both schools. In this connection, it is well to state that the Chamber of Commerce is rendering valuable assistance to both schools.

Irving E. Vining, president of the State Chamber of Commerce, revealed the possibilities of the coming Mile-High highway celebration and urged that every resource be thrown behind the event to make it of sufficient importance to attract state wide interest. He also gave the information that Judge Wm. Duby, chairman of the Sate Highway Commission, would be in attendance at the celebration, and that R. A. Booth, former member of the commission, would also attend and address the audience. He related that Mr. Booth is billed to appear in Portland on June 2, and in Vancouver, B. C., June 6, but rather than disappoint those sponsoring the celebration, has arranged a schedule that would permit him to attend the dedication of the Ashland-Klamath Falls highway on June 4, but at great sacrifice, considering his age.

At the suggestion of Mr. Vining, Bend will be asked to provide a speaker for the occasion; inasmuch as the products of Rogue River valley are finding a market in that rapidly growing city, because of the facilities afforded by the new highway.

Hartzell lead the ticket in the county race.

An analysis of the county judge race shows that Gardner carried 18 precincts including all of Ashland with the exception of West Ashland, a precinct really outside of the city, Jacksonville, Applegate, etc., while Hartzell carried all the remaining thirty-eight precincts, including every precinct in Medford.

The strong Coolidge sentiment is reflected in the choice for delegates to the republican national convention, William Carter of Portland, pledged to Coolidge leading, Mrs. Bishop, also for Coolidge second, and Phil Metchan another Coolidge supporter third. The Johnson delegates were hopelessly distanced.

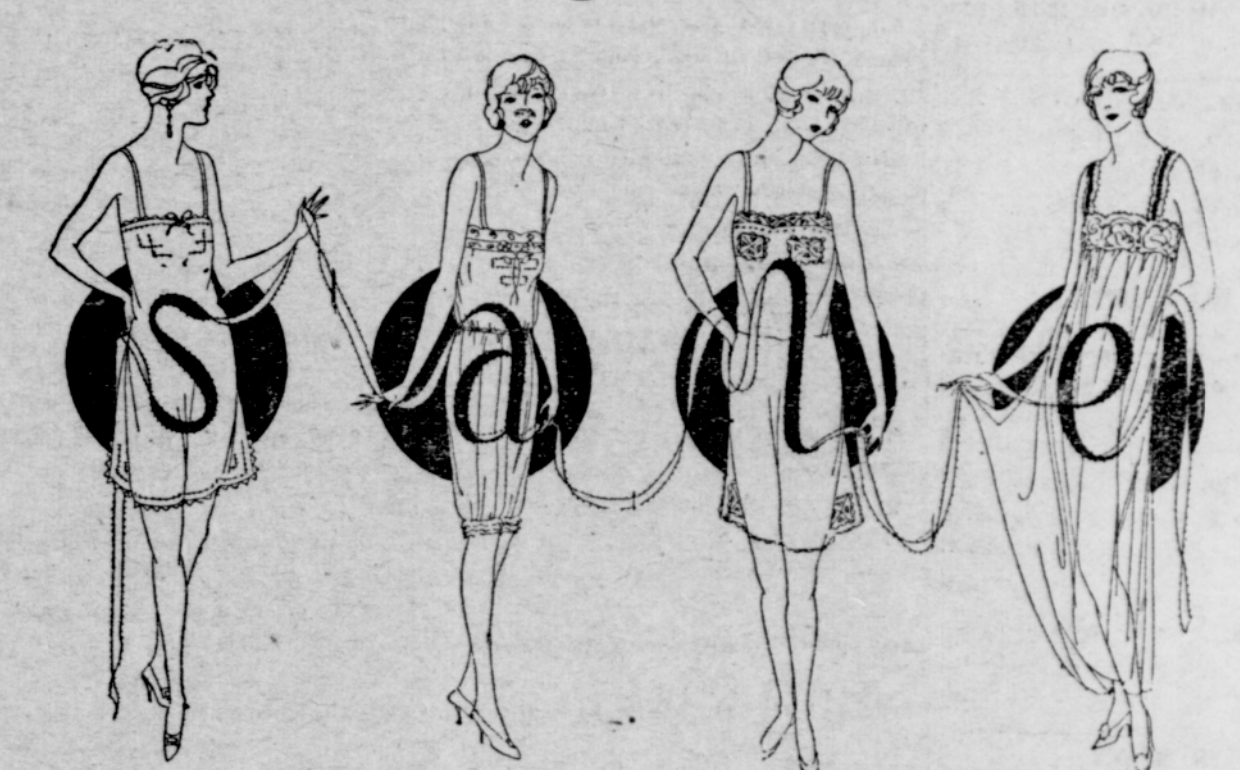
