POWER OF OPINION

Public opinion rules man with an iron hand such as no Pharaoh or Roman emperor ever possessed. No tyrant ever exercised so despotic a power over human beings as the tyrant public opinion.

Few things that men do are not directly answerable to public opinion, and few men act without one eye on public opinions. Everything man talks or thinks about bears the impress of this seal of authority of the masses. Business lives or dies, politicians are elected or defeated, society "does" or "does not," artists become famous or unknown, governments rise or fall, by the mandates of public opinion of the majority and the public's opinion of a democracy or republic is a nation in which the majority rules.

Most men and women will admit that ninety per cent of their actions are guided by public opinion, by what other people will think of them. Coming to think of it, isn't that just the reason girls, young or old primp and powder and spend all their money on pretty clothes, men buy expensive cars instead of the inexpensive kind, people make the exteriors of their homes more beautiful than the interiors, the operas and Shakespearean plays are so well attended, and everybody does so many things they would rather not do?

"Like other tyrannies, the tyranny of the majority was at first, and is still vulgarly, held in dread," wrote John Stuart Mill in 1858.

How applicable today is his further statement:

"Those whose bread is already secured, and who desire no favors from men in power, or from bodies of men, or from the public, have nothing to fear from the open avowal of any opinions, but to be ill-thought of and ill-spoken of, and this it ought not to require a very heroic mould to enable them to bear."

From the pen of the nineteenth century philosopher it sounds easy, but, from our knowledge of today, was martyrdom in the Roman arena and on the rack of the Spanish inquisition more terrible than the modern martyrdom to public opinion? Mill don't know public opinion.
