some salaries some of them as much and some more than is provided for either of the 3 commissioners as per the proposed charter.

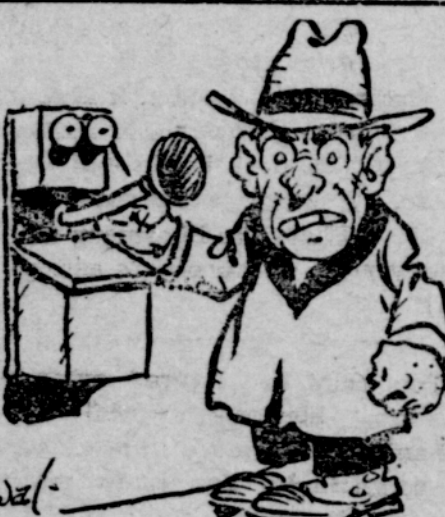
