Treatment of a sore throat: Absolutely no food must pass your lips as long as your throat is sore or you have a fever. Sometimes the skipping of one meal is sufficient, sometimes days are needed, but no matter. Putting food into a body already filled with more nutrient than can be utilized, and more refuse than can be eliminated, is like throwing more garbage into the yard. In one case it is joy to bacteria and the other comfort to flies. If you begin to fast early enough serious conditions will not develop. During the influenza epidemic in Chicago, we were able to prevent the development of all cases seen early enough by at once prohibiting food. Food is needed to "keep up strength" as is commonly taught eating to keep up strength, means eating to use up strength.

Get the alimentary canal as clear as possible, as quickly as possible, and keep it so. Take an enema of warm water and see that it does its work. Repeat the enema daily. Next, the whole tract should be swept out by means of a saline cathartic. Take a half bottle of Citrated magnesia at the morning of the first two days you are sick and a wineglassful on each succeeding day. Remember the liver, the great neutralizer of toxins, is excreting bile, whether you are eating or fasting, directly into the alimentary canal, and an initial cleansing of the tract is not sufficient. It must be done daily.

Take into your system as much water as you can. Swallowing may be painful, but warm or hot water can usually be taken comfortably. Do not be afraid of hot water, even though there is fever. By increasing kidney elimination the cause of fever is reduced. Kidney complications in acute diseases are due to lack of water in the system. Flaxseed juice may be added to the water. A mucilaginous drink, such as flaxseed tea, slippery elm water, or scacia, may be taken in glasses, as often as desired. Although air is important, we do not believe in the dictum, "plenty of fresh air" to the extent of the discomfort of the patient. The skin of the patient must be kept warm because we wish to keep the blood to the surface. We would rather say "have good ventilation in the room, but keep the patient warm."

SLOWUP IN BUSINESS
SEEN BY EXPERT

Good and Bad Factors in Present Situation Are Surveyed by Economist

for the better has yet appeared in the conditions and prospects of business. The most that can be said is that a process of readjustment in prices and production has begun.

The end of the existing recession in business, however, is not yet in sight. The peak in 1923 was built on great activity in the production of buildings and automobiles, and this basis is now rapidly weakening. There is a fairly large volume of buildings in process of construction, but the amount of contemplated new construction has fallen under the contracts actually awarded, and evidence of a general decline appears in the best indexes on building activity.

Money continues easy, with a tendency to declining rates on commercial paper. The idea that easy money makes business good has been discredited. The point now is that money is easy because there is little demand for it.

The reason for this is that profits are narrowing. The big problem in the business world now lies in the narrowing spread between commodity prices and wages. As long as prices are falling, while wages are maintained, there is but poor chance for good profits, and the demand for capital will be weak.

An important sign of the times is the decline in employment. This decline immediately reflects the recession in production and ultimately means a tendency toward reduced purchasing power among consumers.

Labor Troubles Forecast

The stage appears to be set for growing labor difficulties. Prices of consumers' goods will soon begin to follow the decline in the more basic materials, and the cost of living is already on the down grade. Nevertheless, laborers are demanding that wages be maintained or even increased. This makes an impossible situation.

The fundamental difficulty in American industry today is the existence of a war-stimulated over-capacity in many basic lines of industry. We are geared to produce more steel, copper, leather, textiles, automobiles, wheat and many other products that can normally be consumed by the existing population.

About the only thing in sight to cause an upturn in business at the present time is the possibility of inflation. It still exists, and the attitude of Congress toward Government finance is not encouraging. However, no appreciable signs of inflation have appeared to date.

With over capacity and with increasing stocks of most basic commodities, with decreasing wholesale prices and employment of labor, the most that can be hoped for at present is a gradual stabilization of industry on a considerably lower level than obtained throughout most of 1923.

