bringing about a betterment of conditions" and her influence from earliest times were dealt upon at some length, closing with a wonderful tribute to mother and wife.

Rev. Mr. Ashcraft, a returned missionary from China spoke on "Temperance Work in China." In this address Mr. Ashcraft reviewed the "Tobacco movement" in China, and told of the slogan adopted by the tobacco people, "A cigarette in the mouth of every man, woman and child in China." The brewers hope to find it a fruitful field for their iniquitous wares, and the speaker asked that prayer be offered in behalf of war-torn, divided China that these evils, including the sale of opium may be stopped in their work of demoralization. He told of the growth of sentiment for righteousness and right living, and of the wonderful work of that Christian gentleman, General Feng, who is now, with his forces the protection of Pekin, but who was at Kailang, when Mr. Ashcraft was there.

The story of his army of 30,000, 12,000 of whom are Christians and this general's work in promoting knowledge, of the gospel and his habit of prayer with his men was intensely interesting. How they pray on the eve of battle and for rain, when needed, was pictured in vivid phrase. Mr. Ashcraft had many pictures of these soldiers and their general, a man over six feet in height and fine looking. The general was a personal friend of Mr. Ashcraft's and his picture is autographed, with a special message of friendship.

He spoke of the fine work of the 5000 missionaries in China, but said it was such men as Gen. Feng that could do wonderful work for China.

Space forbids this brief mention of a most enlightening vision of China given by one whose heart is in his work.

"My Ain Country," sweetly sung by Mrs. Reed, with Mrs. Van Fossen at the piano, was well received.

In leading up to his subject, "The Problem of Immigration," Rev. V. K. Allison, spoke briefly on the obedience to law and law enforcement." 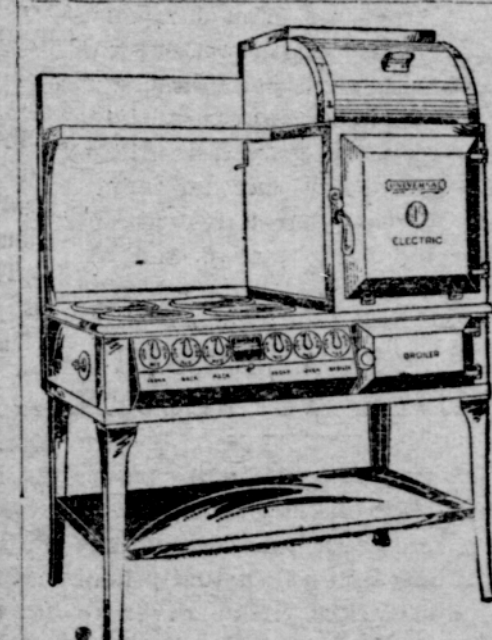
