## BURN'S RESIGNATION

There will be no regrets over the resignation of William Burns as chief of the bureau of investigation of the department of justice. Instead the action is beneficial to the nation and will be applauded. Charges of playing politics in the various investigations being conducted by congress have been made repeatedly, and are possibly entitled to some consideration, but the department of justice and bureau of investigation under the Daugherty-Burns regime was guilty of playing more politics than all other forces combined. That the bureau of investigation was used for personal and political reasons is evident to even the most casual student of national affairs and politics. The case of Senator Wheeler is doubtless a good illustration of the foregoing charge. There has been no testimony presented to the committee of a responsible nature that Senator Wheeler performed any act justifying his indictment before the federal grand jury of Montana, and it is a notorious fact that the department of justice and bureau of investigation connived together to "get" Wheeler, simply for revenge and for politics.

The whole truth concerning the manipulation of the two departments will in all probability never be revealed, but should such come to pass there would be displayed numerous dirty conspiracies to bring ruin to honorable men. When the country ridded itself of Daugherty it was freed from a barnacle that was seriously crippling our ship of state, and when Burns passed out the act was no less beneficial to the government.

## ROOM FOR SPECULATION

President Coolidge, who has been sweeping the republican primaries in various states over Senator Hiram Johnson and displaying unexpected strength, has suffered a reversal in form, so far as his success in dealing with congress is concerned. While it is evident that the success of Coolidge in the primaries is not due entirely to his popularity, but rather to the unpopularity of Johnson, it is strange that he is being made the subject of bitter defeat in legislative matters. The Mellon plan for tax reduction has been the President's pet in the legislative program, and he has been insistent that it become a law. Despite this fact, and in face of the fact that republicans are in the majority in both the house and senate, we have the spectacle of the Mellon plan being defeated in both branches of congress. That the defeat is stinging and decisive is indicated by the vote of the senate on the resolution proposed by Coolidge to the tax bill passed by the senate Friday, and which contained the democratic rates. The vote Saturday on the amendment resulted in a defeat for the administration by a vote of 69 to 15. That Coolidge and Treasurer Mellon could muster no more than 15 votes is all but startling and reveals the President and congress widely at variance.

Another defeat, no less in proportions, is seen in the Japanese exclusion act. The President and Secretary Hughes have used every resource to have the ban postponed until March 1, 1925, but to no avail. Simultaneously with their action on the tax reduction bill, the house and senate voted Saturday to ignore the chief executive and instructed their conference committees to not extend the limit beyond July 1, this year. Here are two concrete examples of the Coolidge program being repudiated. It is true that the majority of the republican party is small and that a coalition between democrats and insurgent republicans erects a barrier against progress by the administration, but the overwhelming defeat of the Coolidge amendment to the tax reduction bill, 69 to 15, reveals his policy decidedly out of line with a very large majority of republican senators.

The case with which the President is capturing the delegates to the national convention and the frequency with which he is suffering reverses in legislative matters affords a problem for reflection and will be interpreted in various ways. One thing is evident, however, and that is that congress is in no mood to listen to advice or threats from the nation's chief executive and the members are either following policies which they believe are for the best interests of the people, or which they believe will strike the most responsive chord with their constituents. In one event representatives and senators in congress believe the President not in touch with the public pulse, and in the other the people are doubtless not in sympathy with the measures which Coolidge has labored to enact into laws. Truly, there is room for much speculation.

While the price of wheat in the United States has declined by approximately 55 per cent since 1917, the price of bread has been reduced by less than 5 1-2 per cent. In other words the drop in wheat prices has been ten times the drop in bread prices.—Ontario (Canada) Sun.

