## LAUNDRY MERITS ARE ENUMERATED

Modern Plants Are Necessary to Public Health, Owners Point Out

The importance of the modern laundry as a factor in the health, happiness and comfort of every large city is being stressed in an educational campaign by the members of the Oregon Laundry Owners' association in conjunction with a national campaign fostered by the national association.

The development of the laundry industry in Ashland, according to W. M. Wright of the association, has kept pace with the growth of the city. It represents one of the largest payrolls and its service is a sanitary necessity.

## Value Becoming Known

"The public rapidly is learning the value of the laundry industry," one of the bulletins sent out by the national association states.

"It does a disagreeable task better than can be accomplished in the home. Its development into the present modern plants represents a large investment in buildings, machinery and equipment. It requires mechanical chemical and textile knowledge of experts. The laundry business is a science. It involves a knowledge of the chemistry of soaps, dyes and waters; chemical cleansers and their effect on fabrics to prevent fading and shrinking."

## Connected With Institute

The national association is connected with the Mellon Institute of Industrial Research, University of Pittsburgh, Pa., where present day "wash" problems are solved by experts.

Personal service to the public is the ultimate goal of the campaign, according to Mr. Wright. The public by taking advantage of free expert service can learn what is best to wear, what will fade and what textiles will shrink.

campaigns in Oregon and Washington and showed how the rural vote overcame in both cases a majority of anti-prohibition votes in the large cities. The need for teaching respect

for the law was urged by O. P. Coshov, associate justice of the Oregon supreme court. He declared that enforcement congresses, such as the one now being held, while helpful were not enough. He said that in addition every Sunday school, every school and every court should become a center for the teaching of respect for the law.

The bettered social and family conditions were declared by Bishop Walter T. Summer to have been one of the big results of prohibition. He also expressed the belief that the youth of today is much more intelligent. The speaker urged the need of constant watchfulness against the efforts of liquor interests to undermine the prohibition structure.

## COMMITTEE REPORTS ON OIL LEASES

## Harding Without Authority

Walsh attacked the legality of the leases, first, because the late President Harding was without authority to transfer control of the reserves from the navy to the interior department; second, because the leasing acts of congress strictly prohibited either Fall or Denby from entering contracts for exchange of navy oil for storage tanks, and third, because the leases were consummated without competitive bidding, as prescribed by law.

"This order (executive) running counter, as it did, to the well understood policy of congress, merits more than a passing notice," he said. "Its legality ought to have been recognized by everyone connected in its promulgation. The idea that the president may transfer powers reposed in or duties imposed on one cabinet officer to another is intolerable and indefensible."

Not only was the order illegal, Walsh said, but he held that the law prohibited leasing without competitive bids.

## Was Not Good Business

Arguments of Fall and Denby, that, because of drainage conditions, the leases were good business for the government were de-

nied, chiefly in connection with the Sinclair contract. Walsh said that even with a quarter of the oil drilled away there would have been 22,000,000 barrels left in the ground.

"Your committee cannot believe that a lease under which the government receives 6 per cent of the oil in the ground, and the lessee gets 94 that the deal can be in the interest or just to the government," said Walsh. "Had the leases been awarded upon competitive bidding, there would have been no occasion to inquire whether they are or are

not fair to the government. The omission to invite competition casts a suspicion on the transactions."

Walsh also assailed leases in the Buena Vista, California, reserve and sections 1, 6, and 36 in the Elk Hills reserve to the Standard Oil Company of California.
