THE FORUM

"SERVICE TO OUR COUNTRY IN TIME OF WAR MEANS SACRIFICE."—Calvin Coolidge.
The above is his message vetoing the adjusted compensation bill.

No rational citizen can quarrel with that statement if it is applied to the personnel of the armed forces of the nation and their relatives and dependents. To this class of our people does it apply; and to no other class can it be applied, even by the most tortuous line of reasoning. This means in concrete figures, that approximately five per cent of our population, in an emergency like the late World War, is called upon to carry the entire burden of sacrifice, while the other 95 per cent either remains unharmed, or profits in material wealth by the exigencies of the nation in peril.

Would it be unreasonable to ask that, in case of future wars, this burden of sacrifice be spread to cover the entire population of the country? How could this be done? Simply by having conscription apply to every citizen and have that citizen serve wherever his service would do the most good; and allow no person, no corporation, to make one cent profit upon wartime activities. Guarantee food, clothing and a nominal wage to all and make graft and exploitation impossible. Under such a system patriotism would be brought home to each individual, and the world would really come to mean something besides the sacrifice of the few for the enrichment of the many.

Graft and profiteering in wartime are the twin curses of this country and no one is to blame but ourselves. We could stop it over night by conscripting all persons and all industries.

Have we the nerve and the foresight to do this?

The answer is up to you.

The dainty supper was served on small tables, made attractive by the use of pink crepe paper decorations for the plates and nut baskets. Bud vases containing pink roses adorned each table.

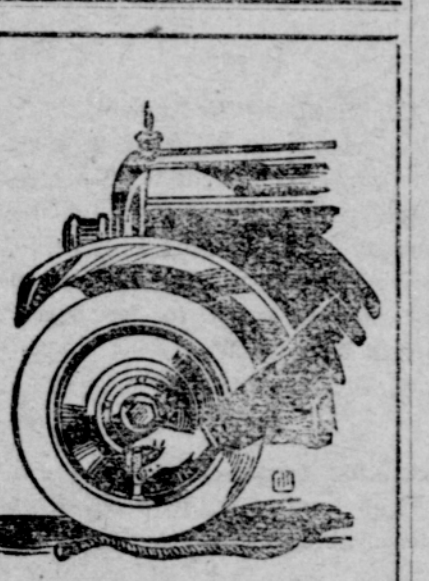
