PULMOTOR OF BUSINESS

A national periodical devoted to business has completed a census of 2000 businesses on the question of "the summer slump." Seventy-six percent of the business men interviewed know of no hot weather slump in their business. Ten per cent reported fair summer business and fourteen per cent are experiencing business depressions every summer.

Until quite recent years all business was seasonal. One business was active in winter but inactive in summer. Others by the nature of their trade were prosperous in summer but had to struggle through the winter. Some time or other in every year every business had no business.

What do these 2000 modern businessmen give as the miraculous cure for the "summer slump?" They agree on twelve remedies and the first of these is increased newspaper advertising. They work on the known fact that the business is to be had if they go after it.

Some of the summer advertising suggestions offered by the 2000 businessmen for retail merchants are increased regular advertising space in the newspapers, well-advertised special sales, feature advertisements and advertising of summer bargains and seasonal merchandise. They all aid in eliminating the summer slump, but none is effective without insistent and large scale newspaper advertising.

The retail merchants in Ashland who know no business "summer complaint" are those who have learned the value of newspaper advertising and knowing the means obtain the desired results. The buying public appreciates the merchants who have something to offer them and who tell them of their offers through the medium of newspaper advertising. There is no end to the public's needs so it follows that a summer slump in business denies the public a continuous gratification of its needs and desires.

EXPLANATION IS DESIRED

Reports, many of them authoritative, say that prohibition enforcement has cost Jackson county \$10,000 during the past year, which is a condition that ought to be remedied, and the only remedy that appears practical, is in the hands of the voters of the county. Whether the reported cost is over or under the actual amount of money expended for special dry law prosecutors and dry law sleuths matters not. The only thing with which we are concerned is the condition that requires an expenditure of even \$1,000 for special officers to enforce prohibition laws. To do even this is a duplication and making an expenditure for a service which others are elected to perform.

Two conditions warrant spending taxpayers' money for special prosecutors and dry law officers in Jackson county. Either the county is over-populated with bootleggers, illicit still operators, consumers of poisoned booze, and those who go to make up an undesirable class, or those elected to enforce the laws curbing the operation of stills and bootlegging are not performing their duties and fulfilling the oath of office to which they subscribed. There can be no other conclusion. If the county runs wild with lawbreakers and the regularly elected officials are unable to cope with the situation special officers are required. It this condition exists it is a sad commentary on the citizenship of Jackson county. If on the other hand Jackson county occupies a moral plan equal to that of other average counties in Oregon and law enforcement can be accomplished with regular officials it is both uncomplimentary to those who were sworn to perform these duties and to those who elected them to positions of public trust.

The writer confesses that a residence in the county of a little less than a year leaves him ignorant for the highly unfavorable position we occupy, and because of this will welcome a statement from the regularly elected law enforcement officers of the county as to the cause for a situation that is little less than disgraceful. The blame should be placed where it rightfully belongs, and once it is established no time should be lost in righting the condition.

TWO EXCELLENT CITIZENS

Celebration of the thirty-sixth anniversary of the American citizenship of General and Mrs. Ballington Booth is something which in these days of storm and strife in national affairs should be greeted with pleasure by the whole country. Born in England, these two devoted workers among the humble and lost souls have written an inspiring page in American history. Their Volunteers of America is an organization which stands as a monument to the milk of human kindness. Few deserve any special celebration of a thirty-sixth anniversary of anything, but in this case we will do well to mark it, if only to draw attention to the fact that Americans are not all prostrate before the Golden Baa of the dollar.

General and Mrs. Ballington Booth have made much of their acquired citizenship than most of us make of that to which we are born. Poverty, degeneracy and straying men and women existed in this country before the Ballington Booths came to America. Isolated individuals were working to open up light in the dark corners of the cities, but it remained for the Booths to make such campaigns national affairs. And for that the United States owes them more than it can repay. During the war the Volunteers worked hard, without cant or bias, among the soldiers. Every ex-service man has a tender spot in his heart for the sweet-faced uniformed girls who served out hot chocolate and doughnuts with generous hands. The war huts of the Volunteers were houses of religion, without pallid emphasis upon the fact, which men in training for death appreciated. There were too many others to preach to them. The country is weary of drives, but an appeal from the Ballington Booths should never fall upon deaf ears.—Brooklyn Daily Eagle.

