THE HOOF AND MOUTH DISEASE SITUATION

As time passes and the dread hoof and mouth malady continues to break out anew in various parts of California the public is brought to a realization that it is a danger that can not be considered lightly. A report from the infected state gave the losses in livestock alone as being \$2,000,000 up to and including April 18. Other thousands of livestock have been killed since then. No estimate has been made of the loss that is resulting to producers of fruits and vegetables. Creameries are suffering terrific losses. There is hardly a line of business represented in the entire state of California that is not feeling the pinch of the disease. Railroads operating in the state are reducing their working forces, which means that they are among the damaged.

Nor is the loss confined to California alone. Oregon is sustaining a daily loss which is difficult to estimate. From Klamath Falls comes the report that numerous box factories are on the verge of closing their plants, due to the fact that California growers are forced out of the market for vegetable and fruit crates and boxes. Other lines of industry in Oregon are more or less affected, and no doubt the same condition abounds in Nevada and Arizona.

The situation is such that it gives conclusive proof that the terrible disease is not to be treated lightly and that sensible precautionary measures are necessary if Oregon is to escape the dire results sustained by California. It also proves beyond question that drastic measures are necessary to rid infected districts of the disease. Seven or eight new outbreaks occurred only yesterday, coming at a time when those who are prosecuting the war against it thought that the tide had changed in their favor.

The announcement that the federal government is to take charge of the fight against the malady is welcome news to the states of the Pacific coast and far west. It means that whatever quarantine measures are deemed necessary will be enforced to the limit and without favor in the counties of California. It insures that the fight to rid the infected districts of the disease will go on unrelentingly until desired results are obtained. One or more counties in the infected districts have failed to cooperate properly in the quarantine and eradication measures. California authorities admit this. When the federal government takes hold conditions will change.

With the resources of the federal government aiding the states control of the disease will be attained much quicker, and until then it will be necessary for the authorities of Oregon to maintain a strict quarantine and exert every precaution against the spread of the disease to this state. There is no occasion to become hysterical, and only necessary measures and precaution should be enforced, eliminating as much as possible extreme and unnecessary restrictions.

GOOD NEWS

The announcement that Ashland is not to dispense with the annual Chautauqua is good news, and the fact that the contract covering the program for this year is such that the local association is not mortgaging all its material wealth and its life is even better news. There is no individual of average intelligence but who recognizes the value of a good Chautauqua program. From a standpoint of entertainment the Chautauqua is worth the price of a season ticket, and the educational advantages it offers gives it double value.

The Tidings believes that the Chautauqua question has been happily disposed of, for this year at least. The local association is protected and there is an excellent opportunity for making a profit on this year's program.

That Ashland is to enjoy the Chautauqua this season is an assured fact. All that remains to make it a success, so far as local efforts are concerned, is for Ashland residents to get behind the local association in the purchase of tickets. Conditions now are such that all can support the movement and make it the success it deserves to be.

A GOLF COURSE FOR ASHLAND

A golf course in keeping with the means which the community affords is in direct line with the all-pervading movement to make Ashland one of the leading tourists and recreation centers of the Pacific coast, and that the Chamber of Commerce has decided to lend its influence in securing this much desired improvement gives assurance that it will become a reality in the near future. If there is any question as to the demand for a golf course all one needs to do to become convinced is to loiter in local hotels for a few minutes each morning and note the number who make inquiry as to whether or not Ashland

affords this pleasure and recreation. Nor is the demand from tourists and visitors alone. Among our best known citizens can be counted a number of enthusiastic golf fans, and there are many others whom slight encouragement will convert to the rapidly growing game.

Ashland will have the benefit of the experience of various other small cities in Oregon in securing and building suitable links, and The Tidings feels confident that the Chamber of Commerce will take necessary steps to secure all the information available before submitting definite plans to its members and citizens in general. Once this is accomplished it is believed that general support will be accorded the project.

There is no denying the fact that a suitable course will add much to Ashland's prestige as a tourist center. In fact we can not hope to lay claim to the distinction to which we aspire without providing this means of recreation. A fact worth considering is that a course can be conducted along plans that those who play will pay, whether tourist or local citizen.

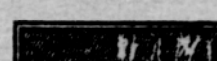

OREGON EXHIBIT MOVED INTO STATE CAPITOL.

SALEM, April 23—The Oregon exhibit which has been in Portland for a number of years, is being transferred to Salem and

will be placed in the lower corridor of the state capitol. The exhibit includes numerous varieties of woods, ores, fruits, grasses, grains, wool and other products typical of this state.
