round up the hoboes and perform the necessary fumigation has not been announced, but Dr. Lytle, with a smile that was somewhat mischievous, suggested that possibly Police Chief McNabb and his force could perform the work.

While the hobo is looked upon as an element of danger in carrying the hoof and mouth malady, Dr. Lytle states that time is the greatest enemy of the disease, owing to the fact that tramps require many days in which to travel from the infected districts of California to Oregon, danger from their clothing and bedding is reduced to a minimum. However, the precaution against hoboes is to be taken.

Conditions Favorable
Despite the fact that one small outbreak occurred yesterday in California, the situation is described by Dr. Lytle as being highly favorable. The warm sun and dry winds are recognized as spelling death to the disease and of these California has been enjoying a plenty during recent days. An exposure of 24 hours or less to the warm sun or dry wind is said to be fatal to hoof and mouth germs.

Distance Is Aid
The distance between the Oregon border and the most northern infected district in California is also a great factor in the fight against the spread of the disease to this state, according to Dr. Lytle. The malady has never reached a point closer than 450 miles to the state line. The closest infected district is now 500 miles, and with the exception of a slight outbreak in a herd of hogs, Oregon is approximately 650 miles from the nearest infected region.

To Double Patrol
Patrols along the southern border of the state are to be strengthened, and doubled at some points. Fumigation at other stations is also to be made more effective.

irrigation, the matter of cooperating in the settlement and development of that area was discussed at length. It was stated by Fred C. Homes that the land settlement program inaugurated by the Jackson County Land Settlement Board would solve some of the problems presented, and it was also announced that at the request of those interested in the local cannery, experts from O. A. C. were coming to Ashland to confer on matters relative to bringing Bellview to a high state of productivity. It is likely, however, that a standing committee will be appointed in this connection.

Budget Presented
The budget proposed for the ensuing year was read by the secretary and will be referred to the budget committee for approval and final action.

May Entertain Guardsmen
An announcement was made that indicates that Ashland may be privileged to entertain the entire personnel of men and officers of the Oregon National Guard during June, at which time the organization will be sent to California for training. Last year the Chamber entertained the artillery units, but will assume a much larger task this season, as there will be approximately 1,500 or 2,000 men for which to provide entertainment. The matter was referred to the secretary for further consideration and action.
