SOFTNESS AND LUXURY

The upholstery trade is encouraged by maintenance of demand for its goods. A few months ago there was some uncertainty on the part of furniture manufacturers as to whether the vogue of luxuriously done pieces had not about run its course. Doubts have been dispelled, however, and the news is out that through the summer at least the public will eagerly buy overstuffed couches and chairs.

If we were asked to make a guess we should say that there is slight chance of a reaction favorable to the hard, springless seats which characterized the furniture gracing our fathers' homes. The people have changed and this explains why furniture styles are so different from those of half a century ago. When straight backed, thinly cushioned chairs and sofas were acceptable the people were more rigid and spare of build. They matched the furniture. Look around you today in the street or where people congregate. What is most striking about them? Next to the incessant chatter among the women about ways to reduce, you notice that the majority are liberally upholstered, not to say overstuffed because the latter is a trade term and as such has no rightful place in social circles.

But returning to the subject of furniture, it is obvious that the luxurious mode of the period will not be displaced with the sanction of a well fed people. They need soft, spring lounges and seats. They fit into them as they could not fit into other kinds. On the aesthetic side, which is not to be ignored wholly, they match.

BRAKES BETTER THAN HORNS

A current joke represents an automobile speeder who had run into a skyscraper building saying with his dying breath, "I blew the horn."

Having chuckled over the whimsy, consider it in the light of daily observations. What is the function of the automobile horn? What does the average driver understand its function to be? Up to a certain point probably all persons would agree on the answers. The horn is intended to give warning of the approach of a car. It is to attract attention of those in the path of the on-coming vehicle and cause them to look to their safety.

But it is not a command to them to get out of the way, though that is what many drivers regard it, if their actions are fair indications of their thoughts. If they get into trouble through insistence on going forward when they should have stopped they strive to exculpate themselves by protesting "I blew my horn."

EXAMINING IMMIGRANTS

Belgium has set a good example to other foreign governments by its decision to make a thorough inspection of all its citizens who leave home with the intention of emigrating to this country and making their homes here. Their physical and mental condition will be examined, as will also their passports and other papers, and no one will be allowed to embark unless a clean bill of health is shown and every requirement of the immigration laws on this side is complied with.

By this wise and provident action much hardship will be spared to intending immigrants. It is notorious that many persons who come from European countries to take up their abode in the United States have to be turned back at the port of entry and prevented from landing on account of physical or mental defects or other causes. The cruel disappointment thus entailed can be almost entirely avoided if the example of Belgium is generally followed.

FROM grace notes to tartlets is a long step but one easily achieved by the versatile prima donna, Dorothy Jordan, who is here shown wielding the rolling pin with the same energy that she puts into her operatic roles. Cream 4 tablespoonfuls of sugar with 4 tablespoonfuls of crisco, then add two eggs well beaten, 1 cupful of flour, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon baking powder, and 1/2 teaspoon lemon extract. Line twelve tartlet tins with the pastry, put a teaspoonful of blackberry jam (to substitute for the blackbirds of the famous nursery rhyme) in each, and bake in a moderately hot oven 20 minutes. This is sufficient for twelve tartlets, which Miss Jordan avers are dainty enough "to set before a king."

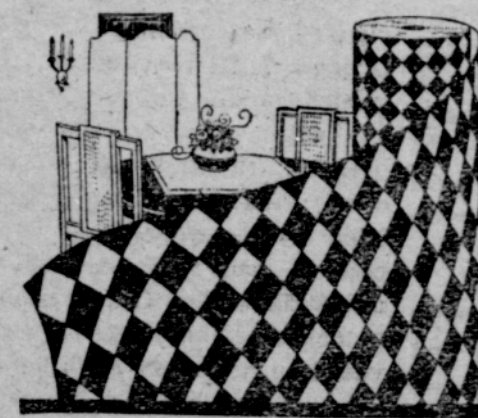

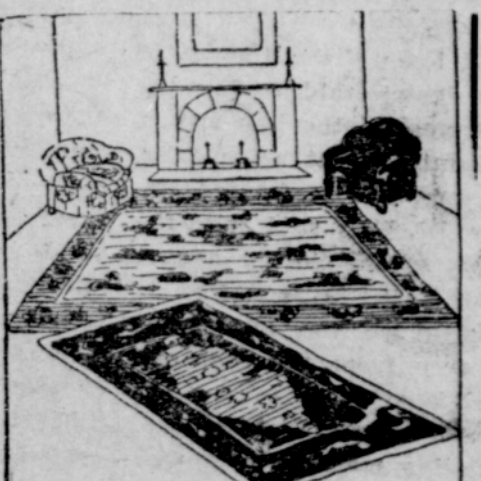
