Tuesday's meeting at the Civic Club was one of the important meetings of the year's program—for at this time was given the illustrated lecture "Birds of the Pacific Coast" by Mr. Willard Ayres Elliot of Portland, an authority on bird life.

After the usual reports, plans for the Southern Oregon District Federation Meeting were discussed and committees appointed by the president, Mrs. Tomlinson.

The hostesses for both forenoon and afternoon sessions of May third's meeting were named; Mrs. Crandall, Mrs. H. E. McGee, and Mrs. J. P. Dodge to act in the forenoon, and Mrs. Perozzi, Mrs. P. K. Hammond and Mrs. T. H. Simpson as hostesses for the afternoon.

At the conclusion of the business session the speaker of the afternoon was introduced.

In prefatory remarks Mr. Elliot told of his work in Portland, of the effort it was to keep his ap-

pointment here; how much he thought of Ashland, and its surroundings, and the serious thought he entertained of making this his home at a future time.

Bird life in general was discussed—from a sentimental and an economic standpoint. Facts that should be known to everyone especially those bent on destroying birds about their wonderful economic value were given.

Their importance in relation to agriculture, to the orchardists, to various industries, was stressed. Scotland's experience was cited as was Pennsylvania's, in which man in trying to adjust succeeded in unbalancing to a most harmful degree.

That many of the laws passed had been for a purely selfish purpose and cited the case of one of our prettiest of water birds—the "Water ouzel" in point. (The water ouzel is one of the delightful sights in Ashland creek.)

Mr. Elliot referred to his work as a "popular" bird study rather than "scientific," but to the interested listener it appears that he possesses a fund of scientific knowledge as well as speaking the language that all can understand.

Of the 20,000 species of birds, there are 1200 in the U. S. and 400 of these are to be found in Oregon. He stated that in a radius of ten miles square, 150 kinds could be found but the startling statement was also made that few could actually say that they knew over nine kinds.

As Mr. Elliot talked, he showed a wonderful set of pictures of Oregon birds.

Space forbids giving even the barest outline of the splendid lecture with its beautiful and artistic accompaniment of pictures of our feathered friends.

One hundred slides of Oregon birds were shown, a great many of them found right about us, if one but knew enough to identify them.

The speaker spent all the time of the social hour answering questions from his interested auditors until he had to take his train.

His morning had been spent in giving the High School an opportunity to benefit by seeing the pictures and hearing the splendid talk.

The Girls' Chorus from Junior High came in time to hear much of the lecture, at the close of which, they delighted the audience by singing a number of songs in an especially pleasing and finished manner.

It is a regrettable fact that but few heard this delightful lecture, but those there, made up in enthusiasm, the lack of numbers.
