MODELS OF YOUTHFUL CHARM

How cleverly the overblouse, both long and short, can be adapted to the needs of the well-dressed woman is illustrated here. The first design, suited to development in the crêpes, cottons or silks, falls almost to the hem of the plaited skirt, the oval neck being finished with a draped collar with tab ends. The ends of the collar are tied on the right shoulder. Medium size requires, for the blouse, 3½ yards 36-inch material, and for the skirt 4½ yards the same width. Nothing is smarter than a straight-line blouse and a plaited skirt, the two often constituting a semi-formal costume. The second model is carried out in powder-blue crepe de Chine. The blouse is gathered into a plain hip-band at the lower edge. The neck is finished with a round collar, while the sleeves are trimmed with turn-back cuffs. 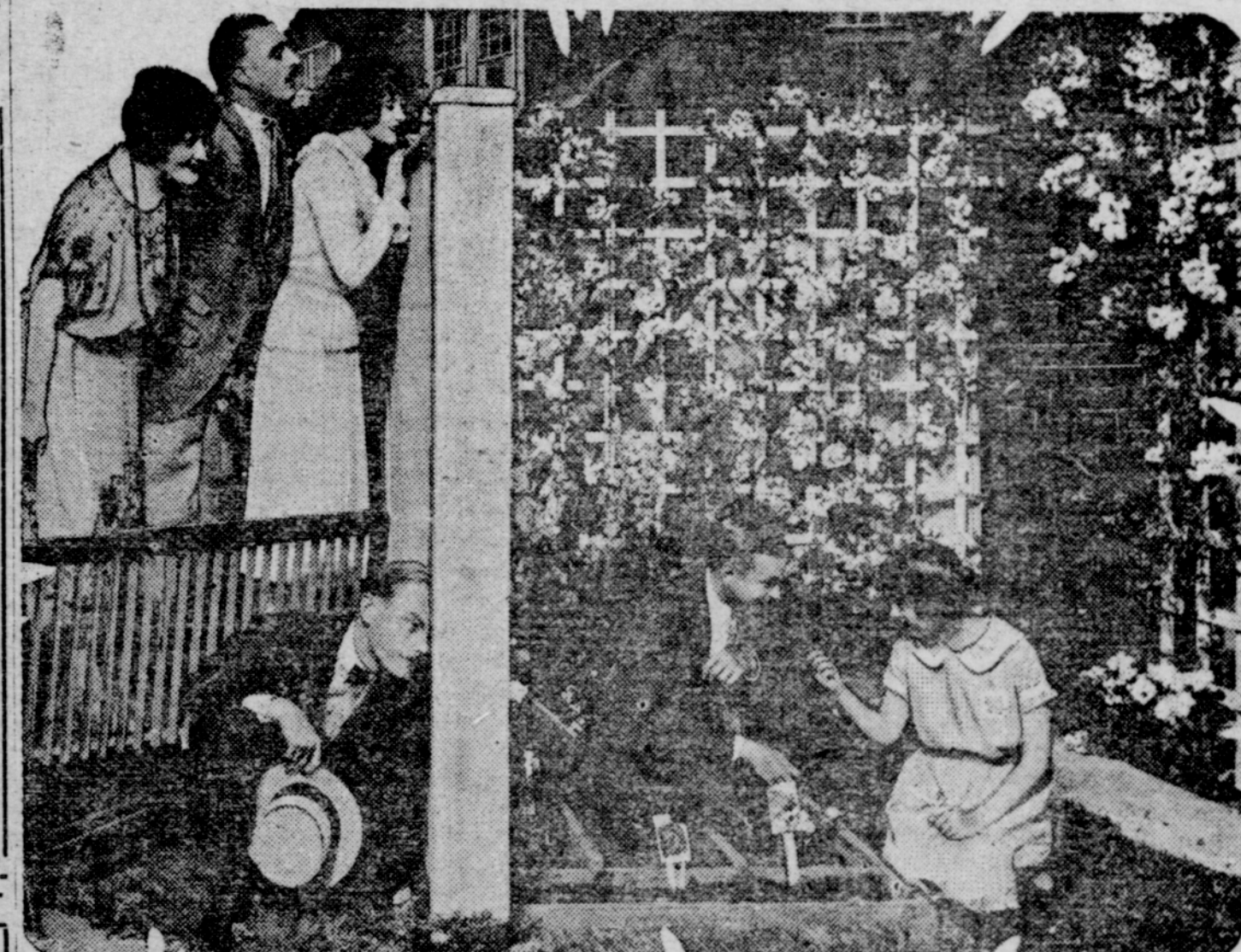

"SIX-CYLINDER LOVE" COMING

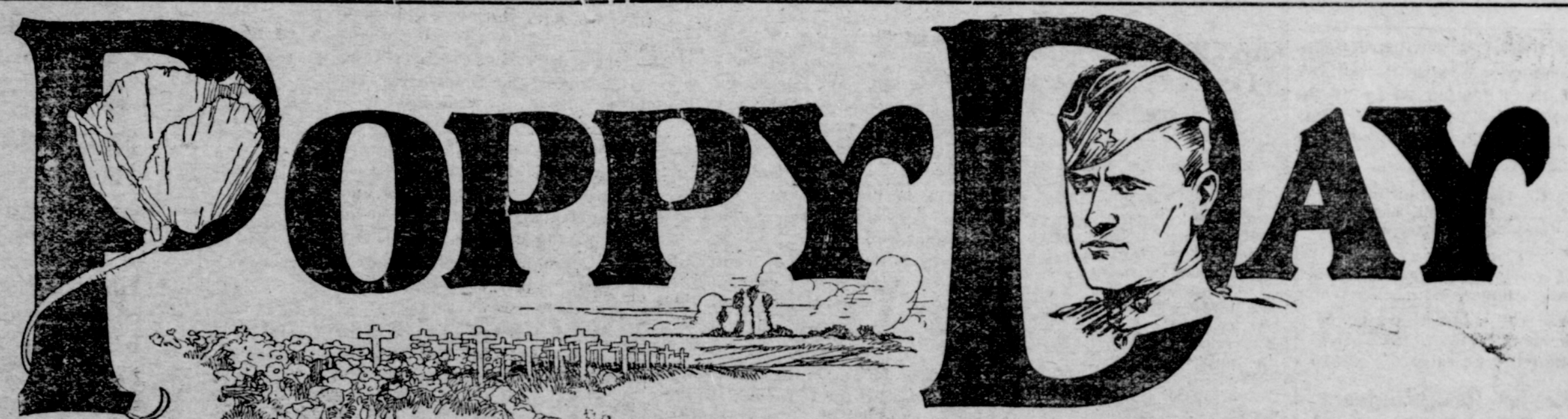
Popular Broadway Success to Open Chautauqua.
