RESUME OF CHAMBER'S ACTIVITIES

High Lights of President and Secretary's Report.

VALUABLE AID GIVEN

Organization is Giving Assistance to Several Projects of Promise.

Did you attend the annual meeting of the Chamber of Commerce, and hear the reports given by the President and Secretary? Do you sometimes wonder what the Chamber is actually doing, if anything? Do you ever drop in to the office to make a suggestion or to see what is going on? Do you attend the weekly Forums? Do you sometimes think "well I can't attend these gatherings, and I am not much help, guess I'll just drop out." For you we want to refresh the reports and show in as brief wording as possible what your organization is doing and what it costs to do it.

We maintain a business office with a paid manager-secretary, and a stenographer. All inquiries coming to the Chamber of Commerce are answered from this office by a personal letter and such literature as we are able to supply. Over 12,000 pieces of literature were distributed during the 12 month period from March 1st, 1923, to March 1st, 1924. These inquiries come from nearly every state in the union and requires information of all sorts.

We maintain a department especially for information of tourists and registration of out of state cars which requires an extra clerk during the summer. This department was established July 17th, 1923, and over 7000 cars were registered up to March 1st, 1924. Maps and literature are provided and every effort made to interest tourists in visiting points of interest about Southern Oregon. In the Auto Camp views of Crater Lake, Oregon Caves, and Ashland scenery have been given on the screen in picture lectures, through the efforts of the Chamber, and this idea has been copied in the larger cities.

Our Publicity Dept. has taken care of a large amount of work during the past year with, we believe, a minimum of expense. Early in the summer four large Highway sign boards were erected, two north and two south of Ashland, noting the distance to Ashland and calling attention to the Auto Camp and Lithia Park. Smaller signs directing the tourist to the Chamber of Commerce and registration dept. were also erected.

An extra edition of the folder "Ashland the Tourist Center," was published and several thousand of these were distributed. A new folder, "Ashland the city of schools and homes," has already received a large distribution. Advertising has been undertaken in the Automobile Blue Book, in Oregon State Motor Ass'n Guide, in the publicity programmes of Portland Conventions, etc., to the extent of our financial ability, and we confidently assert that Ashland is better advertised today, through our Auto camp, Lithia Park, and our program of publicity, than any other city on the coast with like modest expenditure.

One especial feature of our publicity work during the past year has been the purchase and planning for distribution of the wonderful illustrated book, "A Day in the Siskiyou," by Gov. Frank J. Hanly of Indiana. This book published to sell at \$3.50, has been secured so that it may be sold at the price of \$1.50 and give the visitor a memento of real value.

Our local paper, "The Ashland Tidings" has given our organization effective and valuable publicity and is a real medium for communicating the work of the Chamber, obviating the necessity of a regular house organ. We have made considerable use however, of a mimeograph machine in occasional letters to our membership.

A special feature of our advertising work the past year has been the presenting Ashland Lithia water on many occasions as possible and a very widely extended amount of publicity has been secured thereby. At a recent banquet in the La Salle Hotel, Chicago, under the direction of the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce this water excited very favorable comment and at the Oregon State Fair and at the Portland and Sacramento Chambers of Commerce and various other occasions we have dispensed it. Our mineral waters give Ashland much favorable publicity.

Auto Camp and Tourist Dept.
The Chamber has consistently endeavored to actively support the program of the Auto camp and to make suggestions as well

as furnish some improvement each year. Our vacationist cottages have been in use and proven their worth in providing our visitors who could not otherwise be retained in Ashland. A fine Tent cottage has been donated to the Auto camp and been a source of revenue to the camp. The Chamber has instituted and carried out a plan for making Ashland camp still the "Best in the West," and this year will have a committee to constantly co-operate with the Park Board in plans for hospitality.

Entertainment Dept.

