THE GOVERNED

Musing too long on the crime, corruption, license, oppression and dictatorship in the world one is apt to lose faith in mankind and to question the superiority of our present civilization.

Those given to philosophizing on the state of man are at a loss to understand why men and women sin against society to the injury of society of which they are members. No man would knowingly harm himself, yet many harm society knowing that they are a part of that society.

Doesn't humanity blush with shame and remorse sometimes when it becomes conscious of the great amount of guardianship, policing and exercise of authority which is necessary to keep its millions of units at arm's length from the life, rights and property of their fellows? Perhaps few adults have ever realized that all of us receive and many among us require as much supervision and governing as children of tender years require from their parents and teachers. Is it not a sad commentary on mankind that our thoroughfares must be policed, our actions judged by public officers, our future conduct controlled and guided by legislatures, our courts and prisons eternally overflowing and our armies and navies forever growing.

Of course the great majority of adults the world over are capable of self-government. They could live in peace and mutual friendliness even though all laws and their executors were banished from the earth. Others there are who will require imposed government. These latter are incapable of self-government and once removed from the surveillance and threat of police and governments would prey upon society.

The United States with its churches, public schools, colleges, libraries, high standards of living and minimum of poverty still abounds with crime and violence and it is only the idealist who can vision a time far off when policemen will be required only for traffic and parade duty, legislatures and congress will have nothing to probe and no laws to pass, and presidents, governors and mayors will devote their administrations to writing holiday proclamations, delivering addresses of welcome and drawing their salaries.

After all, the adult of the human species is not so far removed from the adolescent of its own species and from the lower forms of animal life in this matter of self-control. The evolutionists should take hope, but humanity and civilization will continue to slap itself on the back.

OLD AGE PENSIONS

Dispatches from South America, Europe and our own 48 states disclose a strong and widespread agitation for the pensioning of the aged. The Argentine nation will pension all after 25 years of employment. Great Britain has old age pensions. Several states of the United States have pension laws effective at various ages.

The controlling power behind the state requirement movement is the combined social and welfare forces. It is not a new movement, being in fact as old as the soldiers' pension, but gained its present accelerated momentum in this country with the civil service reform.

Nobody is ignorant of the purpose of old age retirement legislation. Putting it in a few words and without regard to sentiment, it is a plan to abolish the almshouse through the medium of the pension, the less public and therefore less odious form of charity. One of its advantages will be the making possible to many of the living out the late years of their lives in their own homes instead of at the poor farm. This is a commendable objective.

Opposed to old age pensioning is the possibility of endowing idleness and indolence. Legalized unemployment of able bodies ill inevitably develop from a plan of old age, retirement which is not based on physical and economic condition of the individual. To retire a man or woman who is able and willing to work just because he or she has attained an arbitrary age would be nothing short of criminal to the individual and to society. The right to work is a cherished right of honest and intelligent man. A pensioner on retirement is at once a non-producer and dependent of an overburdened society. Mounting taxes and increasing sources for the spending of public money will cause the American public to deliberate long and seriously on additional pensioning schemes.

REVIEWS HISTORY OF THE CHAUTAUQUA

Mr. Editor:—

Reminiscence being in the air of late, permit me, also to indulge in a little—in connection with Chautauqua, the apparent passing of which we now lament.

In justice to all its loyal supporters—particularly those who have had to do with its management the past several years—it seems but fair to question the presumption that "lack of interest" on the part of members of the Association is alone responsible for its failure to longer carry on.

Granting that such may be a factor in its downfall, some of us who are intimate with its entire up and down career, see in changed conditions of life the real reason for decline and failure.

In the first place let us look at the scope of the early Chautauqua at Ashland. Some may not understand that it ever was more than a local affair. But, be it known that as "The Southern Oregon Chautauqua Association" it was, for many years, what its name implied. On its Board were representatives from all towns of Southern Oregon, and a large percentage of attendance at "assemblies" was from outside Ashland. Indeed without such support the Chautauqua here could not have been the success it was.

Let us consider too, the fact that for a good many years this was one of but three Chautauqua organizations on the Pacific Coast—these widely separated. Also remember that rival attractions—either in the way of recreation, entertainment, or educational features, were fewer than for some years past. As it was, the pleasant outing offered by camp life during the Assembly was no small lure, drawing people from far and near (A goodly number of Ashland people among others) to enjoy "this feature, and to be able to really "take in" Chautauqua—not only its splendid pro-

grams of lectures and entertainment, but some of its very interesting and helpful "schools" as well as Bible study, music, art, literature, history, psychology, physical culture, cooking—such were the classes in charge of able instructors.

Young folks too, had the happiest times, with a music instructor, a physical director, and story teller all their own. (A chorus of a hundred children's voices is no small attraction).

Is it strange the Chautauqua then drew and held interest of both old and young, as, with the multitude of attractions and interests of today it cannot do?

The automobile came, making easily accessible more distant attractions. The "movies" came also with numerous other attractions—particularly for the young people.

But, "Springs development" was on, and promise of rapid growth for Ashland was with it. And the enthusiastic Chautauquans who favored building on so large a scale were simply public spirited citizens, interested in the future good of Ashland. (Those who opposed were short-sighted, pessimistic to be sure). Not only for larger Chautauqua crowds did they build, but for great conventions, and large gatherings in general that would be drawn here.

Nor did such building seem more foolish for the Ashland of ten years ago than did the erection of so large an auditorium as the first one seemed for the Ashland of more than thirty years ago.

Dreams failed to materialize, however—while the debt incurred remains a very real thing to this hour. Ellison-White programs are not put on without guarantee of a certain amount to them, so pledges for payment must be secured each year, and with little encouragement of returns of the past several years, and chance of deficit to make up instead—guarantors are not eager to enroll.

Is hesitancy to assume such risk—with so little prospect of saving the property of the Association—mere indifference to the fate of this once very important asset to Ashland? Does "lack of interest" explain it all?

But if, as it now seems inevitable, the Chautauqua Ass'n must

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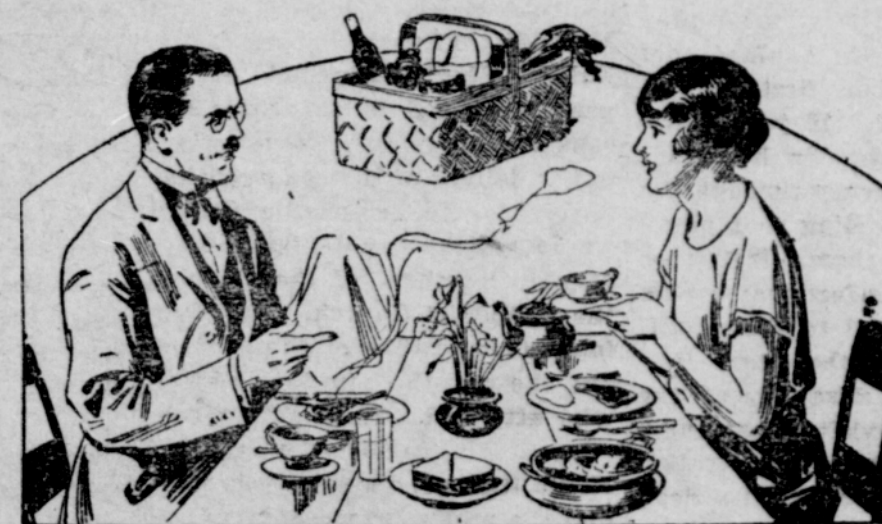
