## WALLACE GIVES CO-OPERATIVE MARKETING RULES

Secretary of Agriculture Defines Ten Principles Essential to Success for Bank Association.

Ten principles requisite for the success of co-operative marketing plans have been prepared by Secretary of Agriculture Wallace for the State Bank Division of the American Bankers Association, which has just published a nation-wide compilation of views, experiences and discussions regarding the movement. Mr. Wallace's principles are:

1. A co-operative organization must be controlled by its members, not as shareholders or investors, but as producers employing the facilities of the organization.

2. A co-operative association is not operated to make a profit on invested capital above the usual rate of interest, but to profitably market the products of its members at the lowest possible cost.

3. A co-operative association should be organized around a single commodity, or a group of commodities, for which the same marketing machinery, methods and channels are employed.

4. The organization should have sufficient volume of business to enable it to operate efficiently and economically, and should control this business through definite legal contracts with its members.

5. The organization must perform definite functions. The organization of a co-operative marketing association is not an end in itself.

6. The members must understand the purposes of the organization and be kept fully informed regarding its activities and problems.

7. A co-operative association should have expert management. The duties of the manager of a co-operative association are more difficult than those of the manager of a commercial enterprise of equal size. The manager must not only conduct the business of the organization efficiently, but he must recognize the close, personal interest of every member in that business, and be able to maintain harmonious contacts with each individual.

8. Proper accounting is essential. Accounting is one phase of management but is so important in co-operative marketing that it is given special mention. The manager cannot be properly advised regarding the status of the organization, nor properly inform the members, without accurate records.

9. Sound financial policies are also a part of management, but are of sufficient importance to be placed under a separate heading. One essential is that a co-operative association should build up adequate reserves in order that it may have the financial strength necessary to weather periods of stress.

10. A co-operative organization should be self-perpetuating. It should have a definite legal status, and once it is organized it should be so conducted that it would never be necessary to call upon outside agencies to re-establish the organization or shape its policies.

## WHAT BANKERS THINK OF THE LABOR BANKS

With the advent of the labor bank three years ago, there was widespread speculation as to what labor turning capitalist would mean.

By bold calculations the most imaginative pictured a coup d'etat in finance wrought by the mobilization of labor's savings and strategic investments in the key industries. Prophecies of disaster came from the quarters of the other extremists.

Taking the middle ground was the great group of conservative bankers who saw the bank as a link—rather than a wedge—between capital and labor. It was their opinion that the experience gained in the management of the labor banks would bring a real understanding of the business of handling money and investments and develop a knowledge of the problems of capital. By making capitalists out of the workers, directing the investment of their funds into safe securities instead of wilder stocks and by promoting thrift, they saw good flowing from the enterprise. With the mystery taken out of banking, the bubble of fabulous earnings pricked, and the right of an individual to his accumulated savings firmly established, it was patent that the radicals would be disarmed of their thrust against the much-assailed capitalist system. On the other hand, it was conceded that, with the rise of labor as a factor in finance, opportunities for the abuse of the worker by the bludgeon of credit control would be more restricted.

In their appraisal of the movement, the events of the past two years have largely justified the view of the conservatives, although the time is still too short to permit a mature judgment. It is quite clear, however, that labor has not revolutionized banking; the control of money has not been diverted from its former channels.

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## Health Hints by the Father of Physical Culture

Many people "catch cold" every month in the year, and often two or three times a month. Very few get off with less than three colds a year; so that an annual average of five catarrhs would probably be an under-estimate. For the United States alone that would give us a yearly aggregate of three hundred and fifty-five million "colds."

That such facilities for investigation have failed to correct the errors of our exegetical theory is surely a striking proof how exclusively our dealings with disease have been limited to the endeavor of suppressing the symptoms, instead of ascertaining and removing the cause. For, as a test of our unbiased faculty of observation the degree of that failure would lead to rather unpronounceable conclusions. What should we think of the scientific acumen of a traveler who, after a careful examination of the available evidence, should persist in maintaining that mosquitoes are engendered by frost and exterminated by sunshine?

In all civilized countries of the colder latitudes, catarrhs are frequent in winter and early spring, and less frequent in midsummer; hence the inference that catarrhs are caused by cold weather and can be cured by warm air.

