But because a man refuses to undergo the test, shall that qualify his guilt?

Dr. House realizes it would be difficult to convict under such circumstances, and thus his brain-child, regardless of whether the injection is made voluntarily by the prisoner or through some trickery, will invariably result in endless litigation—unless protected by law.

There is a goal of \$25,000 for the farmers of east Texas to strive for in the 1924 tilling of their land, and it goes to those who produce the best yields on any five acres of cotton, any three acres of corn, or any two acres of peanuts during the ensuing season.

For several years farmers in the Tyler trade territory have found added inducement for greater production in the reward offerings of Tyler merchants.

Approximately 400 farmers compete annually for these prizes, and the vast increase in production throughout the territory in these three commodities during recent years is attributed directly to this ever-existent competitive spirit.

G. M. Adams, planter, accomplished an unparalleled record in 1923, when his five select acres yielded eight bales of cotton. The achievement, to the uninitiated, may be made more cognizant with the knowledge that half a bale to an acre, and frequently but a quarter of a bale, is considered average production.

NEW DIRECTOR AND COACH AT O. A. C.

Kern Heads Physical Education; Schissler to Handle Varsity Football.

Not only a new football coach but a new director of physical education for men has been named at O. A. C. to succeed R. B. Ruthford. The new coach is Paul J. Schissler of Lombard college, Galesburg, Ill., and the new director is W. A. Kearns, director of recreation extension at Oakland Cal.

Schissler comes to the college on a three year contract at \$5500 the first year and \$6000 thereafter, to be paid by student fees and gate receipts with an alumni contribution. He is on a twelve months basis and will not only coach varsity football but assist in other sports and intramural athletics. He has studied coaching under Knute Rockne and uses a modified Notre Dame system of play. Lombard has cleaned up on all contenders in the three years under Schissler except the mighty Notre Dame itself and Detroit university. It scored 800 points against 69 for all its opponents in 24 games during the period.

"Bud" Kearns will have supervision of all work in physical education including intercollegiate athletics as well as intramural sports and gymnasium courses. He enjoys a wide reputation for ability and integrity and has the best of standing as an official in sports and games. He officiated in the O. A. C.-California game the last year of Joe Pipal's connection with the college.

The new director has been in close touch with the California and Stanford systems of intercollegiate athletics for several years and understands them thoroughly. He was closely associated with the very latest in physical education, training and sports as a member of the executive committee of the physical directors' society of the Y. M. C. A. of North America.

McNARY-HAUGEN BILL HAS BEEN AMENDED

Congressman Believes All Legitimate Criticism Met; Predicts Undivided Support.

WASHINGTON, April 6.—Criticism of the McNary-Haugen Export Corporation Bill by the country elevator operators and cooperative associations has resulted in several amendments which will become evident when debate is opened in the House and Senate, according to Representative John W. Summers, chairman of the Export League. Every legitimate criticism from these sources has been met, he declares, to the end that the bill should hereafter receive undivided support from every section of the country.

"Under the McNary-Haugen bill as amended the result will be to put prices for farm products on a basis equaling prices for other commodities," said Mr. Summers, "without interfering with the present system of marketing. The elevator operator will continue his services just as at present, except that his business will be somewhat more secure, and legitimate profits more certain, through the price stabilizing influence of the government agency. The dealer and the miller also will benefit through the elimination of wide fluctuations, which under present conditions may occur at any time to disrupt the industry."

"Cooperative organizations, under amendments which are being added, are even more thoroughly protected than in the original draft of the bill. They should receive great organization impetus from the passage of the measure, which will bring many millions of dollars to their farmer members. "As the bill now stands, every element of the farm marketing structure is protected in its legitimate operation which, of course, is the only phase worthy of attention. The machinery for segregating surplus products from those domestically consumed remains untouched, with the arrangement for establishing domestic prices on a fair basis irrespective of world's prices. In other words, the amended McNary-Haugen Bill means revival of farm prosperity, while at the same time protecting the interests of other legitimate businesses and industries throughout the country. It is the one measure now before Congress which completely and justly meets the agricultural situation."

Health Hints
by the
Father of
Physical Culture

If any one of the spinal vertebrae is displaced in the slightest degree, it very often presses upon the spinal cord or impinges either the motor or sensory nerve which emerges from the spinal cord at that point, and as a result, some part of the body is affected by this pressure. Paralysis, for instance, can be easily caused, by pressure of this kind. Even where the complaint is not of such a serious nature, a comparatively slight amount of pressure affecting one or more nerves is liable to lessen their efficiency and thus cause partial paralysis, and so prevent the particular part to which the nerves are connected from working properly.

Straightening the spine will therefore, as you can readily realize, remedy serious defects of this nature. In fact, this is the theory upon which osteopaths largely proceed. They maintain that a properly formed spine is absolutely necessary to the enjoyment of the highest degree of health, and that if any of your organs is not properly performing its functions, the cause can, in practically every case, be located in the spine. When one or more of the vertebrae are misplaced or pressing upon the nerves within the spinal column, they are lessening the efficiency of the particular parts controlled by these nerves.

Now in moving the body in any direction, there is a certain amount of movement of the spinal column. Whenever you move in any direction, the spinal column bends in accordance with the posture of the body. It is this bending back and forth and from side to side that gives this particular part of the body the necessary use required to keep it in a satisfactory degree of health. The spinal column is bound together with tendinous tissues. Over and over again, these are the muscles that help to hold it in place. The bending of the spine in various directions strengthens not only the ligaments and tendons but the muscles. The proper use of any part of the body adds to its general vigor, and if any of the vertebrae should be misplaced, the vigorous use of the muscles around the spinal column, the strengthening of the ligaments and muscles, finally forces the misplaced vertebrae in its proper position.
