## LONG LIFE

There used to be considerable doubt whether it was possible for a human being to live for a century. Reports of centenarians were not convincing to people with a taste for statistics and documentary evidence. That doubt, however, has been pretty well swept away. Recently there have been a lot of news items about people alive or departed from life at anywhere from one hundred to one hundred and thirty-six years of age.

Most of these very likely have been exaggerated tales, based as usual on tradition and unintentional distortion. But many of them seem beyond controversy. Among the latter may be set the latest case, that of a West Virginia farmer, who, according to the family record was born in Scotland in 1796.

It will be observed, however, that practically all of these instances of extreme longevity have to do with people living simple, plain uneventful lives, so far removed from the world of action and progress that no attention is paid to them until their death. Really, is a long life so greatly to be desired when it can be said that the most important part of it is its end?

Far more desirable seems the ideal represented by the deathbed words of Theodore Roosevelt who finished his course at an age comparatively early, "I have had a full life and a happy one." Properly estimated, Roosevelt lived longer than any score of these vaunted centenarians put together.

## COMMERCIAL FAILURES DUE TO AGRICULTURAL DISTRESS

Commercial failures during the first quarter of 1924 continued at the rate of 22,000 a year. The number reported in March was 1,817, the largest monthly total, with the exception of January and December last, since the end of 1922. In the quarter ended with March, 1924, the failures were 5,655, a total which has been exceeded only four times in the history of the country.

To a great extent these failures are traceable to the distress in the agricultural sections of the country. Hundreds of thousands of people on farms are reduced to insolvency and their importance as consumers has greatly diminished. The detrimental consequences of this poverty among the agricultural producers are spreading in to other lines of business.

## CAUGHT WITH "BLOOD MONEY," WANTS INQUIRY HUSHED

Among the Republican newspapers which are demanding the instant discontinuance of the Senate investigations into the mess of official corruption is the Rocky Mountain News, of Denver, Colorado. This paper, like most of the others which are denouncing the investigations, calls the proceedings "unconstitutional," and asks whether there is "any one in Washington these days with backbone enough to call a halt on the 'rump' court."

Senator Walsh (Dem., Mont.) read into the Congressional Record an editorial published by the Rocky Mountain News and added this comment:

"The Rocky Mountain News, it will be borne in mind, is owned and published by one John C. Shaffer, whom the Committee caught red-handed with \$90,000 of blood money that he got out of the Teapot Dome transaction."

## DEADLOCK IS BROKEN ON McNARY-HAUGEN BILL

WASHINGTON, April 18.—The deadlock, which for three weeks has tied up the house agricultural committee over the provisions of the McNary-Haugen agricultural relief bill was broken today when by a vote of 11 to 9 the committee struck from the bill the "scrip" provision which would give farmers government paper in lieu of cash in the disposal of their crops over the fixed price.

## LEASING GRAVEL BEDS UPHELD BY VAN WINKLE

SALEM, April 18.—Leasing of gravel beds in the navigable streams in Oregon is a matter entirely within the jurisdiction of the state land board, according to a legal opinion prepared here today by I. H. Van Winkle, attorney general.

The opinion was requested by the state fish commission, after complaints had been received that operations on what is known as brickyard drift, in the Columbia river, approximately one mile north of Vancouver, had menaced the fishing ground in that vicinity. It was said that fishermen, cannerymen and other persons interested in preserving the drift as a fishing ground joined in the complaint.

## WALLA WALLA BELIEVES FROST DAMAGE SLIGHT

WALLA WALLA, April 17.—Some damage has been done to early trees and unsmudged prune trees, according to fruit men, but they say that unless there is additional frost the loss will be slight. There will not be need for so much thinning, it is said. Cloudy weather prevented a dangerous drop in temperature last night.

## COMMISSION SETTLES CLAIM FOR INJURY

SALEM, April 18.—The state industrial accident commission yesterday voluntarily awarded \$900 to Benjamin H. Graves, an employee of the Portland Lumber company, in settlement of a claim for a foot injury suffered while he was under the workman's compensation act.

Records in the case show that Graves was injured May 8, 1922, and later was awarded \$240 by the commission. He declared this amount insufficient and subsequently filed suit in the courts to recover from the commission the sum of \$1600. The lower court held for Graves, but the supreme court reversed the decree on the ground that the court in which the suit was started was without jurisdiction.

