TIME AND CHANCE

There is a destiny which shapes our ends and our lives, but what a frail and inconspicuous destiny it is! One little incident may change the whole tenor of a life, has made a success out of a failure and has given fame and even immortality.

Joseph Conrad, greatest present-day writer of sea stories, became a "sea-rover" because his first books as a Polish boy were of the sea and exploration. What might he have been as a man if his library as a boy had been other than it was?

Benjamin Franklin followed a vague inclination to ship from Boston to Philadelphia and became Pennsylvania's leading citizen of his time, the spokesman for the American colonies and an immortal figure in American history. Who can account for the chance dig of the spade which uncovered the tomb of Tutankhamen, the fortunate discovery of the first oil well at Titusville, Pa., and the gold nugget which precipitated the rush of the Forty-Niners to California?

Many of us can place our fingers on one happening, perhaps accidental which was the deciding factor in the determination of our life's work. A chance perusal of the classified advertising page of a newspaper has been the deciding factor for thousands. Such a thing as a news item has been known to serve as the one break in the wall of the rut.

When Elbert Hubbard wrote that "Man should follow the dictates of his passions" he did not mean that he should give full play to his desires, but that the subconscious inclinations of man are sooner to be obeyed than the subconscious inclinations of man are sooner to be obstacle-finding, inspiration-dampening, deliberation.

THE SHORTER WORKDAY

Adoption of the eight-hour day by the steel industry was welcomed by all, but the consequences at one time only conjectural are now becoming known. It might be well to say that after several months of a uniform eight hour day in the steel mills nobody concerned recommends or considers a reversion to the former 12-hour shift.

Labor, capital and public opinion have abolished forever in the United States the 12-hour day because they had found from years of experience that it was not efficient, humane and conducive to healthy and happy workers, industrial peace or industrial progress.

Even before the general adoption of the eight-hour day there was agitation among some divisions of labor for a six-hour day and even a four-hour day. Until society shut the poor houses to able-bodied men there was even sentiment for a day of no working hours.

To little work will tear down the physical, spiritual and mental fibre of society with greater rapidity than too much work. The North American countries are the most moral, progressive, healthful and contented in the world because their people have the least leisure. In some of the more exhaustive occupations a short working day may be found expedient. In these occupations as in all others the will to work should not be curbed and the limits to man's energy should not be ignored. The working day should be determined on a scientific basis.

Men and women who accomplish the great things of life are those who complain of the day's brevity, not of its length.

FOREST GROWTH MUST BE QUADRUPLED

American lumber consumers must realize that the "wolf will not be driven from the door of future timber supply, until four times the present annual growth of wood is secured," Colonel William B. Greeley, Government Forester, declares. Enlarging American timber growth from the 14,000,000,000 cubic feet yearly, under crude methods, to the maximum obtainable from the same land by intensive forestry, can be attained eventually under a national forestry program which will include forest investigations of a far-reaching character to develop technical practices.

Because of the great public importance of a broader national forestry policy, affecting industries having an annual output of several billions of dollars a year, and which depend upon forests for their raw material, Colonel Greeley has asked Congress to sanction in every important timber producing region of the United States. Col-

onel Greeley indicates the importance of such research work by citing the annual forest fire loss of \$16,000,000. He is seeking better methods of forest fire control through intensive studies in all important timber growing areas. The McNary-Clarke bill now before Congress seeks to establish a broad national forestry policy.—Research Bureau, National Lumber Manufacturers Association.
