## PASSING OF GOOD MANNERS

The accusation is made that men no longer are as courteous to women as they once were. Good manners are out of date, it is said. The change is imputed to the change in woman's status. Since she has left the shelter of the home and engaged in business and public activities, it is not considered needful to show her deference. Men, unashamed, will remain seated in street cars while women stand; they will smoke in mixed society, without so much as asking permission; they will speak of girls as "fellows." "She's a good fellow," one will hear them say. Does it mean that the enfranchisement of women, the striking off the shackles, has killed chivalry? that men cannot be expected to show courtesy to women unless women occupy a subordinate position in society?

It may be that women are themselves partly to blame. Some have lost the respect that formerly was theirs by adopting masculine ways. A few foolish ones dislike to be thought of as of "the weaker sex" or "the gentler sex," and on that account discourage the showing of deference to them, thinking it implies that they are not the equals of men. Of course they are not the equals of men in muscular strength, and they should glory in not being the equals of men in coarseness, either.

If there is to be leveling of the sexes it should be effected by raising men's standard of refinement, not by lowering women's. A great man showed perception of this many years ago at a banquet in his honor. "Since there are no ladies present," said one of the speakers, no harm will be done by my telling an indelicate story." "But there are gentlemen present," objected the great man.

The call that has been issued for accommodations deserve a loyal response from the public. ## The Art Of Beauty

## The Thoughtful Beauty

HERE are some types of beauty which are more permanent than others, which have a more enduring, if not so vivid an appeal. Faces which we remember long after we meet their owners. Faces that reflect something of the soul of the character. Of such a type is the thoughtful beauty whose clear eyes look out from under fine, level brows, whose lips are firm as well as sweet, whose chin has character as well as curves. This is a beauty which is more of outline than color, which does not only belong to youth, but is an ornament of age. The ancients divided feminine types of beauty into three, the Venus, the Juno, and the Minerva types. The Venus merely emphasized physical beauty, the Juno was the maternal type, the Minerva the thoughtful or intellectual. The Minerva type is one of the highest in our modern civilization. It is sensitive, finely strung and capable of notable achievements. The coloring of this type is, as I have said, not so important as the contour, the modelling of their features. They may be fair, or medium, or dark, but they will allways have a fine, directness of intelligence. They will disregard all eccentricities of attire, of coiffure, or of adornment, comb their hair in classic simplicity, conforming to the lines of the head, and leaving the forehead free. Short hair of the new style which clings to the head is not incompatible with this type, and is very often suited to her direct straightforwardness. The hair should be smooth, and brushed to brilliance. It may be slightly waved, but without any suggestion of artificiality.

The thoughtful type does not disdain the use of cosmetics. She merely demands the best, and uses it with discretion. This conservative type of woman, when she wears rouge in the daytime, she chooses a shade that tones so perfectly with her own color that, put on discreetly, it merely intensifies the little flush on her cheek and the glint in her eyes. If her skin is

olive, her hair dark, she chooses Ashes of Roses. If she is fair, Mandarin. Her clear complexion will respond to the warmth of Peaches powder. But this type, above all others, must experiment for the slightest garishness will ruin the dignity which is an essential of her charm.

The thoughtful type of beauty has one pitfall into which she must not fall. Because she does not attract at first sight like her showier, more vivacious sisters, she may force an unnatural gaiety, wear more startling dresses, and in other ways, defeat her own natural charm. To her I would say, be yourself, and you will like a magnet eventually attract to yourself those types which are repugnant to your true nature. When you assume a fictitious personality, it will neither impress, nor gain the attention of the real friends which your thoughtful charm would make.

## NEWS LETTER

INDIANAPOLIS, May 16—Should churches be given a place in the new \$10,000,000 war memorial plaza which is to include among other things the permanent, national headquarters of the American Legion?

This highly controversial subject has suddenly become an agitating one for clergymen, laymen, officials, citizens, educators and pupils.

The question briefly stated is would artistic values be lowered by allowing the church edifices already standing to remain on the plaza site.

Aside from the delicate involved because some denominations would be represented and others not, the dispute is an interesting one.

Some contend churches have no place in the imposing tribute Indianapolis and Indiana are to pay to the dead of the World War. Others say it is most fitting that a monument to the heroic dead and the houses erected for the worship of God stand together.

Favoring inclusion of the religious structures, proponents point to justification of their views in the pages of ancient history.

"Centuries have admired the funeral oration of Pericles at Seramikus where were buried in holy soil the heroic dead of Thermopylae," one writer said.

"But Pericles was wrong and the world's admiration was error," he continued in sarcastic vein. "There should be no holiness in reverence of the dead. It is inartistic."

The church and the graveyard with its monuments to the dead in close proximity as they are found in most of Caucasian world represent a development since the time Pericles, another asserts.