U. S. EXPERTS LEAD WAR ON FOOT AND MOUTH DISEASE



This is Dr. U. G. Houck of the United States Bureau of Animal Industry, (left) who has been placed by Secretary Wallace in complete command of the fight being effectively waged on the foot and mouth disease outbreak in California, and G. H. Hecke, director Department of Agriculture, State of California, who is assisting Dr. Houck in quickly and permanently stamping out the epidemic.

SACRAMENTO, CALIF.—The full force of the United States government has been brought into play effectively against the foot and mouth disease in California. The disease has been confined to certain limited districts in the state and the work of stamping it out is proceeding rigorously under the direction of Dr. U. G. Houck, personal Representative of Secretary Wallace, department of agriculture, who has complete control of the combined federal and state forces. "Every method justified by our past experience and by scientific study is being used to prevent any possibility of spread of the disease and to wipe it out so thoroughly that there will be no chance of its recurrence," said Dr. Houck. "There is no danger of spread of the disease through shipment of fruits, vegetables or dairy products from the great non-infected areas of California. We know of no instance where the disease has been carried by such shipments," Dr. Houck said.

Complete confidence in the men in the field was expressed by Dr. J. R. Mohler, chief of the bureau of animal industry, United States department of agriculture, in a message he has just sent to Dr. Houck and the local federal inspectors. "We have in California," he said, "the best equipped force of inspectors that was ever assembled on a foot and mouth detail."

MODERN MAUSOLEUM IS ASSURED ASHLAND

Local Structure Will Meet Government Specifications; Plan Meets General Approval.

Ashland, first city in southern Oregon to become modern and progressive and in the same class as two thousand other cities of the United States, who have erected modern and scientific "Halls of memory" to their honored and loved, who have passed beyond.

The modern and scientifically constructed Mausoleums are the result of evolution and development of civilization. They are massive, indestructible, magnificent, artistic and beautiful and are a step forward in showing man's humanity to man. Relative to the Mausoleum, C. D. Mason says: "Earth burial is essentially abhorrent and the sight of desolate unkept cemeteries is so common that neither word nor picture is required to emphasize the horrors of earth burial."

"A safer, more permanent, respectful and reverent disposition of the dead is demanded and it is man's duty to make a permanent record that he has been active among his brothers and fellows. This is one of the things which we can only have when needed most by providing when needed least."

"Modern science has made it possible for Ashland to have a community Mausoleum that the ravages of time and elements can not destroy and by the cooperative plan is found that in union there is strength, safety and economy, bringing above ground entombment at less cost than any other method. The Mausoleum to be constructed within a few weeks is of the Egyptian type; plans, patents and specifications, passed and approved by the United States Government, as being the most permanent indestructible and lasting structure that human ingenuity can devise."

Mr. Mason, who has been in Ashland for the past six weeks, has been most successful in securing reservations for construction of space in this building. Many of the families from the adjoining towns and Medford have already secured reservations in this building.

An endowment fund is established to maintain and perpetuate the building forever so first expense is last expense, the construction being of reinforced concrete, steel, bronze, marble and art glass, built according to government standard specifications. Mr. Mason has had ten years' experience in this work and has erected many other structures of the same class.

"Should we not at least give a thought to this scientific movement," says Mr. Mason, "and not wait until necessity forces on us the inevitable, then when laden with sorrow and trouble look to our friends to do something that we later might wish had been otherwise."

No extra spaces are to be constructed, unless they are reserved before construction. The price of each space is \$250, payable as building is constructed, in escrow through banks, or if a person wishes to arrange, it is possible to have a longer period of time for payment. 75 per cent of the population of Ashland has been interviewed and Mr. Mason in the next three weeks will interview the remaining 25 per cent, giving them the opportunity which they never had before and is doubtful if they will have the same again to join the cooperative plan. There is now remaining space to accommodate about eight families.
