"On April 13th he cut and tiered one and one half tiers of wood, on his own ranch of south of town and came home none the worse for his day's work. He has also this spring, spaded and planted his acre of ground on Oak street, and his garden is one of Ashland's beauty spots. He also thinks nothing of driving long distances in his car; trips to Cal., and the northern part of the state being made very easily by Mr. Dozier eighty years young."
