THE WHEELER INDICTMENT

The announcement of the indictment by a federal grand jury of Senator Wheeler, of Montana, caused a mild sensation. Immediately following the announcement and before time had been available to even learn the bare facts of the case, many newspapers commented editorially on the action, not a few taking the opportunity to condemn the Montana Senator, who has been vigorously pushing the investigation against Ex-Archbishop General Daugherty. This action reveals partisanship stripped of all its apparel and exhibits a spirit of revenge rather than of fairness.

Wheeler is an aggressive man and senator at whom the finger of suspicion has never pointed and fairness demands that judgment be withheld until the facts are brought out from which to form an intelligent and definite conclusion. The policy pursued by Senator Wheeler during his brief membership in the senate has been of value to the nation. He has labored fearlessly to get at the bottom of the rotten mess that has become all but revolting to the rank of American citizens, and he is entitled to the benefit of the doubt until such time as developments warrant otherwise.

The rapidity with which some editors jumped at the Wheeler indictment to even up for the numerous investigations under way at Washington is both amusing and despicable. It is amusing because it brings to the surface partisanship in the extreme. It is despicable because it reveals them as placing party above national principles. They are not interested so much in the graft and corruption that are undermining the manhood and resources of the nation as they are in securing revenge.

The charges against Senator Wheeler deserve to be probed to the bottom and The Tidings sincerely hopes that the investigation will be conducted without hinderance of any kind. Let it be conducted speedily and to a degree of thoroughness that it will reveal Wheeler as he is: a true American and able statesman, or leave him stripped of all glory he has won in his investigation of the conduct of others—a public servant who has betrayed public trust and who deserves to keep lock-step with others of his kind. That he is a democrat makes no difference. If he has been false to the people of Montana and of the nation let him suffer the consequences. Partisanship has no place in the investigation at Washington. The honor of a nation is at stake. The natural resources of the government are in jeopardy. It is a time for Americanism, not partisanship.

WHAT THE PEOPLE WANT

The one thing with which the people of Ashland are mostly interested with respect to the proposed new charter, providing for a commission form of government, is the amount of annual expense it will entail. They want to know to some degree of certainty that the proposed new government will save them money, and as yet there is no assurance, beyond generalities and the mere statement that it will reduce municipal expenses. They do know that the three commissioners provided for to supplant the mayor and six councilmen will cost them \$6,300 a year, or \$5,750 more than we are paying the mayor and councilmen. Here the people have a definite figure with which to deal. Beyond this there is nothing except mere conjecture. The author of the proposed new charter tells us that the saving will be effected in cutting off a long list of elective officers. At the same time his charter provides for a long list of appointive officers. The public knows the salaries being paid present officers. There is no conjecture about this. He also maintains that the municipal government can be conducted with a lesser number of officers. It is true then the city's payrolls are overloaded, and it is a direct challenge to present city officials and employees. But no one will believe that it is possible to prune the present payroll to a figure that will equal the increase which three salaried commissioners entail.

In all the argument advanced in behalf of the proposed new charter no attempt has been made to inform taxpayers what it will cost. Not even an estimate has been presented. While people do not like to deal in estimates in a matter of this kind, it would at least have afforded them some definite ground upon which to base an opinion.

In considering this important matter it is wise to deal in facts and figures, rather than in generalities, promises and insinuations.

"THE DELAY IN TALK"

"What is the nature of the delay?" Senator Smoot was asked when he told President Coolidge there was little chance of the passage of the new revenue law prior to

the congressional recess planned during the national convention period in June.

"The delay is talk," was the senator's reply.

And utterly futile talk, too. Senators and representatives of both parties rise to make personal and political capital out of the disclosures in the many Washington investigations now raging. Common sense would tell them that the public is watching those investigations and at their conclusion will be able to place the credit and blame where each belongs. Windy speeches of explanation, interpretation, criticism and defense on the floors of the two houses will not affect the public's judgment a particle.

The senate and the house can win approval in regular session by taking up regular legislative business and by letting the investigating committees do the investigating work.

SHEIKS AS UNION BREAKERS

Girls will be girls no matter whether they are in trade unions or out of them. Attempts to organize girl workers in Chicago's garment trades have yielded indifferent success. The work was at times checked by federal injunctions prohibiting union activities—some of the writs forbade even communication with workers in non-union shops. Despite those checks the organizers managed to sign about 40 per cent of the girls in non-union dressmaking shops.

But almost overnight the membership dwindled to less than 1 per cent. Union scouts reported that the maidens had been won by the faces and graces of "slick-looking fellows" hired by dress manufacturers. The union-breakers were to mingle with the girl workers, it seems, and, in a friendly way, were to discourage trade unionism. They took the organized girls to parties and to dances on the nights when the union was holding meetings. The girls soon lost interest in affairs of the union.

Meyer Perlstein, vice-president of the union, characterizes the shock troops of the opposition as "sheiks." He sees patent leather shoes protruding from the bell-bottoms of their trousers—non-union flappers, perhaps, to toll the knell of parting unionism. But even so, have they not carried romance to prosaic workrooms? What if a stitch is dropped here and there with thoughts of resplendent Romeos—isn't it worth knowing that though a lily does not toil, it can at least spin a good line?—The Nation's Business.
