EMBARGO COMMITTEES

NAMED IN CALIFORNIA

SACRAMENTO, April 17.—In less than twenty-four hours after a plan of action had been mapped out by a conference of citizens representing agricultural, industrial and commercial interests of the state, Governor Richardson yesterday named the committees which are to visit the national capital and several of the western states with the object of obtaining co-operation in quarantine measures which will harmonize embargoes placed on California products because of the foot and mouth disease.

The governor in making up the personnel of the committees was guided by the recommendations of the state department of agriculture.

OREGON AGGIES OUT TO WIN 4-MILE RELAY

Four Mile Runners En Route East to Compete at Lawrence and Drake.

PORTLAND, April 17.—The Oregon aggies are out to win the four-mile relay inter-collegiate championship this spring.

Four sterling distance men—Ray Dodge, Art Walker, George Graves and Mor Mason—are en route to Lawrence, Kan., and Des Moines, Ia., today they will compete at Lawrence against runners from most of the middle-west universities, including Kansas, Nebraska, Missouri, Illinois, Iowa, Minnesota and others of the Missouri valley.

On April 25 and 26 the Aggie mllers will run in the Drake relays.

Mike Butler, veteran trainer, believes the team has an excellent chance to win. He states that Ray Dodge, Pacific Coast half mile champion is in his opinion the best distance runner since Lightbody, who won the half-mile and two-mile races at the Olympic meet.

Workouts have been arranged at Nampa, Idaho on the way east and at Denver, Colo.

TRIAL POSTPONED ON ACCOUNT OF ILLNESS

PORTLAND, April 18.—The trial of H. J. Overturf and three others charged with the use of the mails to defraud in connection with the Bend soldier bonus cases, again has been postponed. The case was scheduled to go on trial today but because of the congested condition of the docket it was set for next Monday.

STOLEN SAFE FOUND

AT MOUNTAIN TOP

NAPA, Calif., April 18.—A safe weighing 300 pounds taken from the McPherson oil station at Sausalito and carried through the Napa valley to a point near the top of Mount St. Helena, was discovered Sunday by Mr. and Mrs. T. J. Kellar of Vallejo, who were penkling in that vicinity.

Kellar, a machinist employed on Mare Island, found the safe while he was crossing a ravine, several hundred yards from the highway.

While the bandits stole \$500 in cash, they left \$50 in script books and \$130 in checks. Entry was made into the safe by boring a hole through the back.

FIFTY SCOTTISH RITE MASONS ATTEND EVENT

Approximately 50 Scottish Rite Masons met at Hotel Medford last night to observe the Maunday-Thursday banquet and program held annually by Scottish Rite bodies. Following the banquet at 6:30, Rev. W. Judson Oldfield spoke on "The American Ideals as Embodied in the Scottish Rite." The assemblage petitioned the Supreme Council of the 33d degree of the Southern Jurisdiction of Scottish Rite, at Washington D. C. for a dispensation in order that a Chapter of the Rose Croix may be installed in southern Oregon. This body is the next higher step above the Lodge of Perfection and is open to 33d degree Masons.

The measure will be referred to the voters of the state at the general election in November. The initiators of the measure include Josephine M. Othus, W. E. Richardson and A. N. Searle, all of Portland.

EXTENSION OF MAINS

MEDFORD, April 18.—The city water commission has just begun work of laying 4000 feet of 10-inch pipe to extend from Siskiyou Heights south of the city and to connect with the main water system, to be rushed through if possible before the irrigation season begins, as it is claimed this extension will give increased pressure and augment the city's water supply.

commercial organizations of Oregon, and in many districts the chambers are meeting on friendly terms and discussing the possibilities of developing Oregon and of providing a better market for our crops.

Mayor Baker discussed the demand that is being made for the state to establish offices in other big cities of the country with a view to attracting investors and home-seekers. In commenting on Oregon's splendid road system, he said: "Oregon has expended \$82,000,000 on her roads and highways, but because of a lack of advertising we are not attracting a sufficient number of people. We must not only induce people to come, but we must offer them something worth while, create within them the desire to become permanent residents, and make them glad that

they visited the Golden West."

CALIFORNIA PIONEER OF '49 DIES IN SOUTH

SACRAMENTO, Calif., April 17.—Born in a covered wagon while his parents were crossing the plains in 1849, Joseph Brown, aged 75 years, one of the few remaining California forty-niners, died yesterday in Los Angeles.

The Brown family arrived at Sutter Fort in Sacramento on September 15th, 1849, and remained in this vicinity until 1852, when it moved to San Bernardino County. Brown's father, John Brown, was a noted frontiersman.

SOME DISTRICTS REPORT FRUIT CROP DAMAGED

GRESHAM, Or., April 17.—Severe damage to fruit crops was reported to have been done throughout this section by yesterday's hard snow and sleet storm. The ground was covered with an icy mantle and this, combined with a heavy frost this morning, was believed to have caused extensive damage.

Reports from Troutdale, Sandy and adjacent districts were that the damage there was equally severe. The blossoms on the fruit trees were beaten off in many instances by the sleet and blossoms not destroyed this way began dropping off today as a result of the frost early this morning.
