state, and that one of his greatest joys had been in contributing his proportion of the expense of providing Oregon with a network of modern highways.

"Good roads are an economic necessity," said the speaker, "and it is a fundamental principle that they be permanent. The highways of Oregon are too firmly planted to be pulled up and rolled aside. All will admit that eventually they will wear out, but only through the long continued use by those who constructed them and by their neighbors from other states, and this in itself is a justification for their construction. Our modern roads have introduced Oregonians to Oregon and made the people of our neighboring states acquainted with Oregon, the great natural playground and storehouse of natural wealth."

History Graphically Detailed

An event, not included on the printed program, was injected into the afternoon when Capt. O. C. Applegate, of Klamath Falls, and an outstanding figure in the Indian wars and pioneer life of southern Oregon, was introduced as one of the honored trail blazers and as one who would give the names of the men who blazed the first trail across Green Spring Mountain and made travel possible between Ashland and the Klamath Lake basin. Tall, with the light of life still burning brightly in his eyes, attired in his historic buckskin suit, flowing white hair and beard, Capt. Applegate, with a voice that carried to the outer rows of spectators, graphically related the details of the first expedition over Green Spring Mountain. Fifteen men with 30 head of horses, 15 of them being packed, departed from Ashland in Rogue river valley on June 30, 1846, for the purpose of fighting their way through primeval forests to the Klamath Lake basin. After five days of untiring labor in threading their way through solid forests and in finding the most accessible passes they at last gained a vantage point from which they looked out over the great lake basin. The climax and culmination of their efforts occurred on July 4th.

The men who composed the historic party were: Lindsay Applegate, Jesse Applegate, Wm. G. Parker, Levi Scott, Robert Smith, Moses Harris, John Scott, Wm. Sportsman, Sam Goodhue, Henry Bogus, John Jones, Ben Burch, David Goff, John Owens and Bennett Osborn.

Klein in Brief Talk

Roy A. Klein, secretary to the state Highway Commission and state engineer, made a brief speech in which he compared the roads of Reme with those of Oregon, and in which he stated that Oregon possesses more and better roads than Rome enjoyed in her palmist days.

Klein recited interesting facts concerning the enormity of Oregon's highway system and the the Ashland-Klamath Falls highway. The latter cost \$1,150,000 and the cost was participated in by Jackson and Klamath counties, the state and federal government.

Other speakers were a Mr. Darbey, of Roseburg, C. E. Gates, Medford, and Jas. Stewart, of Corvallis, representing Wm. Duby, president of the State Highway commission. The latter brought greetings and congratulations from Judge Duby to the people of Klamath Falls and Rogue River valley upon the completion of the new highway, and urged the importance of maintaining and enlarging our present highway system through the maintenance of the automobile and gasoline taxes. He urged his hearers to oppose any effort to reduce the automobile license and gasoline tax.

Music by the Ashland band, Lithian Octette and Klamath Falls cowboy male quartette interspersed the addresses and added pep to the occasion, which is declared by all to have been an unqualified success.

ices now taxed. Effective on the same date there will be a reduction in manufacturers' excise taxes on automobiles, trucks, parts and accessories. Also, on July 1, the tax will be taken off telephones and telegraph messages, on admissions of 50 cents and less, on articles of jewelry selling for \$30 and less, on watches selling for \$60 and less, and on silver plated flat table ware. These taxes, however, must be paid for the month of June.

All stamp taxes will remain in force and effect as at present until July 1. Thereafter there will be no tax on promissory notes and drafts. The stamp tax will remain, effective as to issues and transfers of capital stock, bonds of indebtedness, deeds, proxies, powers of attorney and other instruments now taxed.
