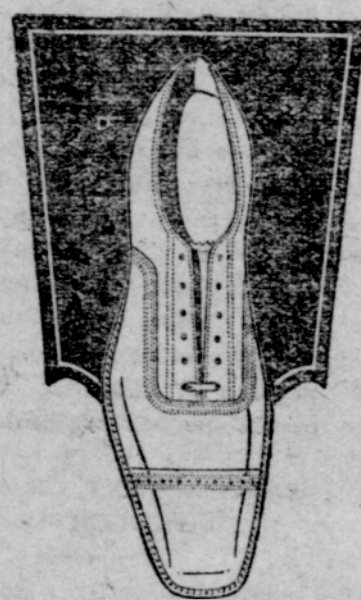
## Home Again—
