Ashland Music Study Club Meets—The Ashland Music Study Club held its last meeting for the year in the Presbyterian church parlors on Monday evening of this week.

With Miss Leona Marsters, the president, in the chair, much of business relative to the Club was enacted, chief of which, was the annual election, resulting in president, Mrs. J. H. Fuller; vice-president, Miss Imogene Wallace and Miss Estelle Jones as secretary and treasurer.

At the close of the session Miss Marsters called Mrs. Fuller to the chair, and in a graceful little speech, the office was accepted. A vote of appreciation was then given most heartily to the retiring officers and beautiful bouquets

of flowers presented, which ceremony was prefaced by an earnest little speech by Mrs. Putnam, in which the poem "Since Crossing Paths with You," was the happy finale.

Miss Wallace then took charge of the program, which was somewhat in the nature of a miscellaneous program, bringing out some features that had not been emphasized during the year.

"The Story of American Musical Clubs" was the subject discussed by Mrs. Putnam. In this excellent presentation of subject matter, Mrs. Frances Elliot Plummer was quoted as authority for the interesting array of facts cited.

The growth of musical organizations was traced from the old fashioned singing schools, to the more pretentious choral societies and musical festivals.

Beginning with the first organizations in 1717, the Moravian singing society in 1774, the organizations of the middle west—Ohio—particularly, the change from the old buckwheat to the round note—and the strong choral societies developed; the music conventions; the music teachers organization; the N.T.A., the Supervisors work were all noted, and the speaker closed with the an interesting discussion of the National Federation of Music from its small beginnings to its present status.

"Maud Powell" was the subject of a most interesting address by Mrs. J. R. Robertson. In this address a very delightful sketch of her life and work was given, covering her formative years and her wonderful successes as one of the foremost violinists, regardless of sex. Maud Powell (Mrs. Turner) died early in middle life, of a nervous breakdown in 1920, a lovely, lovable and gifted woman. There seems none to take her place. Some of her beautiful records were played, among them, "Deep River" and "At the Brook."

Mrs. J. H. Fuller gave a splendid review of Chas. T. Griffith, something of his life and training and his work. Eleven of his

groups were discussed. In the discussion of his output, the difference in style, the different schools reflected, the Diversity and beauty of his productions were dwelt upon at some length.

"We'll to the Woods and Gather May" was sung by Mrs. Fred Nell very sweetly to illustrate one of the various styles in which he wrote. Miss Wallace accompanied. "An Old Song Resung" by Mrs. L. N. Woodside afforded an excellent example of the work of the modern composer and another of his songs, "By Lonely Forest Pathway" was also sung beautifully by Mrs. Woodside with Miss Marsters at the piano. The Club appreciated the privilege in hearing these songs so perfectly interpreted by Mrs. Woodside.

Mrs. A. E. Woods then read a carefully prepared and most interesting paper on the foremost woman composer, Mrs. Beach; telling of her as a child prodigy; of her early compositions; of her marriage in 1885 to Dr. Beach, of her many musical interests and wonderful later compositions. Mrs. Beach had the distinction of obtaining her entire musical education in America. Two beautiful compositions, "Sonata in A Minor" and "Gaelic Symphony" played on the Victrola illustrated the beauty of her work.

The Club feels that the year's effort has been well worth while and the studies will be resumed with renewed zeal in September.

Hearty congratulations and good wishes are extended the young people, for a happy and prosperous future.

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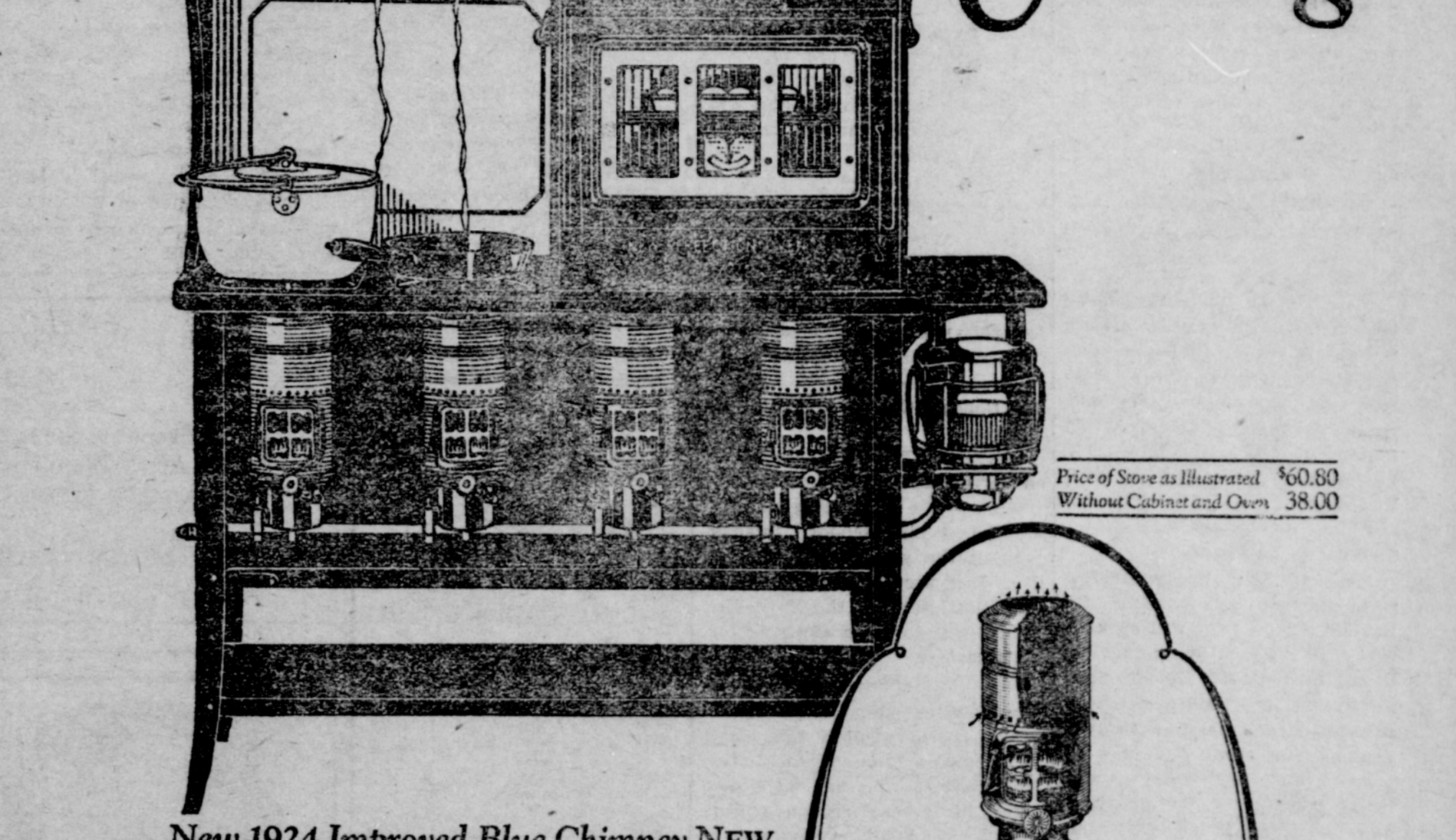
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
