DISTRICT SCHOOL HAS NATURAL FLAG STAFF

Tree Growing Directly in Front of School Building Carries American Flag.

The public school recently established with 10 pupils under the guidance of Miss Elizabeth Lennox at Shale City, has what it believes to be a singular attraction and possibly the only thing of its kind for scores of miles. A natural flag pole, straight as an arrow and tapered to symmetrical perfection, has been made of a pine tree which stands directly in front of the school house and overlooks a grassy vista broken with a sparkling stream of mountain water. While the present height of the pole is only 30 feet, it is in absolutely healthy condition and will grow far into the heavens, carrying a mounting place for the flag that has been provided for it.

Of the ten pupils attending school, every grade is represented with one or more pupils and the youthful population of the newly platted shale oil center will spend long summer days, finally waning into winter and December when they will have completed a regulation school year and made up for the months lost prior to its opening.

has been so little and so few. "The encouraging thing at present is the well high complete return to normal methods of action and sane public opinion. There is an exceedingly healthy disposition to uproot guilt and administer punishment wherever evidence should be produced. That I am doing and propose to continue."

The president also made a plea for economy and thrift. He declared there are bills now pending in congress that if passed would increase the government's expenditures \$3,600,000,000 this year. He spoke of "minority groups and organizations making determined assaults on the treasury" but did not name them. Some of his hearers believed this was a reference to the bonus.

Loyal To Mellon Plan
He again endorsed the Mellon plan for tax reduction and decided

the opposition to it as a supposition that the general public can be relieved of taxation and a greater proportion of taxes laid on the rich. Such policy, he said, "would be an economic injury and an impossible principle."
