since. He has been active in every sort of agricultural legislation, has fought the administration whenever it pleased him, which was generally, and he has told the world at every opportunity that the country is going to perdition in a hack unless it does something for the farmers of the West, who produce the food.

There are plenty of others, both Democratic and Republican freshmen, who have taken the bit in their teeth and figuratively ran away with the Senate of the sixtieth congress.

There is Dill, of Washington, for instance. He is a Democrat. He has been an able lieutenant of Wheeler's in pushing the scandal-probes.

A horse of a slightly different color, but still a colt, is Bruce (D.), of Maryland. New senators usually "go along" with their party at first to establish their party standing and in deference to the superior learning and more extensive experience that the leaders are supposed to possess. Did Bruce? He did not. He has voted against the Democrats more often than with them, has spoken when he felt like it, and, consequently occupies a position in the senate today that more nearly approaches complete independence than any other member, save possibly La Follette.

Two Farmer-Labor members from Minnesota—Magnus Johnson and Hendrik Shipstead—have made their presence felt. Shipstead, for instance, went on the powerful senate committee on Foreign Relations, a post that is eagerly sought and virtually never given to a new member.

The freshmen are in the saddle in Washington—for the time being, at any rate. Their elders are amazed, incredulous and seemingly helpless.
