Fish Killed in Fields—

Thousands of small salmon, returning to the ocean to grow to maturity, are reported to be dying in fields where they have been left by irrigation ditches. One farmer from the Rogue River country was in Grants Pass yesterday with a bucket of 100 small fry fish which had been scooped out of a single pool in an alfalfa field, the fish having entered the irrigation canal while on the way to the ocean. They are not kept from the canals by screens and are left to die in the sun. The matter will be called to the attention of the proper authorities, according to the Courier, in an effort to have the ditches screened and prevent the killing of the young salmon.

OPEN BIDS COVERING 50 MILES OF HIGHWAYS

PORTLAND, May 28—Bids for the improvement of 50 miles of Oregon highways were opened by the State Highway commission and awards will be made tomorrow at the time of opening bids for the construction of the \$200,000 bridge across the Willamette at Harrisburg. Included in the projects is the surfacing of 10 miles of the Bailes-California highway between Dufur and White River; grading and surfacing the last section of the John Day highway in Gilliam county; graveling the Alsea mountain grade for six miles in improving the road between Corvallis and Waldport; grading Jetty creek-Brighton section of the Roosevelt highway in Tillamook county, and eliminating the dangerous entrance to Oregon City from the south by surfacing a new grade between Cenamah and Oregon City.

Vogues In Foods Too, Says Fashion Writer



THERE are vogues in foods, as well as in clothes, according to Ruth Stuyvesant, well known New York fashion editor, who in the intervals of interpreting to her readers the vagaries of the mode, finds time to philosophize on culinary matters. "Take carrots, for instance," said Miss Stuyvesant, suiting the action to the word. "Have you noticed the sudden wave of popularity for this vegetable. This is probably due to the enthusiasm of the beauty experts, from whose writings one gathers that it was a carrot and not an apple which

figured in the famous judgement of Paris, the first beauty contest on record. Be that as it may, carrots, especially at this time of the year, merit all the good things one can say of them, so I am going to give you a favorite recipe of mine for Carrot Fritters: Take 1 cup flour, 1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1 egg, 2-3 cup of milk. Sift the dry ingredients together, add the beaten egg and milk and beat until smooth. Force 3 cooked carrots through a sieve before adding Beat thoroughly and drop by spoonfuls into hot crisco. Drain and serve hot.

The surest safeguard against bad pictures is not the transference of responsibility to two or three censors, in a city or state, but the awakening of millions of parents to the duty of safeguarding every day the child's health, the child's friends, the child's reading and the child's entertainment. One of the signs of the passing of sensational pictures, with the era of parental neglect, is to be found in the new civic committees of the show, theatre and in the movie houses.

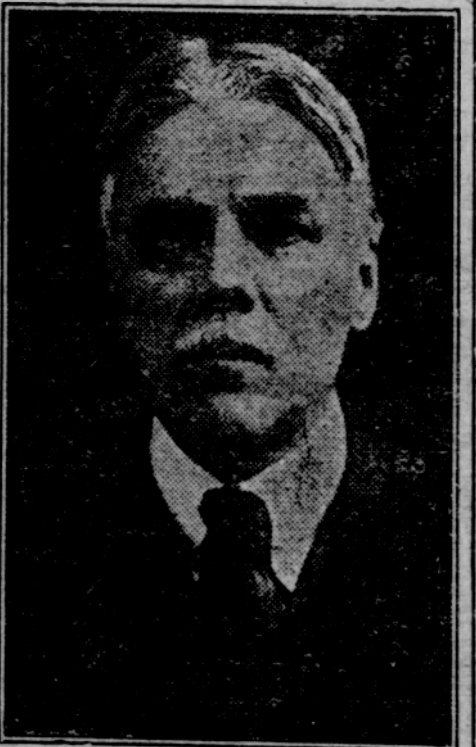
A few years ago the publishers inaugurated Children's Book Week, the National Government started Education Week and last year the National Committee for Better Films, interested in the improvement of photoplays, inaugurated Motion Picture Book Week.

Idealistic and Concrete

All the best forces of the country—producers, clubs, booksellers, librarians and community service bodies—are behind the Committee's splendid purpose. Its work has been not merely idealistic but concrete, as it has named certain photoplays made from books of keen human interest, of humor, of splendid adventure and of romance, which will hold the heart and mind and improve both. It is receiving the sincere help of producers and distributors, who are having these photoplays shown during Motion Picture Book Week in every city and town in the country.

The first purpose of the National Committee for Better Films has been to stimulate an interest in the right sort of motion picture. Its second purpose has been to supply the aroused desire.

Psychology of the Christmas Stamp

The Christmas stamp is comparatively a modern means of raising funds for charitable relief. It has been widely used by charitable organizations for specific drives or on certain holidays.

Recently, however, in the trail of the European War, there has been relief given not only in the old fields but also in those countries usually considered most prosperous, and the relief stamp has become a fixture in much relief work of wide scope. In line with this Dr. J. A. Morehead, executive director of the National Lutheran Council, 437 Fifth Ave., New York City, announces a new Christmas holiday stamp issued in sheets of ten, at one dollar a hundred, for use generally on letters and packages. The funds derived from the sale of this stamp will be used by the Council for European relief in places where the need is greatest. The stamp bears as its motto a statement of the first Christmas gift made to all the world: "God So Loved The World That He Gave His Only Begotten Son."

The National Lutheran Council has found the Christmas stamp very successful in the past," said Dr. Morehead. "There are many people who take real pleasure in

the little oft-repeated act of thoughtfulness which the use of these stamps requires. "It is not like a big gift once made. It is in a sense a continuous giving, and we think that it has thus a splendid psychological effect upon the people. After all, giving is a habit of thought, just as is the unwillingness to give, and any system of giving which requires the constant repetition in the mind of the 'will to give' is of great benefit to the particular cause, to the individual giver, and to the organization under whose auspices the gift is made. It comes eventually to the old maxim that to think right is to do right, and the use of the holiday stamp constitutes a most effective training in right thinking.

"Some one has said that the Christian ideal is a sum total of righteous habits. Of these not the least is the habit of giving to relieve suffering. "Europe today is filled with suffering, and for those who suffer the condition is extremely hard to bear, because so much actual want exists among peoples heretofore considered the richest in the world."

kind ever attempted in Ashland. The musical program will be an added feature under the direction of Mr. Turner, who sings gospel songs full of wit and humor. The management issues a call for singers to assist in the choir, and also for musical instruments for the choir.

The Alumni of Portland are in the lead, having made subscriptions totaling \$157,320. Practically all subscriptions are reported from graduates and former students themselves, as no general solicitation of the public is being made at this time.
