Civic Club

"Music in our Public Schools," was the principal theme of the session of the Civic Club Tuesday afternoon, although much of interest to the club came up in the way of business.

Reports were read and passed upon and one report in particular that of the Floral Committee gave interesting data.

The time of the meeting from the 20th, to the 13th was arranged by resolution passed at this time, to enable the newly elected president to attend as a delegate, the state convention.

The delegates and alternates were named for the state meeting to which will be added the name of the new president. As delegates: P. K. Hammond, Mrs. D. Perozzi, Mrs. B. R. Greer

and Mrs. Emma Oeder. Alternates: Mrs. Luke, Mrs. L. N. Woodside and Mrs. G. H. Yeo.

The nominating committee was named also: Mrs. Harris Dean, chairman, Mrs. D. Perozzi and Mrs. H. W. Andrews.

The program was in Miss Marsters' efficient hands and a wonderfully interesting one it was. Children were there from the first and fifth grades; Miss Watenbarger's and Miss Kennedy's pupils; the fourth grade, Hawthorne Annex; Miss Emma Keltling's pupils, and the Girls' Glee Club from the High School.

After the introductory remarks, Miss Marsters had the children from the first grade sing two little spring songs, "Apple Blossoms" and "Fireflies," that illustrated what may be done in finding the musical voice, with the tiny folk.

The fourth grade came next. Two songs were sung. Two part singing was shown in its initial work. Rhythm, first determined, then singing the words, then by note; all done so well that the teachers may well be satisfied with the work accomplished. "Morning Prayer" and "Awake, Said the Sunshine" were the songs sung.

The fifth grade in two, two-part songs acquitted themselves wonderfully well. "Solitude" and "Birds in Branches High" illustrated the work that these children are doing, in much the same manner, but with more advanced work.

The Victrola was then used to show the "Memory Work" that has been a part of the training the past two months. Records were put on and children listened. They named the composition, the composer, spelled them, told the story and listened for certain phrases and interpreted them; something some big folks could not do.

Miss Marsters then briefly outlined the work as it is planned through the grades to the High School.

In the first, the singing voice is discovered. Largely note songs. The work is based on two facts; that every child can sing and on the instinct for rhythm.

In the second grade, books are put in the pupils' hands. In the third, sight reading is stressed. In the fourth, two part singing is taken up, and in the fifth the minor is brought to the children's attention. In the sixth, three part singing is taught. In all the work the children are taught to use their own light voices.

In the High School, there are the choruses; boys and girls, and the mixed chorus. Three and four part singing both are taught.

The Girls' Glee Club then sang two numbers "Come Down Laughing Waters," by Spross, "Boat Song," by Ware, showing what may be done with these young voices when trained by one so keenly interested and so well equipped to do the work. The girls were enthusiastically applauded and had to return.

All the numbers were much appreciated and heartily applauded and to Miss Marsters and to their teachers a vote of thanks was given for furnishing the club such a delightful program.

This was one of the special numbers of Music Week, now being observed, and one that it is a matter of regret that every parent in Ashland could not have heard.

Tea was served by the hostesses Mrs. Yeo and Mrs. Ahlstrom and all enjoyed the social hour, following the splendid program.

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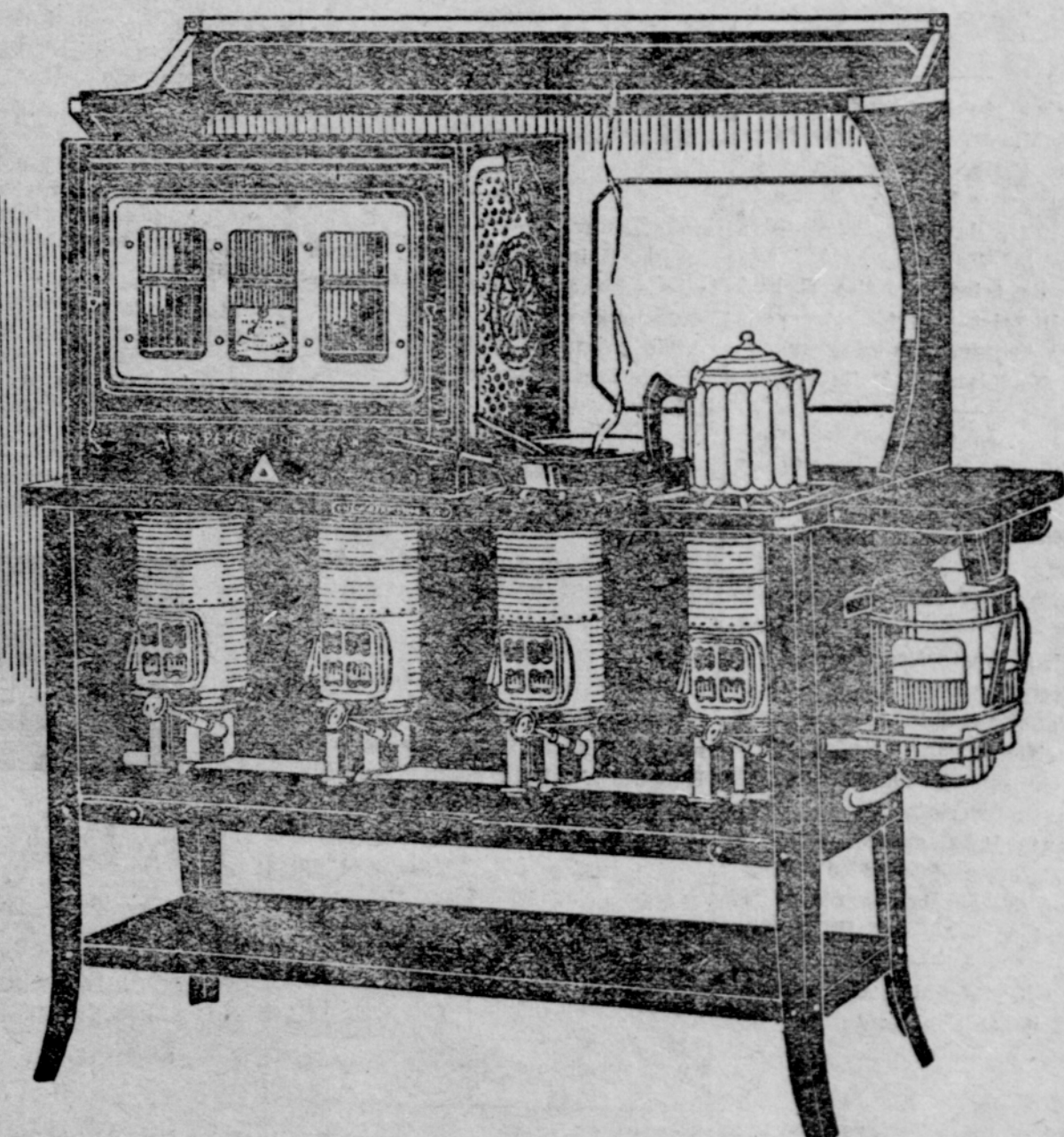
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
