CHARGES BASED ON MISINFORMATION

The drive being made by the Budget committee of the Chamber of Commerce reveals that a few refuse to subscribe to the budget, giving as a reason the "overhead expenses of the organization are too heavy." The charge is either based on misinformation or is used as a pretext to avoid contributing to the fund. Any person in the least acquainted with the expense of maintaining the office of the Chamber of Commerce knows that the item of expense is far less than that of any other like organization in Oregon, population compared. The cost to Medford of maintaining her chamber of commerce is double that incurred in Ashland. The same condition applies in Marshfield, Bend, La Grande, The Dalles, Grants Pass, and in fact every town in the state with equal population. The salary of the secretary is less than that paid that official in any of the foregoing towns. There is less office equipment and in fact the general expense is less locally than elsewhere.

Another point of information is that the Ashland Chamber of Commerce is asking for less money than called for by the budgets of other commercial organizations, and it is no misstatement to say that it is insufficient to carry on the work as effectively as conditions warrant. The amount adopted by the Budget committee, composed of conservative business men, is as small as it is possible to make it and operate the chamber of commerce on anything like an efficient basis.

The charge constitutes one criticism undeserved by the Chamber of Commerce, and fairness demands that the truth of the matter be given.

THIS IDYLIC SEASON

Many things are seasonable in summer—such as fresh fruit, garden vegetables, vacationing, circuses, sleeping porches, swimming, baseball and golf—but from the workman's point-of-view it just seems as though summer is first of all the season for straight-away, unadulterated and undisturbed loafing. And when we use "workman" in this connection we mean every man and woman who is earning a living, every woman and man who is keeping house and every boy and girl who is going to school or college.

The economist who discovers a means whereby the world can earn a living without working, deserves a good paying public office and to be pensioned. Even though the formula has not been discovered there should be great fortune-making possibilities in high-powered advertising of such a prescription secretly discovered and offered to a distressed public for the first time.

Mother hasn't the energy to prepare better and the other members of the family haven't the energy to eat that which she has provided.

So it is resolved that summer was made for hammocks, ice-cold lemonade in the shade, a water-side cottage, a loafing automobile or anything whatsoever except work.

Meet Started Career as a Child

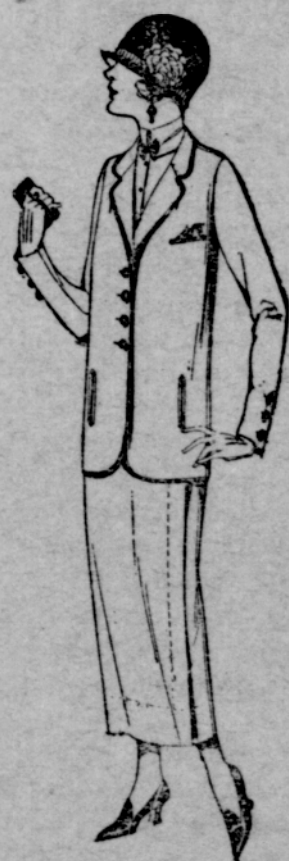
MISS ANNA B. HOOPER, M.D.

CHICAGO, May 25—Miss Anna B. Hooper, daughter and secretary of Ben W. Hooper, chairman of the United States Railroad Labor Board will go to the Cleveland convention as delegate from Tennessee. Her selection for that position at the recent Republican State convention held at Knoxville, Tenn., is the latest distinction of several she has achieved politically.

She was Dixie's youngest and prettiest protagonist of feminism; she was one of the earliest leaders of the suffrage movement, while yet in short skirts and pigtails; she is now secretary to the Chairman of the United States Railroad Labor Board, one of the Government's most important boards.

Miss Hooper has always taken a keen interest in things political. She traveled through the State of Tennessee with her father during his campaign for Governor. Although Governor Hooper was against woman suffrage she converted him to the cause and was instrumental in getting him to put

ABE EVANS WILL

FACE SANITY TEST

SALEM, May 28—Abe Evans, who has been in the state penitentiary here for two years awaiting execution for the murder of James Doran of Wasco county, tomorrow will be transferred to the Oregon state hospital, where he will be examined for sanity. The examination was ordered by Governor Pierce.