This evidence of the simple civilization in which we live inspired the great popular classic "Gray's Elegy—Written in a Country Churchyard," he points out.

The writer contrasts this with Byron's picture of gilded Rome, decayed and spiritless in "Childe Harold," as the Niobe of Nations. "Childless and crownless in her voiceless woe!"

"An empty urn within her withered hand."  
"Whose holy dust was scattered long ago."

Pagan Rome and soulless America!

Religion is the soul of the nation, say the clergy, and half-done historians constantly are holding Rome up as a terrible ex-

ample for the swaddling clothed U. S. A.

One the other hand, more practical ones say, these condemned churches can be erected elsewhere with funds provided and serve their purpose just as well.

"This memorial is going to last a long time—fashions in religion change—the particular denominations represented may be gone in 100 years, why worry?"

Those who claim the churches are out of place in the plaza point to Arlington, Westminster Abbey and other places.

When the whole thing is done there will be nothing lacking in the way of monuments to the dead warriors of America. Beginning with the long noted Soldiers and Sailors' monument with slight interruption, one can proceed right through the heart of Indianapolis for almost a mile.

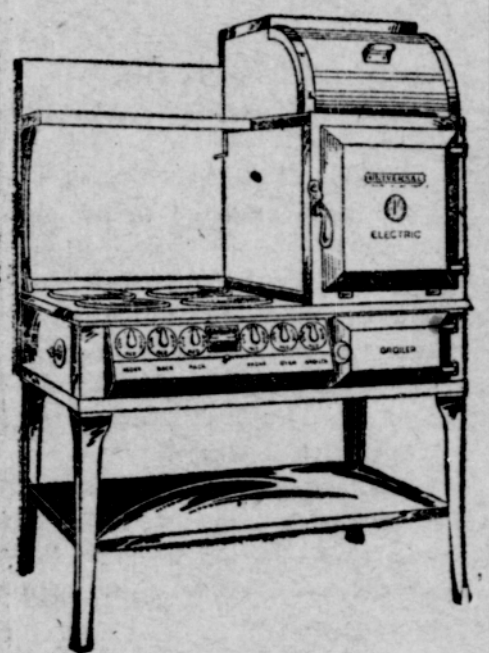

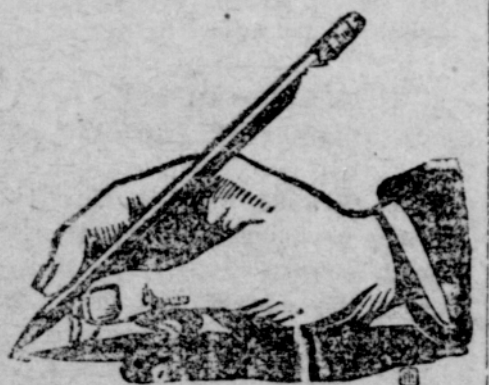

SALEM, May 17—Gov. Pierce will decide within a few days whether he will permit members of the Oregon national guard to hold this year's annual encampment at Monterey, Cal. Reports from California today indicate that a number of new cases of foot and mouth disease have been discovered and that two or three additional counties have been quarantined.

It is reported that pressure is being brought to bear upon Governor Pierce to prevent the guardsmen from going into California until the disease is under control. Should he decide to cancel the order sending the guardsmen to California for their annual encampment, this year's maneuvers probably will be held at Camp Lewis, Washington.

Visiting Nurses Fight Epidemic  
Diseases by Caring for Sick As  
They Spread Doctrine of Health

During the first two months of this year 424,986 visits were made by nurses representing the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company to care for acute cases of illness among the company's policyholders. These visits were made to 109,395 individuals living in the 3,955 towns and cities scattered throughout the United States and Canada where this nursing service is available.

In support of the nursing service the Metropolitan distributes through its agency machinery a large quantity of educational health and general welfare literature. This literature has especially to do with the care and welfare of children. The distribution was made directly by the agent or through the co-operation of schools, health officials and social agencies. During the sixty day period 6,329,651 pieces were given to the public, or an average of slightly more than 100,000 a day.

The Welfare Division of the company, which directs the nursing service and the distribution of literature, has carried on an extensive educational program against diphtheria and pneumonia during this period. The diphtheria movement was conducted in co-operation with local health officials in many places. Of seventy-two campaigns for diphtheria prevention in which the company participated, twenty-

six were originated by company agents.

The division keeps close record of epidemic conditions developing in any community and immediately furnishes to its agents in that community the special literature describing the proper precautions.

In order to promote health teaching in the elementary schools the company offered fifty scholarships, prizes of \$500 each for the teachers doing the best health-teaching for the current school year. The contest is being conducted through the American Child Health Association. A total of 1,754 teachers in 53 cities are entered.
