ROUTE TOURISTS ALONG COAST OF CALIFORNIA

VISALIA, Calif., April 10.—Tourist travel from Los Angeles north will be diverted via the coast route by the Automobile Club of Southern California, as the result of this recommendation made by the supervisors of Tulare county, acting on the request for advice by the club.

The supervisors pointed out to club officials that every tourist passing north through the San Joaquin Valley will have to stand for inspection and fumigation at least six times, and it was suggested that the tourists would be better off and the counties saved much time and expense if the travel could be diverted up the coast route.

It is also hoped by the county that travel south can be likewise diverted for the time being.

ORE TESTING PLANT

AT GRANTS PASS
GRANTS PASS, April 11.—A modern sampling and ore-testing plant will be erected in Grants Pass, construction to start within a few weeks, according to Henry M. Lancaster, mining engineer. Separate buildings for the office, chemical laboratory, assay office, storeroom, cyanide plant, copper leaching plant and roasting furnace will be built. A five-ton smelting furnace will be built with adequate arrangements for by-products. The plant will be arranged in two units.

more than a memory. What with a growing city pushing over its bounds, with a famous school for boys about to erect a group of buildings near the Mitchell home, and with Yale laying out a group of golf courses where once were woodlands, the property's character is now completely changed.

Donald G. Mitchell, having published "Reveries of a Bachelor" and other books, came out to New Haven, where he had been graduated from Yale years before, and purchased a large tract of land beyond the city in what then seemed hopelessly a rural district. There he settled and farmed many acres and then published "My Farm of Edgewood," a treatise of farming that in 1863 had already run into eight editions and since has become an American classic.

Writing under the name of "Ik Marvel," Donald G. Mitchell soon acquired an international reputation. His literary works mounted to many volumes, and their circulation ran into large figures. His profits, apparently were put into the Edgewood Farm, and that institution flourished and became one of the show places of New England. When Mitchell died, in 1908, the farm was gradually sold off, and today a full on-half—then of level, fertile fields—is criss crossed with streets lined with expensive homes and public buildings. A population of 10,000 is living today where grain fields flourished under the Mitchell regime, and the uplands look across a city of 200,000 now, where they saw a town of 40,000 in the old days.

The first of the exclusive Yale golf courses will be ready for use in the fall of 1925. Charles McDonald and Seth Raynor, of Southampton, L. I., are the architects. Some 300 acres of land were purchased more than a year ago and given to Yale as a memorial to Ray Tompkins, late of Elkhart, N. Y., who in his day was a famous Yale athlete. The tract is known and will be known as Tompkins Memorial Field. In its heart is a wee lake that makes an acceptable outdoor swimming pool in summer and a skating rink in winter. On one shore a large club house is to be built, and from the house will radiate three 90-acre golf courses, to be finished one after the other in rapid succession.

Along with the golf courses, the tract is to be laid out in sites for homes for Yale's faculty, who will thus get all the rural advantages possible.

Within the bounds of the Mitchell farm is to be located the new home of Hopkins Grammar School, second oldest educational institution in New England and "Mother of Yale," for Hopkins came many years before Elihu Yale and made those gifts that caused his name later to be added to that of the College of New Haven and so formed Yale College. This school has been in continuous existence since 1659, and

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after Yale was moved to the city of New Haven, in 1702, Hopkins continually prepared her students for the college.

"Tossed from pillar to post," Hopkins now is to be definitely located on an elevation westward of the city center and adjoining Yale's football bowl, baseball field, track and tennis courts on one side and the golf links on the other. Many thousands of dollars have been collected for the new plant, which is to rise from its own campus, with work starting in the present summer.