This is a Canadian editorial comment, illustrating again the two standards, the disproportionate relationship which exists between the price of farm products and the price of those products after other interests have seized them. Wheat went down ten points and bread one point. From the authority of the Department of Agriculture comes 9 cents, while the margin between the flour price and the bread price has increased from \$10.40 to \$18.30. The Department states that this condition hurts both producer and consumer and that "all interests in the country, including those of the bakers and millers would be

benefitted by the restoration of a normal ratio between the price of wheat when it leaves the farmers' hands and its price to the consumer." The bakers are almost solidly organized. They fix the bread price and get it, regardless of what they pay for flour so it would seem.

and feeds corn ensilage; he grows his oats and grinds them, and he feeds a small quantity of molasses with his hay. He says he does not feed a pound of miller's feeds and he does not see how a dairyman can make it when he pays almost as much for bran as the farmer gets for his whole wheat. "Farmers are getting 1 1-2 cents per pound for their wheat and paying 1 1-2 cents per pound for mill feed that has little but bran in it," says this dairyman. "Until this profit spread is cut down, I can't see how a dairyman can make money on mill feeds to his stock."

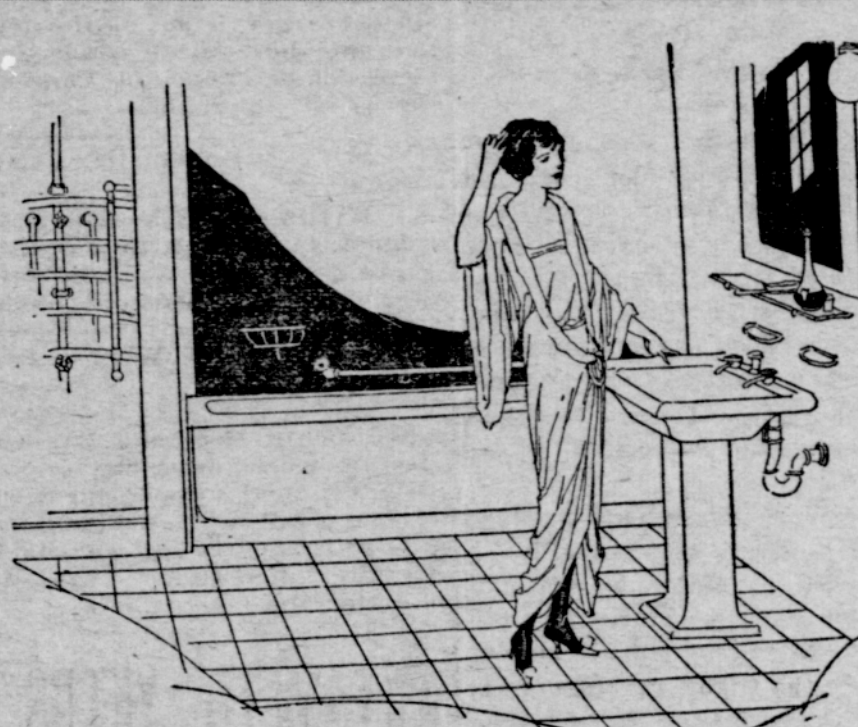
The egg grading rules and regulations, recently ordered by J. D. Mickle, state dairy and food commissioner, were urged, among others, by the state market agent, whose duties under the law are to aid standardization of products, Oregon produces a large surplus of eggs that must find outside

markets, and they must be graded and standardized to compete in the eastern markets. Like all new laws along this line, the egg ruling of Mr. Mickle has been criticized. On one side the producers think the ruling is too drastic while on the other hand consumers and members of the trade think the ruling is not being drastically enforced. The same double criticism resulted when the potato grading law was put into effect, but the market agent went

ahead with education of both the producers and shippers rather than with wholesale prosecutions. The result is that the law does not now require much enforcement, producers, shippers and consumers alike recognizing the benefits of the honest packs and generally observing and upholding the law.

**BUILDING PERMITS IN KLAMATH FALLS \$50,425**  
KLAMATH FALLS, May 12—Building permits totaling \$50,425 were granted here during April, according to a report issued by the city engineer. Since January 1st, 134 permits totaling \$182,834 have been granted by the council.