Since his arrival at the penitentiary Evans has made a number of unsuccessful attempts to commit suicide. He recently has been employed in the prison yards, and officials reported today that his mental condition apparently was improved.

Evans is under sentence to be hanged April 6, unless examining physicians find him insane.

Health Hints
by the
Father of
Physical Culture

The statement in a previous article of mine that walking will cure practically every known disease, may seem far-fetched, some people may say, but I believe every word to be absolutely true.

First of all convince yourself that walking will bring increased vitality. Then thoroughly assure yourself that increased vitality will ultimately give you the vigor and strength which are necessary to effect the cure of your complaint.

Walk, walk, once a day or twice a day or several times a day, as you may find time, but the most effective method is to take one or two extended walks. Walk the first day until you begin to feel fatigued. Note the length of time required in this walk. Now the next day increase your walk from two to five minutes. Every day increase the time from two to five minutes.

If your walk is taken on two or more occasions during the day, keep the thought in mind of gradually increasing the distance of your walk every day.

This process, if continued day by day until you may be walking two, three, four, five, six or even eight hours a day, should gradually increase your vitality and strength. It will make you stronger throughout your entire organism. It should increase your stamina to such an extent that whatever symptoms of disease you may be harboring in your organism will be absolutely eliminated.

If you walk barefooted, the results will be accomplished more quickly. If you walk in the country still more rapid results will be obtained, but you can walk in the city in shoes and you will still get results that should be entirely satisfactory.

If you walk with proper poise, you will get better results, than if you shamle along. The proper way to walk is with body erect, head back, chin in, chest prominent, abdomen free, do not draw abdomen in. Breathe abdominally. The abdominal regions should expand with each inhalation.

Do not point your toes outward. If you are bothered with flat feet, turn the toes inward slightly. This will strengthen the arches and will help materially to strengthen the feet.

At frequent intervals while you are walking, draw in a deep breath and hold it for as many steps as you can. Exhale the breath and walk as many steps as you can without inhaling air.

JEALOUS OF KILAUEA,
LASSEN SPOUTS STEAM

REDDING, Calif., May 28.—Apparently for the purpose of offsetting some of the attention Kilauea, the noted Hawaiian volcano, is drawing by her continued activity, Mt. Lassen yesterday staged a small eruption.

WASHINGTON FARMERS
DESERT WHEAT LANDS

OLYMPIA, May 28.—Wheat farmers of the state of Washington are hard pressed financially and are in many cases abandoning their farms, E. L. French, director of agriculture, declared today.

The wheat crop and market report places our state wheat returns at \$31.13 an acre," Mr. French said. "This figure is not reached by the wheat farmers of another state. And yet our wheat farmers are hard pressed financially and many are even abandoning their farms.

"Wheat yield of our state is 25 bushels an acre, while the general average over the United States is 13 1-2 bushels.

"The returns for wheat in this state in 1923 are placed at \$52,482,000 and this is the highest figure reached since 1919."

HAWAII INFLUX HIT
BY EXCLUSION BILL

Will Reduce Influx of Aliens 75
Per Cent; Half Are
Japanese.

HONOLULU, May 28.—Hawaii's yearly number of immigrants will be reduced by fully 75 per cent through the exclusion clause in the new immigration bill, in the opinion of Federal immigration officials stationed at this port.

Records at the immigration office show that most of the immigrants who arrive here are aliens, ineligible for naturalization. More than half of these are Japanese.

During the last ten years 37,211 Japanese have been admitted to the Territory and 31,038 Chinese, making an excess of arrivals of 6,175. Figuring in the births and deaths during that period, the Territorial Bureau of Vital Statistics estimates that the increase among persons of Japanese blood has been 37,500.

Up to the present time picture brides have been allowed to enter Hawaii, though they have been barred from the mainland for some years. Admission to Hawaii was granted because "the gentlemen's agreement" did not apply to this Territory, but to "Continental" United States.

Records show that during the eight-year period prior to 1919 there were 9,043 picture brides admitted to Hawaii.