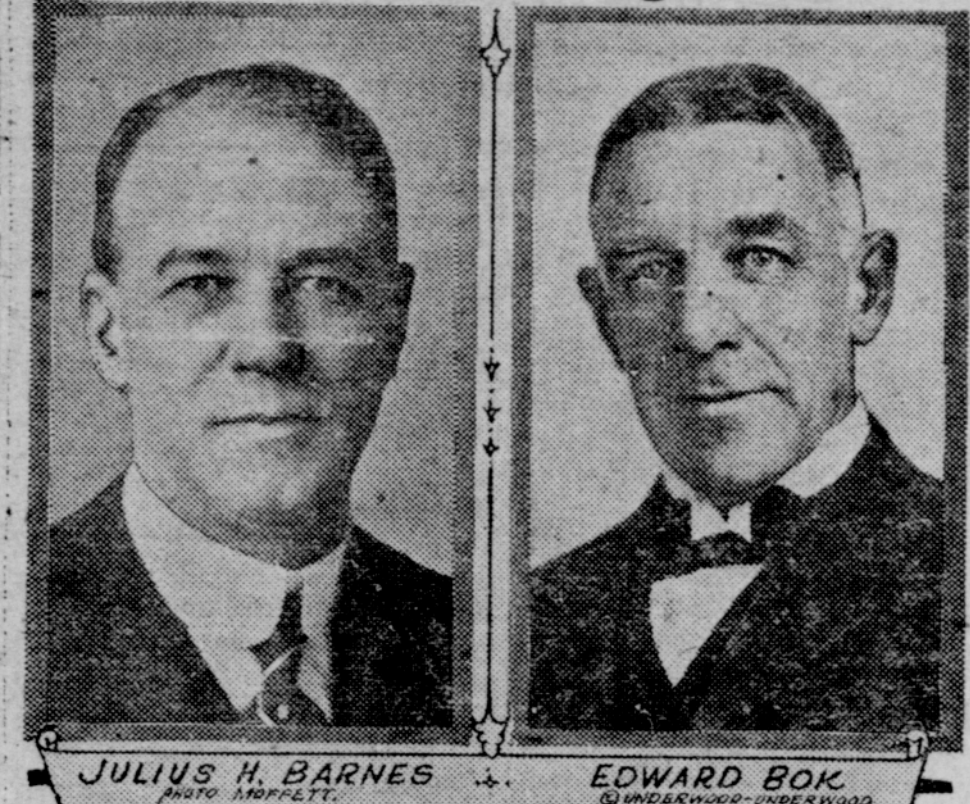

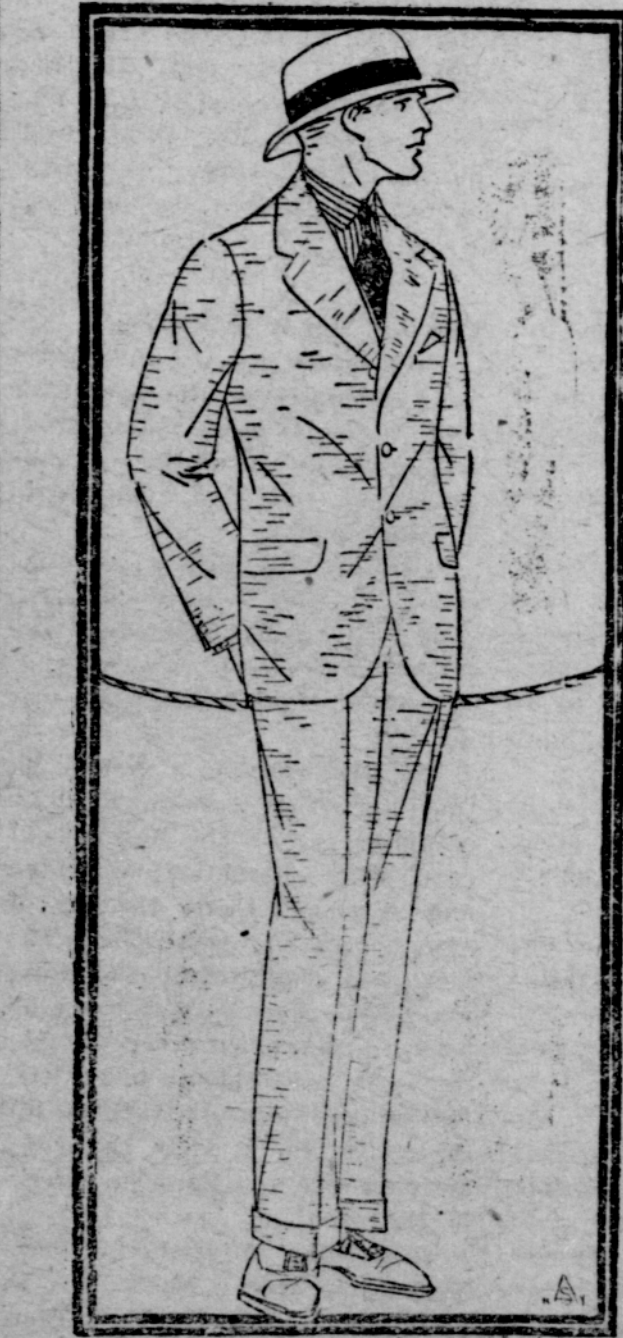

low, of Pinehurst, would have been entirely abandoned. At that time Howard was operating a zone Ford and relates that to meet more than five or six cars a week was unusual. When word of abandoning the road became generally circulated, Mr. Howard enlisted the assistance of Dee Carlow, and the two immediately ushered in a campaign to save the road. Petitions were circulated in Ashland and Medford, in Jackson county, and throughout Klamath county, asking the county courts to continue the road. A short time later the plan for a modern highway was originated and due to the persistence of Howard, Carlow and others of the two counties, with valuable aid extended by the county courts, the state approved a new road and construction work was ushered in in July 1919.

Carries Heavy Traffic

As example of the importance of the highway to this section of Oregon it is necessary only to state that instead of operating a single Ford over the line, Howard is now running two 10-passenger cars and four 7-passenger cars, and states that in either direction his stages are never outside of other traffic. It is proving a valuable commercial road, affording an outlet for the unlimited and famous fruits and vegetables of Rogue River valley in the rapidly growing districts surrounding Klamath Falls and Bend.

Affords Scenic Beauty

Aside from its commercial advantages, the Ashland-Klamath Falls highway traverses a section of country varied with beautiful scenery. It penetrates the largest and finest body of virgin sugar pine in the world and affords travellers many shifting scenes in wealth and scenery.

Completes Crater Lake Loop

The completion of the highway affords another connection with the famous Crater Lake by way of Ashland and Klamath Falls, and together with the highway leading from Medford to the lake forms a complete loop with the famous resort. Already many tourists are visiting Crater Lake with Ashland as the starting point going by way of Klamath Falls and returning via Medford. Others are reversing the trip and visiting Ashland at the end of the trip and regaining the Pacific highway at this point.

A. R. PURVIS RELATED

Archie Ray Purvis, lineman for the Pacific States Telephone & Telegraph Co., died May 23 in Richmond, Calif., from injuries incurred in a fall from a tree.
