WHITFIELD TO RECEIVE DEATH SENTENCE SOON

VANCOUVER, Wash., May 1—If no petition has been filed in the state supreme court for rehearing of the case of George Edward Whitfield, convicted murderer of Anna Mosko, 11-year-old Battle Ground, Wash., school girl, sentence of death will be imposed within the next few days. Prosecuting Attorney Joseph E. Hall stated Tuesday.

Whitfield was convicted in the local superior court a year ago and sentenced to be hanged. An appeal to the state supreme court was taken, but this body held that he received a fair and impartial trial. The 30-day period within which to ask for a rehearing expired Monday.
