CHEESE FACTORY AT TILLAMOOK IS BURNED

TILLAMOOK, April 26—The Elwood cheese factory in this city was destroyed by fire at 3:30 today, with a loss of \$15,000, and Harry Hogan, manager, who lived above the factory, had a narrow escape by jumping from an upstairs window. The blaze started from a spark from the furnace. A strong northwest wind made fire-fighting ineffective. The creamery and all its contents were destroyed. The plant had been operating on its spring run about one month. Mr. Hogan lost all his household goods.

GOVERNMENT TO ISSUE NEW POSTAGE STAMPS

WASHINGTON, April 28—Great interest is being taken in the three new postage stamps which will be issued by the government next month. They are in denominations of one, two and five cents and will commemorate the coming to America of the Huguenots and Walloons and the three-hundredth anniversary of settlement of New York and the Middle Atlantic States.

Government officials declare that they will be the most beautiful stamps ever issued by the department. In order that the historic scenes which they will bear may be shown more effectively they will be larger than usual and oblong in shape.

Health Hints

by the Father of Physical Culture

Having discovered that you have disease, what must you do to get well? It all depends upon how far the disease has advanced and whether your heart is compensating or not. If you present no particular symptoms except enough to let you know that the trouble is present and you are still up and about and able to work, all that is necessary is to give up your bad habits and regulate your life in such a manner that all unnecessary strain will be taken off the heart. You must not worry; you must avoid constipation; you must eat food that agrees with you, that is easy of digestion and that introduces a minimum of toxic substances into your system; you must not drink alcoholic liquors or use tobacco or drugs; you must not overwork or engage in enterprises or occupations too strenuous for you; you must get a maximum amount of rest and sleep; you must adopt some system of exercise that will use every muscle in your body every day and which at the same time will not put strain on the heart; you must in short, take good care of yourself.

Do not worry one minute about your condition. The best thing that you can do is to try to get well. Place yourself in as cheerful surroundings as possible. Avoid grouchy, sour-faced relatives and friends who take delight in retailing accounts of people who have died of heart trouble, and who advise you to take this and that treatment. Select a pleasant, sunny room, and have a capable nurse or sensible friend wait upon you, and then having decided that you wish to live let nothing interfere with your struggle for health.

Of course you have stopped all your bad habits. You must also have removed all possible causes of your illness. All sources of infection must have been taken care of—bad teeth removed or treated, abscesses drained and ulcerations cleaned and healed, and acute complaints remedied. You must set out to make your body as clean inside and out as it is possible to make it. This means thorough elimination through skin, bowels, kidneys and lungs.

The heart must have a chance to rest and "catch up" as it were, with its work.

OBITUARY

Mrs. Annie Elvidge-McWilliams, whose death occurred at El Centro, California, at the home of her daughter, Mrs. J. E. Peck, Monday morning, April 21st, was born at Darlington, Wisconsin, Jan. 10th, 1858. She was married July 24th, 1880, to Francis G. McWilliams, in Shellsburg, Wisconsin. Several years of their married life was spent in the middle west, later going to Houston, Texas. In 1897, the family came to Ashland, which has been their home ever since.

About a year ago the illness began that resulted in complete invalidism. Last November, Mr. and Mrs. McWilliams went to El Centro, with their daughter, Mrs. J. E. Peck, hoping the change to lower altitude would give added strength, which it did, but the end came suddenly, without apparent suffering.

Although knowing of Mrs. McWilliams' serious illness, yet her death came as a shock to her many friends who share with the family, the grief at her passing.
