motor car exceed 50,000 and as the heavy travel is during the months of June, July, August and September, undoubtedly several hundred thousand motorists will visit Oregon before the year passes.

During the period between April 25 and May 31, \$3406 was received in motor vehicle license fees for cars which had previously been registered under the laws of other states. These cars were registered from states as far east as New York and as far south as Texas, indicating that the owners thereof had either taken up residence after coming to Oregon or while therein disposed of the cars. Under Oregon law the permit is issued for 90 days. Residents of Oregon who have been in other states during the time the motor vehicle licenses are annually renewed and taken out licenses under the laws thereof cannot claim exemption from the Oregon license or the 90-day period.

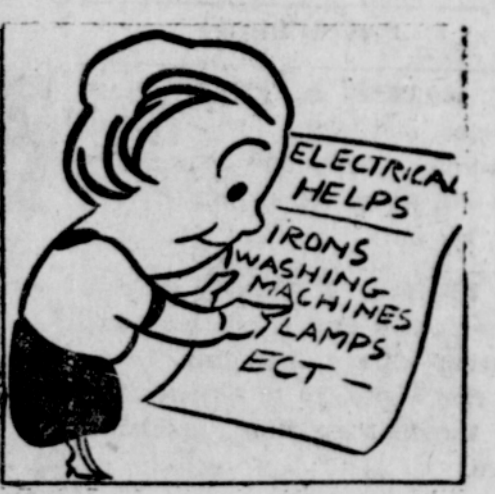
