IT IS TIME FOR ACTION

The announcement that states of the Northwest are to be asked to co-operate in requesting the federal government for aid in preventing the spread of the hoof and mouth disease from California into Oregon and adjoining states comes none too soon. We know that conditions in California have not been magnified, and it is doubtful if real conditions have been revealed outside the borders of that state. It is evident to all who have been following the progress of the dread disease that efforts to cope with it have failed, and instead of being confined to the district in which it first appeared it has spread to other districts and has been sweeping northward. That it is high time for the residents of Oregon and other states of the Northwest to become alarmed at the situation is attested by the action of the counties along the northern border of California. They have adopted quarantine measures, and despite the pleadings of their neighbors on the south they refuse to budge one inch or modify a single restriction. They are not, however, requiring the fumigation of automobiles and pets as they pass through en route to the Oregon line. They are centering most of their efforts to prevent the driving and shipping of livestock into their borders. In this they are affording protection to Oregon, but their restrictions are not far-reaching in their effects.

Hyman E. Cohen, whom many recognized as the best informed market reporter in Oregon, states that livestock are being "bootlegged" into Oregon from California. Cohen is not a man given to wild statements, and if there is any foundation for his announcement it is highly important that a patrol be thrown along the entire border of southern Oregon.

The Tidings believes that the State Livestock Sanitary board, which has established a disinfecting station and guards on the Pacific highway south of here is determined to do a thorough job in so far as it goes. They are compelling the disinfection of all automobile and vehicle tires and pets, such as dogs, cats and birds. But no provisions are made for the disinfecting of baggage and other luggage that may be carried in automobiles and trucks. It seems now that the work has been initiated that the force should be increased to a degree that fumigating may be made thorough and cover every article through which the disease may be carried. The increased cost will be slight, and will insure a thorough job.

If the total damage that is resulting in California were announced it would be appalling. The loss in cattle, hogs and sheep that have been led into the trenches and shot totals more than \$1,000,000, possibly \$2,000,000. Creameries of the state are suffering severe losses. Butcher shops and packing plants are losing thousands of dollars daily, and it is not unreasonable to assume that fruit and vegetable growers are suffering a loss, equal to, if not greater, than that of the livestock owners. The end is not yet. Two months have elapsed since the disease was first announced in that state and conditions are worse today than then.

Oregon can not afford to run the slightest risk of the malady reaching the herds within its borders. Immediate and thorough action may be the means of saving millions of dollars to the state, for it must be remembered that it is not the livestock owner alone who suffers. An embargo on all California produce coming from the farming and orchard districts is demanded. Disinfecting stations should be equipped to do their work thoroughly, and the border patrolled effectively.

A FAMILY OF EIGHTEEN CHILDREN

The recent issue of the Southern Pacific Bulletin, a publication devoted to its employees, contains an interesting picture and account of the family of Frank Domingo, a car builder in the shops at Sacramento, who is the father of 18 children, 16 of whom are living. Nor is the account confined to the father alone. Mrs. Domingo receives her full share of credit. The picture reveals a well-dressed, fine looking family of 16 children.

The story relates that of the 16 children only three are married, the 13 remaining children all residing within the walls of the Domingo home, which is described as a comfortable seven-room residence and is owned by the parents.

The family presents a splendid lesson in thrift. The children have not been accorded the highest educational advantages, but all whose years permit have completed the public school course. The question that comes with the force of a pile driver, is: "how did they do it?" The bread winner has been with the Southern Pacific since 1905, and his wages doubtless do not exceed eight dollars per day. If Domingo will impart his secret to the world he will receive the heart-felt gratitude of millions of hard working fathers and mothers.

The Sacramento family recalls the big families of a few generations back. Not long ago the family of from eight to fourteen children was not exceptional. They were the rule rather than the exception, and although it was an age in the country's history when wages and produce were at a low level they managed to get along somehow, and many of them became the most prosperous families in the country. The age of big families also recalls an age of happy families, of devoted fathers and mothers and loving and obedient children. There were fewer divorces and fewer broken homes. It is said, and was said then, that the family of many children was conducive to happiness and prosperity. Perhaps the condition still prevails, but the average man drawing wages of from three to six dollars a day would not care to assume the responsibility of a family of 16 children. Nor would the mother.

GRADING IS ESSENTIAL

Better grading of products raised in this county are necessary if the products are to find a market locally or at outside points. Commission merchants and others have long complained of the way in which Josephine county products were received. They were of varying quality and were not packed well. There has been a movement toward a standard grade in packing of fruits and vegetables but this has not yet advanced to the point where complaints can be eliminated. The grape growers solved their problem by organizing and specifying what should constitute a standard pack.

There is still room for improvement in the livestock production. A local meat firm found that 40 per cent of the stock offered them had not been finished off right, and would not do for meat. The purchase was therefore refused. In some instances these were turned back to build up to a point where they could be used. In other instances, where they had already been killed, the meat was peddled. This firm deplored the fact that such methods of production were being pursued, which at best was only 60 per cent efficient. This same firm turned back \$80,000 to Jackson and Josephine livestock growers for their product.

Standardization of production and pack is essential. It is the only way that agriculture will ever be a success in this valley.—Grants Pass Courier.

ORDERS SALE OF TRACTS

SALEM, April 11.—Approximately 2600 acres of land included in the Deschutes county municipal improvement district will be opened to entry and sale within the next few days as the result of a decision reached at a meeting of the desert land board this afternoon. It was said that the price of land will be fixed at approximately \$70 an acre. Proposed contracts to be entered into between the district and the prospective settlers were approved by the board.

Application for patent to the lands has been prepared and will be sent to Washington for approval of the government officials.
