In flat foot whenever walking is undertaken in barefoot, or in shoes not properly provided with a braced heel, great care should be taken not to allow the weight of the foot to fall upon the inner edge, even for a moment. A few steps wrong, taken during the early stages of the training, and until the normal strength and elasticity of the inner ligaments are restored, may undo the work of several days. In other words, conscious guidance must be exercised in walking and standing until the foot begins to assume a normal position of its own accord, and then walking with the feet in this position will become unconscious or automatic.

As prevention is better than cure the growing child should be taught to stand and walk properly, so that a correct carriage of the body will be maintained throughout life, thus preventing the development of any tendency to flat foot.

Fall slender children will usually be found to be more subject to flat foot than the opposite type, though it may be found in all types. If any tendency to flat foot develops, it should be taken in hand at once, and vigorous treatment instituted, as to methods of standing and walking, suitable exercises, etc. While proper shoes must be provided to assist in the cure of the defect. The idea that children will naturally "outgrow" habits of this character is erroneous. Not only are they not outgrown in many cases, but they sometimes become more accentuated with age.

The symptoms of flat foot are as follows: The patient begins to feel a discomfort or fatigue and strain about the inner side of the foot and ankle. Sometimes, after long standing, there is a dull ache at the top of the leg, or pain at the knee or hip, or, after overtaxation, a sharp pain, radiating from the point of weakness.

After a time the patient has to ride where he once walked and sit where he formerly stood, caused no discomfort. He cannot run. His feet have lost their spring and are so longer a lever. Very often the heel is painful and sensitive at the centre, and the shoes hurt. Coldness and numbness caused by improper circulation are common.

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OREGON DEATH RATE LOWEST LAST YEAR

City Dwelling Wage Workers Had Mortality of Only 5.1 Per 100.

Oregon showed the lowest death rate in 1933 for its city dwelling wage workers of any of the Pacific Coast states, according to death claim figures just compiled by the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company. The Pacific Coast states had the lowest mortality of any of the larger geographical groups. The death rate among the company's white, industrial policyholders in Oregon was 5.1 per 1,000; that of the Pacific states as a whole 6.9 and from the urban wage-earning group of the United States, 8.2.

The favorable figures for Oregon and Washington reflect the low mortality of a new and prosperous population. The premier position of these states in the insurance figures also reflects the well known facts in the published mortality data of their total populations.
