ASHLAND AND THE CHAUTAUQUA

Since the announcement was made that the Chautauqua Association decided to dispense with the annual Chautauqua program, for this year at least, various citizens have expressed a desire and a willingness to get back into the harness, so to speak, and prevent Ashland being removed from the Chautauqua map, which it has occupied so long and with much prominence. The Tidings appreciates the situation which confronted the officers of the association. There was apparently a lack of outward support on the part of the members a public in general. This discouraged the officers and directors and they were all but forced to assume that Ashland no longer cared to finance and support the Chautauqua, in fact they interpreted the condition as warranting their action. There is, however, in the history of any public association or organization a time when interest lags and indifference makes it difficult to proceed with its endeavor. The Ashland Chautauqua Association has arrived at this stage and it is in an hour that calls for aggression and a fighting spirit on the part of those who recognize the value of a Chautauqua to the town and community, if the association is to continue.

The Tidings is sincere in the belief that the people of Ashland want an annual Chautauqua program, even tho they have not signified by their action that they do. The fact that many are now regretting the condition that caused the association to take the step it did proves this contention, and there is good reason to believe that if all those who are friends of the Chautauqua will get together that this excellent source of information and entertainment can be saved to the community.

Perhaps interest can be renewed through changing the general plan of securing the programs and at the same time create a sinking fund for the local Chautauqua Association. Experience of the past few years has taught the writer that where communities depend on organization that are selling Chautauqua talent that there is rarely ever anything left for the local association. Usually the booking concerns want all the receipts and a little more. The continual fight to meet the demands of the selling agencies and the financial losses that result, serve to kill all the enthusiasm and interest in the good that the Chautauqua is doing. We are informed that for many years Ashland conducted the Chautauqua independently of the organizations that thrive through selling platforms speakers and entertainers, and talent was as good, if not superior, to that furnished by Ellison-White and other like organizations. Perhaps the Chautauqua can be continued by reverting to the original plans.

There is a need and a demand for continuing the Chautauqua in Ashland and The Tidings is confident that if all those who are friends of it will make their desires known and pledge reasonable cooperation that an excellent program can be secured at a convenient time during the spring or early summer. Citizens and business men have indicated as much to the writer, and if the sentiment is at all general we are more than willing to get behind the movement and give it all the support at our command.

THE MUNICIPAL AUTO CAMP

Is the Municipal Auto Camp to become a fixture or are privately owned camps to drive the public motor parks from the Northwest?

"Public versus private ownership of auto camps" occupies the lime light in Portland as a result of the efforts of a group of business men to induce the city to turn over its big auto camp park to them. Municipal ownership has won the first round of the battle. Portland's camp will be maintained by the city, at least until its lease on the camp grounds expires in November.

The efforts to discourage public ownership of these auto camp grounds should be vigorously opposed by every merchant. There is grave danger that the tourist millions will find their way in the hands of a few individuals instead of the merchants of the Northwest, unless a definite stand is taken for maintenance of Municipal Auto Parks.

Unless those interested, and this means every automotive merchant as well as the butcher, the baker, the grocer, the hotel man, the restaurant keeper etc., aggressively campaign for a continuance of the city and town auto camp the tourist crop, widely heralded as one of the most valuable in the Northwest, will slip through the fingers of thousands of merchants into the hands of a few.

Hundreds of thousands of dollars are being spent to bring tourists to the Northwest. Merchants contribute most liberally to various advertising funds. The chief sales talk of the campaigners was "You will get it back from the tourists. Now, when the public auto camp is a

success, and the promotion work has been done with public dollars, promoters are raising the old war cry. "Down with public ownership," and are asking that the tourists dollars be laid in their itching palms.

Tourist dollars belong to the people of the Northwest, and not to a few of its citizens. Auto camps should be maintained, on a self-supporting basis if possible, by the cities and towns. They should be maintained without the presence of concessions competing with the merchandising public. The city has no business competing with its own people by granting concessions.

The city owes a duty to its visitors in the maintenance of adequate camping facilities. But it should not be beguiled into turning over auto camps to private individuals, permitting the building up of communities entirely independent of the merchants of the city. It's duty to the tourist assuredly is not superior to its duty to its own people, and "own people" include merchants.

Automotive merchants of every town in the Northwest should do as did the Portland Automotive Trades Association—demand an even break for the merchants of the community in the struggle for the tourist dollar. Millions of dollars have been invested in the Northwest in improved automotive servicing facilities on the strength of tourist business. That business will not develop on the basis of huge privately owned auto camp towns situated at leading stop-over points.—Automotive News, April 1924.

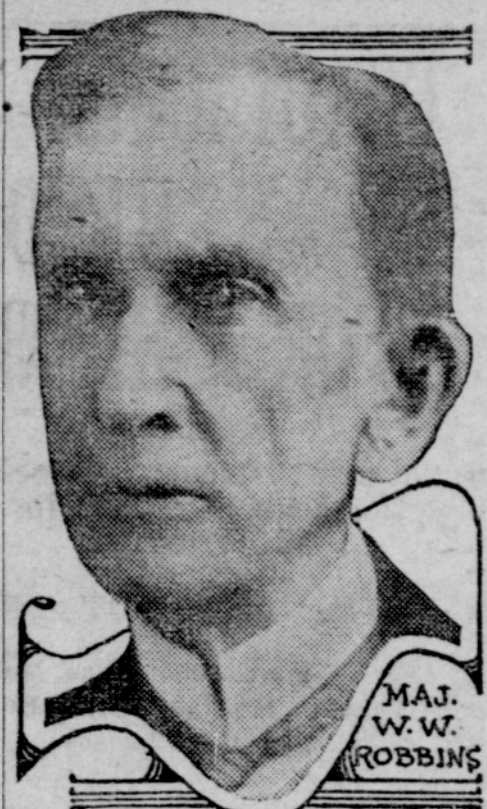
