DEFEATING THE BONUS VETO

The defeat of President Coolidge's veto of the bonus bill is apparently well received by the public in general and leaves the chief executive in an unfavorable position. That he has engendered the displeasure of nearly every man who served during the recent World War became evident 24 hours following his special message which accompanied the veto. Nor is the displeasure limited to ex-service men only, for there are thousands, yes millions of American men and women, who feel that the insurance plan proposed for those who offered themselves to save liberty to the world was only just recognition and regret that it called for quibbling and outright opposition, particularly from the head of the nation.

That opposition to the bonus, or insurance plan as it deserves to be called, was centered in those who made the most from the recent bloody conflict is a matter of public knowledge, and whether or not this fact influenced the action of the president matters, not, for ex-service men will not be quick to forget his effort to defeat the recognition to which their service entitles them.

SUPPORT THE BUDGET

Early next week the Chamber of Commerce budget committee will begin its campaign to raise the budget for the current year. The items, ten in all, have appeared in the Tidings and each will be explained daily in our columns so that there can be no misunderstanding the purposes for which the money is desired. Using a short cut in construction, a chamber of commerce or no public commercial organization can exist, let alone succeed, without reasonable funds. The demands made by the budget committee are all for worth-while projects and it is imperative that the full amount be raised. Each and every item are reduced to a minimum. The organization is not asking for a cent more than its requirements demand. Comparatively, the amount the committee seeks to procure in Ashland is far below the sum asked by like organizations in many towns no larger than Ashland.

Money given over to work of this nature is only an investment and will return good dividends. When you make your subscription to the budget remember that driving forces that seek to place your city and community to the front, are deserving and must receive moral support not only, but liberal financial backing.

SAD NEWS

There is a good deal of depressing news in this world. Life is like that, and probably it can't be changed at this late date.

Along comes a copy of the Memphis Commercial Appeal, ordinarily an optimistic contemporary, but forced, as all good newspapers are, to print bad tidings along with the good.

The disheartening information noted in the Memphis journal is that the strawberry weevil had made its appearance. It has struck Gibson County, Tenn., which we take to be one of Nature's greenhouses where the strawberry thrives best; or until the Ashland variety is ripe. The boll weevil punctures the bud on the vine, and for every punctured bud takes a berry from the box.

Now anybody knows that there aren't very many berries in a box in the first place. Getting down to more concrete facts, the Commercial Appeal quotes a county agent as saying that "some fields show a damage to the extent of 10 per cent."

That's too much. Take 10 per cent of a strawberry shortcake—even one of Mother's—and what have you? You haven't enough strawberry shortcake, that's what you have.

It would seem to us that it is about time the Commercial Appeal did something to abate this wrong.

"OPENED BY MISTAKE"

A Boston surgeon told a convention of his peers—that that is the word—that this is an age of hospitals, and that most of them are inefficient. This country has 7,000 hospitals, he said, with 500,000 patients, and 10 per cent of the population go into hospitals every year. Further he asserted that among the most inefficient hospitals are those connected with teaching institutions, and among the least inefficient ones are some of the smaller hospitals.

Considering incorrect diagnosis, he charged that 90 cases of bone sarcoma reported, virtually every one represented a mistake in diagnosis. Legs were amputated when they should not have been, and patients died without the operating surgeon knowing for sure whether they should have died or lived, he said.

Well, if the surgeons are to air their professional men in public, laymen will look at the spectacle and wonder. The business of mending people is important

to the nation and the citizens directly concerned. A surgeon may be satisfied with the patients who keep him, but the patients would probably be nearer cure with more assurance that the surgeons would keep them. It would seem that a surgeon and his patient are too soon parted. There is cold comfort for any one in receiving a package labeled, "opened by mistake."—The Nation's Business.

PORTLAND DIVIDED
OVER BOBBED HAIRQuestion Backs Volstead Act off
Boards; Shall Queen Be
Shorn or Not.

PORTLAND, May 22.—They say that the question of whether "to bob or not to bob" is rapidly displacing the Volstead act as a subject of pre and after-dinner conversations and about the American firesides.

Certainly Portland has heard enough—if not too much on the subject, which many women are prone to declare is decidedly their own business. Only recently District Judge Hawkins, after mature deliberation and careful consideration, handed down an opinion that a beauty parlor specialist was entirely within her rights in bobbing heads and was not infringing on the sacred duties of a barber, since she did not shave or trim the whiskers.

Now the Rose Festival management is conducting a city-wide poll of opinions to determine if the queen of this year's Rose Festival should be of the flowing tresses variety as pictured in regal circles or whether as a modern queen she should be shorn of her locks.

The Women's New Thought club of Portland has voted 16 to 1 in favor of short locks for the Rose Festival queen. Reasons for favoring abbreviated locks were summed up as follows:

"Bobbed hair saves time. It is a symbol of woman's emancipation from man. It is a symbol of freedom. It is an expression of a new era for women. It is a symbol of honesty and truth."

Only one lone champion remained to defend flowing tresses of yesterday. She is Mary Ellen Henderson, who says she is "fat and short."

"Do the pages of history recall any bobbed-haired queen," she pertinently asks. "Not to my knowledge. I disapprove of a flapper queen type. If a 'bobby' should be elected to the high position it is my belief she should don a wig or provide some other means of producing the truly becoming headpiece of a queen."

The irony of the whole contest is that mere man is not to have any final say or vote in settling the issue. True enough, he may attempt to influence his better half in voting, but his own ballot is not for the ballot box. It's a foregone conclusion, men, say, that a 'bobby' will be selected since the great majority of women are shorn and those who are not are either too old or too fat to look becoming in the new style which has swept the country and made beauty parlor attendants among the landed gentry.

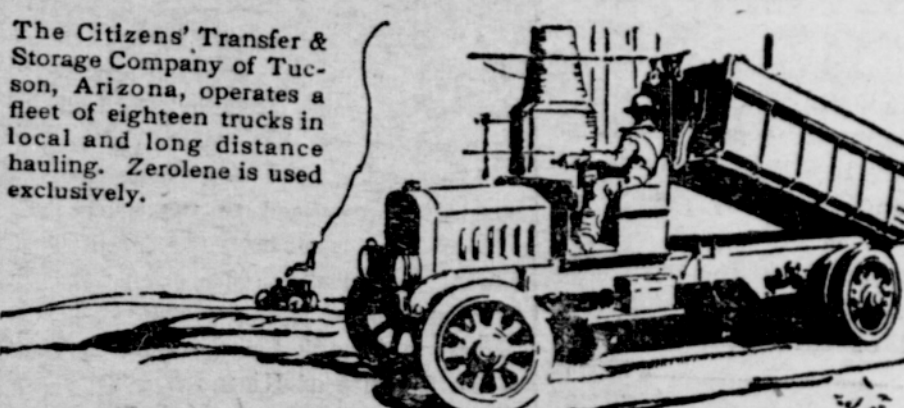