Yet of the two fallacies, the mosquito theory would on the whole, be the less preposterous mistake, for it is true that long droughts, by parching out the swamps, may sometimes reduce the mosquito plague, but no kind of warm weather will mitigate a catarrh. While the patient persists in doing what thousands never cease to do the year round, namely to expose their lungs, night after night, to the vitiated, sickening atmosphere of an unventilated bedroom, "Colds" are, indeed, less frequent in midwinter than at the beginning of spring. Frost is such a powerful disinfectant that in very cold nights the lung-poisoned atmosphere of few houses can resist its purifying influence; in spite of padded doors, in spite of "weather-strips" and it reduces the indoor temperature enough to paralyze the floating disease-germs.

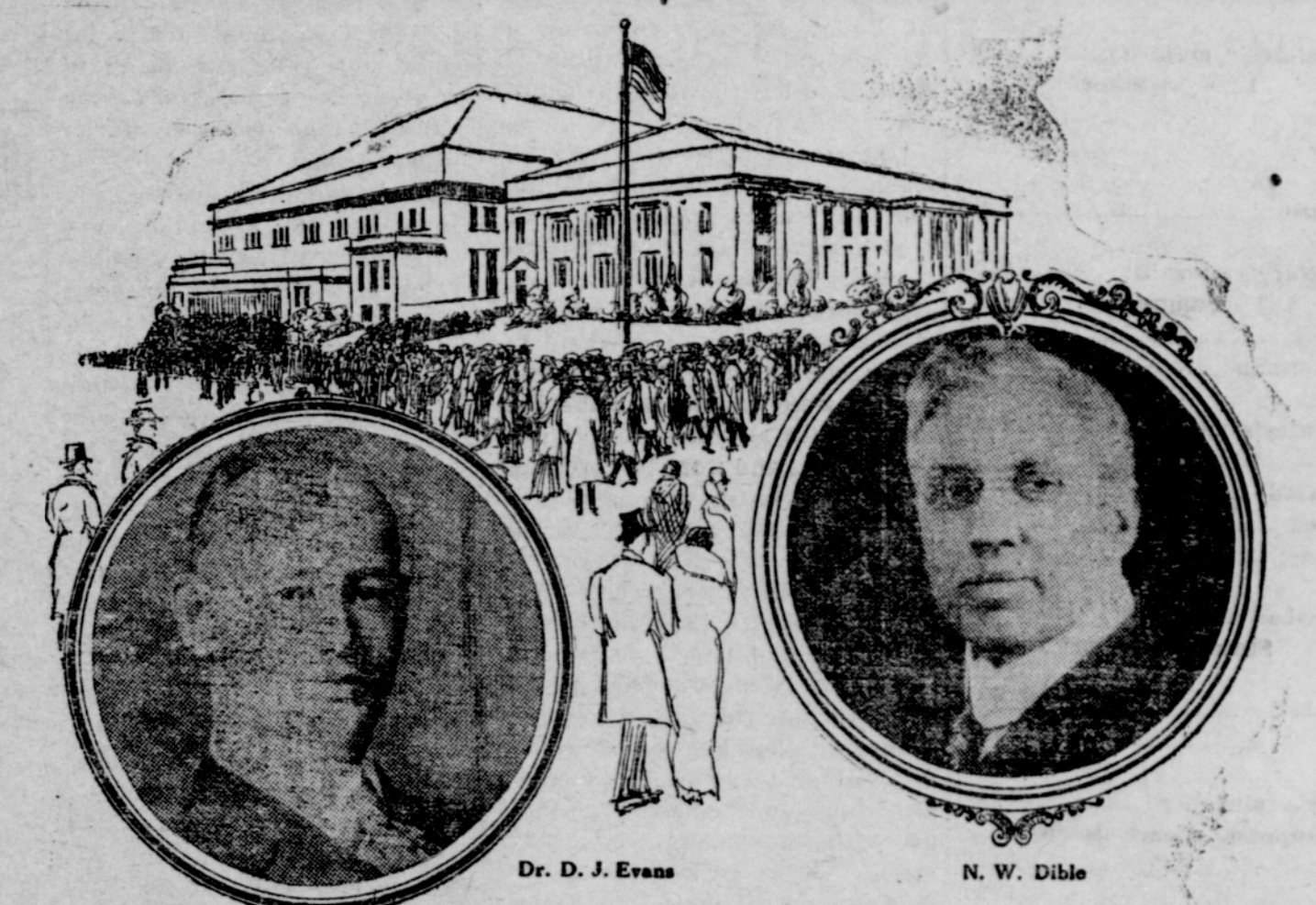

## MASS THOUSANDS IN MODEL BIBLE CLASS

At the Milwaukee meeting of the Northern Baptist Convention, the Bible class methods that have made a Kansas City church famous will be demonstrated by a class numbering thousands. This is a part of the convention program which the laymen of the denomination have arranged and every Northern Baptist Church has been urged to send at least one lay representative. There is extraordinary interest in Bible study at the present time, but a Bible class of men numbering 100 is exceptional and an average attendance is about 25. Therefore when the First Baptist Church of Kansas City holds the interest of men to such a degree that 3000 of them turn out every Sunday to attend the Bible class conducted by Dr. D. J. Evans and N. W. Dible, other churches want to know how the thing is done.

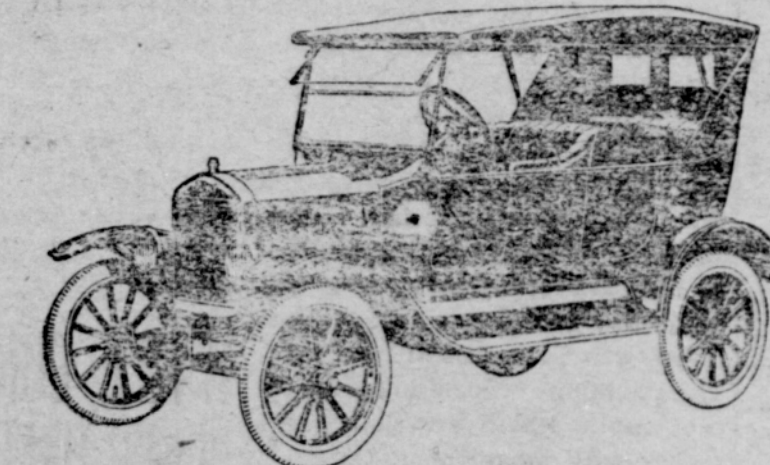
The Baptists meet in Milwaukee on May 28th and Sunday morning, June 1st is the time set apart for the Bible class demonstration. Dr. Evans and