We have not been able to cope with the demands for this work with our present organization. The opportunity for showing distinguished guests about Ashland and the points of interest nearby has been ever present and the manager's car and person has been donated to this work to the extent of ability, and the various organizations have done effective work in entertaining visiting groups, such as the Cherrians, when the Lithians were the hosts for Ashland. The Normal School is entertained in some way each year, and fruits, Lithia water, etc., have been placed on the train for parties passing through our city. Assistance has been given the Civic Club in entertaining the Federated Clubs and much has been done by individual members along this line. June 13, of last year was our special entertainment day, when we cared for the five Co's of Coast Artillery of Oregon, particularly as hosts for our own company. A fine banquet was served in the Armory and various stunts and programs carried out by the companies participating, aside from the grand review by Governor Pierce and staff. Many distinguished guests have been cared for at our luncheons and banquets during the past year, and this is a feature which we should pay more attention to as a hospitality and greeting organization.

Retail Trade

Stimulation of the Trade at Home idea has been one of the features of our work the past year and a series of films were shown at the Vining Theatre with this special idea. "With Ashland Trade is Ashland Made," Should be the slogan of every member of the Ashland Chamber of Commerce. The only way our merchants can compete as to quality and price of goods is with our full support. A committee is formulating new plans to reach our outside territory and co-operation of our membership in such plans will be invited and urged.

Trade days have been conducted during the past year in connection with our celebration July 3, being especially designated as such, and also during the week of our Winter Fair. These special weeks bring in large numbers of people and create business at a period which is normally quiet. More advantage, however, may be taken of these special occasions.

Celebrations and Conventions.
July 4th, Celebration
Ashland's Lithians have assumed full charge of the celebration of Independence Day at the instigation and request of the Chamber of Commerce Directors. A special appropriation, however, is made from the Chamber of Commerce Budget Funds, and "Every dollar carefully expended," is the watchword as well as a "Bigger and Better Fourth."

The Winter Fair brings each year new exhibitors from all over Oregon and may be so conducted as to bring many more visitors and much publicity. The Poultry show is now recognized as one of the leading shows on the coast and should be kept well to the fore-front. The practical as well as the show end of the poultry industry may be featured in our future shows to a greater extent and the adaptability of this section, to this particular business may well be advertised more extensively. It is confidently expected that next year may bring us some large conventions, invitations having been extended along this line.

Industrial Development
Three separate and distinct projects have occupied the attention of the Chamber during the past year. The Shale Oil Fields, the Cannery and a Box Factory. With the successful inauguration of our new cannery last year, and the promise of further enlargement and development of this, we may well congratulate ourselves. The Chamber has given assurance of active support in the selection of a site, or such other support as may be of a practical nature, toward the establishment of a box factory, which shall utilize the raw material so abundantly available, and favorable response has been given from at least one source which promises direct results in the future.

The Chamber has furthered the road building program in connection with the Shale Oil development, and secured the assistance of the County along this line. A site has also been secured for further development closely adjacent to the city, and in accordance with the expressed wish of

the membership we have devoted a considerable portion of our Budget Funds to this project. This is a great experiment along the lines of opening our undeveloped resources, and the magnitude of undertaking is not fully understood, but with a successful outcome, more visitors may be expected in Ashland for the purpose of observing this activity, than we can realize.

Normal and Summer Schools
In accordance with our plan for demonstrating the need of an up-to-date Normal School and opportunity for southern Oregon in this particular we have continued to aid and support financially a plan and have undertaken the special advertising and such other portions of this program as possible. Effort has been made to secure other schools for the summer months and this season will be the first of "The Ashland Art School" undertaken by teachers from the Pratt Institute of Brooklyn, N. Y.

These are a few of the more important undertakings of your Chamber which have been carried out. More adequate hotel accommodations have been advocated and worked for continually and consistently and while we are better equipped than ever before with the splendid addition and improvement to the Hotel Ashland. The demand that Ashland take a step ahead in this direction as in her Auto Camp is still apparent.

BONES FOUND WHERE TOWN WAS BURIED

CALGARY, Alberta, May 19.—Road workers have found several skeletons where a landslide in 1902 wrecked the town of Frank, Alberta, according to a dispatch from Blairmore, Alberta, published by the Calgary Herald. Police have been placed on guard, because the Union bank of Frank was buried by the slide.

The skeletons were believed to be those of a family named Clark. A pocket knife and a few other small articles were found. Frank, a mining town of 400 population in Crows Nest Pass, 100 miles south of here, was destroyed when the face of a mountain broke away and covered the town. The slide consisted largely of rock. Warning of the approaching disaster enabled most of the people to flee, but 57 were killed.