## KENNETT MAN UNABLE TO IDENTIFY KOPOLAS

FAIRFIELD, Calif., April 18. W. H. Ellis, employed in the mill at the Mammoth Mine at Kennett, was unable to identify John Kopolas, murder suspect held in the county jail here, as the man who worked in the mill for several hours on the day Olea Hamlin was attacked and murdered, and who left the mill to walk to Kennett shortly before the crime was committed. Ellis came here yesterday with Deputy Sheriff H. C. Cann of Sacramento County.

## Hints From a House-Wife's Kitchen Diary



### Good Food for Children and Adults

#### A PRACTICAL ANSWER TO A QUESTIONNAIRE

Some time ago a questionnaire was sent out to housewives in an endeavor to find out how they spent their time. It is to be confessed that in the great majority of cases the inquiry aroused only amused exasperation. Busy! Of course they were busy. Every woman was so busy that she would not take time to answer questions which seemed to lead nowhere.

One woman, however, did take the trouble to fill out the blanks as well as she could and in the space left "observations" said: "As I suppose your object in this investigation is to help women to more leisure by systematizing their work, I wonder you have not asked them what means they have taken to simplify the cleaning-up process after meals. For myself, I am sure I save much time and effort by a judicious choice of cooking utensils."

She was asked for more information on the point she mentioned. Her answer was "enameled ware." This, as easily washed as crockery and practically unbreakable with any kind of care, she had found she could keep spotless and daintily attractive with a minimum of effort. So for once a questionnaire got a practical answer!

#### A SUBSTANTIAL VEGETABLE DISH THAT'S GOOD

An excellent dish for supper is baked eggplant. Pare the eggplant and cut into small cubes. Put in an enameled ware saucepan with a small quantity of hot water. Cover closely and cook for about twenty minutes. Meanwhile, slice a small onion, very thin, and fry in another saucepan until brown. When the eggplant is tender, remove from the fire and add to it the browned onions, half a teaspoonful of salt, and the juice of a lemon. Then butter an enameled ware bake dish; put in a layer of the eggplant and then one of either cracker dust or breadcrumbs until the dish is full, having the cracker dust on top. Add a few dashes of butter to the top and bake in a moderate oven.

## MILLIONS OF SMELT DIE AT SANDY MOUTH

State Game Commission Warned That Situation Must Be Remedied.

PORTLAND, April 18.—Millions of smelt died at the mouth of the Sandy River because they could not get up to their spawning grounds, "A. J. Krueger, of Troutdale, so stated in pointing out that unless steps are taken by the state game commission to remedy the situation the tragedy will be like the tragedy of the buffalo on the great plains.

The smelt lay inches deep along the beach of the Columbia for a mile above and below the Sandy river. Debris gathered in the channel of the Little Sandy early this month and the great smelt migration from the ocean to the Columbia and into the Sandy was halted early this month. Krueger pointed out that it is a natural phenomena, the fame of which has spread over the United States.

## WEED MAN FOUND DEAD IN RENO HOTEL

RENO, Nev., April 18.—William King, until recently a resident of Weed, Cal., was found dead in his room at a local hotel yesterday. The autopsy performed by Dr. J. B. Hardy disclosed death was caused by a ruptured artery of the heart.

King was 40 years old and is said to have left several relatives in California.

#### FOR THE KIDDIES' SUPPER

Children who take cold lunches to school need hot and hearty food at night. Care, however, should be taken to see that the food is digestible as well as substantial in its nature. One mother, whose three thriving children show her good care, contributes this hint.

Try a vegetable soup made with milk. Cook carrots, potatoes, a little onion and a little turnip all together in an enameled ware saucepan until all are very soft. Rub through a colander. Put milk into an enameled ware double boiler. Heat just short of the boiling point, and then stir in the pureed vegetables. Cook slowly in the milk until all is smooth. The soup will not be discolored if it is cooked in enameled ware.

Served with toast or oyster crackers, this soup makes a meal in itself. It is very nourishing and will never give even a delicate child the nightmare, which can be so easily acquired from food too rich or heavy.

#### A HOT DISH FOR A COLD PICNIC

Skating will always hold its own as king of winter sports. Skating picnics are always popular. With vacuum bottles, drinks can be kept so hot that coffee making over a fire is no longer necessary.

A good point, however, is to provide plenty of enameled ware mugs to drink out of. In very good weather metal cups are anything but pleasant and crockery may easily be broken by dropping from chilled fingers.

Should a hot dish, such as baked hash, be desired, cook it in an enameled ware bake dish, cover closely when first taken from the oven and wrap in several newspapers and then in an old blanket or heavy woolen cloth. Guarded this way, it will keep hot for hours.