Mr. Dible will have charge and they will reproduce for the instruction of the delegates every feature of the usual Sunday morning class as conducted in the Kansas City church. In order to gain the mass effect that results from the numbers that assemble in Kansas City, all Baptist men's Bible classes within a distance of 100 miles from the convention city have been asked to forego their usual session on June 1st and instead to visit Milwaukee and attend the model class. Bible classes of other denominations in Milwaukee and the suburbs of the city have also been invited to take part. At the same hour, in another hall, a similar model class for women will be conducted by Miss Jessie Burrall.

Dr. Evans is pastor of the First Baptist Church of Kansas City and Mr. Dible is president of the Bible class that has made such a remarkable record for attendance in a contest with a Baptist church at Long Beach, Cal., the Kansas City class turned out more than 50,000

men in one day, but that spectacular achievement is not pointed to as an example of what can be expected in the ordinary course of events.

The Baptist laymen will figure conspicuously in the 1924 convention of the denomination. Their organization has been a good deal strengthened during the past year and the membership has been made to understand that the voice of the layman is much desired in the meeting. Two evenings of convention week, Thursday and Saturday, have been assigned by the program committee to the Council of Northern Baptist Laymen. Speakers of national reputation have been engaged for these sessions, among them G. Sherwood Eddy, Dr. Axling of Tokio, prominent in Baptist missionary work in Japan; James C. Colgate of New York, Gov. Carl Milliken of Maine, George W. Coleman of Boston, A. M. Harris of New York, A. L. Scott of Boston and Corwin Shank of Seattle.



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
